Minutes of Meeting

The Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board held a special meeting on Thursday, April 14, 2011, at Arkansas State University – Mountain Home in the McClure Convention Center. Chairman Leech called the meeting to order at 4:00 p.m. with a quorum present.

Presidents, chancellors, institutional representatives, members of the press, and guests were also present.

Chairman Leech thanked presidents and chancellors for attending the Special Board meeting and welcomed new Coordinating Board member Horace Hardwick to his first Coordinating Board meeting.

Chairman Leech stated that last month the Board decided to discuss at today's meeting the process they would go through in hiring a director and said that he would like to ask the board to put the search process off indefinitely.

Sarah Argue, Secretary

After expressing several reasons for delaying the search process, Chairman Leech recommended to the Board that the search process be discussed at a later date.

Steve Luelf voiced concerns over postponing the discussion indefinitely and the fact that Arkansas was unable to keep Dr. Purcell. He stated that the Board really valued Dr. Purcell's services and essentially lost him for \$80,000 to \$90,000. Arkansas talks about how important education is, however, we can't find the resources to keep someone like Dr. Purcell, said Mr. Luelf.

After a lengthy discussion from the board, Chairman Leech asked that a motion be made to delay the Director search discussions until the October Board meeting. Kaneaster Hodges moved to delay discussion of hiring a new Director until October. Sarah Argue seconded the motion, and the Board unanimously approved.

Next, Interim Director Broadway presented information on performance funding, the method of funding public institutions based not on inputs, such as enrollments, but on outcomes, such as retention, degree completion, and job placement. He explained that the principal rationale for performance funding has been that performance funding will prod institutions to be more effective and efficient, particularly in a time of increasing demands on higher education and increasingly straitened state finances. In closing Interim Director Broadway said that the work other states have done to implement Outcomes-Centered formulas will be helpful in our preparation, but Arkansas and its institutions are unique and this must be kept in mind throughout the process.

Florine Milligan asked how comfortable Interim Director Broadway was with the Board setting the funding codes. Interim Director Broadway said that he was confident that the Board could do it; however, it would be an educational process that would have to be done with the help of trustees and institutions.

Chairman Leech thanked Interim Director Broadway for the informative information.

With no further comments, the meeting adjourned at 5:45 p.m.

Chairman Leech introduced Dr. Ed Coulter, the Chancellor for ASU – Mountain Home for a welcome.

Dr. Coulter welcomed everyone to the meeting and introduced ASU Board of Trustees Chairman Howard Slinkard for a few words. Mr. Slinkard thanked everyone for coming. Dr. Coulter then introduced Rex Nelson with Arkansas' Independent Colleges and Universities.

Chairman Leech thanked Dr. Coulter for his welcome and introduced Emily Jordan-Cox, Policy Advisor for Higher Education and Jennifer Flinn, Deputy Policy Advisor for Higher Education in the Governor's Office.

Agenda Item No. 1 Approval of Minutes

Dr. Olin Cook moved to approve Agenda Item No. 1. Dr. Charles Allen seconded the motion and the Board unanimously approved.

Agenda Item No. 2 Agency Updates

Shane Broadway, Interim Director for the Department of Higher Education, presented information on the annual operations plan, legislative update, the Academic Challenge Scholarship, the Compact with Arkansas, College Access Challenge Grant, Say Go College Week, College 101, Career Pathways Initiative, and the Sparkman Scholarship.

Sarah Argue asked if there was a provision that allowed the Academic Challenge Scholarship to be carried over from two-year institution to a four-year institution. Mr. Broadway said yes and explained that a student could receive up to \$2,500 a year at a two-year institution and then transfer to a four-year institution and receive up to \$5,000 a year.

Agenda Items No. 3 - 6
Annual Report on Credentials Awarded,
Annual Report on Student Retention and Graduation,
Annual Report on Retention and Graduation of Intercollegiate Athletes,
and Annual Report on Productivity of Recently Approved Programs

Rick Jenkins presented summary and detailed information about credentials awarded, student retention and graduation, retention and graduation of intercollegiate athletes and the productivity of recently approved programs.

Figures shown to the board indicated a 66.5 percent increase in credentials awarded from 2006 to 2010, up from 25,354 to 34,207 during the current 5-year period. Credentials range from certificates of proficiency to doctoral degrees and students may obtain more than one credential over the course of an educational career.

Graduation rates at Arkansas's 11 four-year universities have remained in the 37-39 percent range for the most recent 5 years, with females having the highest graduation rates. Graduation rates at Arkansas's 22 two-year colleges have increased from 17.7 to 19.8 percent for the most recent 5 years, with males having the highest graduation rates.

In Academic Year 2009, 2,825 students participated in athletics at twelve Arkansas institutions. In AY2006 there were 2,726 students participating in athletics. Data shows that graduation rates for athletes at four-year universities have been

declining, whereas the graduation rates for all students have been relatively steady. However, the graduation rates for all athletes is from 2.1 to 5.7 percentage points higher than all students.

The graduation rates for student athletes at two-year colleges have experienced great fluctuation over the five years reviewed. This situation is tempered by the fact that there are few student athletes attending two-year colleges.

Public Hearing

Agenda Item No. 7 Academic Challenge Scholarships

The Arkansas Academic Challenge Scholarship Program has been expanded to provide opportunities for higher education to previously underserved Arkansans (traditional students, currently enrolled college students and nontraditional students) due to the additional funding made possible by the Arkansas Scholarship Lottery. The goal of this scholarship is to provide meaningful financial help to those qualifying. The scholarship will be available to all Arkansans regardless of race, gender, family income or course of study as long as the applicant meets the eligibility requirements. Academic Challenge currently serves approximately 30,000 students. The program works to promote academic rigor and excellence. The scholarship program is based on merit, one that reflects a commitment to academic achievement and degree attainment.

RESOLVED, That the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board adopts the rules and regulations presented in this agenda item for the Arkansas Academic Challenge Scholarship Program, to be administered jointly by the Arkansas Department of Higher Education and approved Arkansas Institutions of Higher Education.

FURTHER RESOLVED, That by the adoption of the rules and regulations presented in this agenda item, the Director of the Arkansas Department of Higher Education or his designee is authorized to promulgate these rules and regulations and to implement them for the 2011-2012 academic year.

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Director of the Arkansas Department of Higher Education or his designee is authorized to make technical changes and corrections when necessary in the program rules for the Arkansas Academic Challenge Scholarship Program.

Sarah Argue expressed concern over the fact that a "D" is considered successfully completed.

Dr. Olin Cook moved to approve Agenda Item No. 7. Dr. Charles Allen seconded the motion and the Board unanimously approved.

Agenda Item No. 8 Ph.D. in Aquaculture/Fisheries University of Arkansas at Pine Bluff

In February 2011, the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board approved a change in role and scope for the University of Arkansas at Pine Bluff (UAPB) to offer one doctoral degree program pending the ADHE external review of the UAPB proposal for a Ph.D. in Aquaculture/Fisheries. Coordinating Board approval of the Ph.D. degree will allow UAPB to offer its first and only doctoral program as requested by the Board of Trustees of the University of Arkansas System. The proposed Ph.D. program will build upon the existing bachelor's and master's degrees in aquaculture/fisheries, utilizing existing faculty, courses, laboratory facilities, and library resources.

RESOLVED, that the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board approves the Doctor of Philosophy in Aquaculture/Fisheries (CIP 01.0303) at the University of Arkansas at Pine Bluff effective Fall 2011.

FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Coordinating Board instructs the Director of the Arkansas Department of Higher Education to notify the President and Chair of the Board of Trustees of the University of Arkansas System, and the Chancellor of the University of Arkansas at Pine Bluff of the approval; and to request that UAPB submit a program status report to ADHE on September 1, 2013.

FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Coordinating Board instructs the Director to report on the implementation status of the UAPB Ph.D. program at the October 2013 Board meeting. The report must include details on Ph.D. student admissions, new course development, new faculty hires, graduate faculty appointments, graduate committee activity, new industry partnerships, and new external grant funds.

Chancellor Lawrence Davis thanked Shane Broadway, Cynthia Moten, Dr. Alan Sugg, Dr. Mary Benjamin, Dr. Engle and the Coordinating Board for helping to make the fisheries program possible.

Dr. Olin Cook moved to recommend Agenda Item No. 8 to the full Board for consideration. Jodie Carter seconded and the Committee approved.

Agenda Item No. 9 Technical Certificate in Diesel Service Technology Ozarka College

The Technical Certificate in Diesel Service Technology is a 32-semester credit hour program designed to train students with the necessary skills to repair and maintain diesel engines up to semi-tractors, suspension and steering, brakes, electrical systems, drive train, heating and air conditioning, and other industrial equipment. Ozarka currently offers the Technical Certificate and Associate of Applied Science in Automotive Service Technology. The shop facility and equipment will be shared between the two programs. Diesel engines and other associated equipment will be acquired for the diesel training component. The diesel program will be offered in the evening so there will not be a constraint on the instructional resources. One additional full-time faculty member with at least an associate degree and two years of industry experience will be hired by Fall 2011. *Nine new courses* will be added to the curriculum.

RESOLVED, That the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board approves the Technical Certificate in Diesel Service Technology (CIP 47.0605; 32 semester credit hours) at Ozarka College, effective Fall 2011.

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Coordinating Board instructs the Director of the Arkansas Department of Higher Education to inform the President and Chair of the Board of Trustees of Ozarka College of the approval.

Florine Milligan moved to recommend Agenda Item No. 9 to the full Board for consideration. Dr. Olin Cook seconded and the Committee approved.

Agenda Item No. 10
Associate of Applied Science and
Technical Certificate in Process Technology
South Arkansas Community College

The Associate of Applied Science in Process Technology and Technical Certificate are designed to train students with the necessary skills to become refinery operators, chemical operators and process technicians in refineries, chemical, and industrial plants. These operators control and monitor the systems that run the plants. Operators gather information using instrumentation and lab equipment to maintain safe work areas and keep plants in compliance with regulatory requirements. Operators work alongside engineers, chemists, and other professionals using their knowledge of computers, mathematics, physics, and chemistry to keep industrial plants running safely and efficiently.

RESOLVED, That the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board approves the Associate of Applied Science in Process Technology (CIP

41.0301, 63 semester credit hours) and Technical Certificate in Process Technology (33-34 semester credit hours) at South Arkansas Community College, effective Fall 2011.

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Coordinating Board instructs the Director of the Arkansas Department of Higher Education to inform the President and Chair of the Board of Trustees of South Arkansas Community College of the approval.

Dr. Horace Hardwick asked if any oil companies were working with SACC. Ms. Moten explained that Great Lakes Chemical/Chemtura, DuPont, El Dorado Chemical, Lion Oil, Union Power, and Georgia Pacific are some of the employers who indicated a need for program graduates as well as willingness to provide internship opportunities.

Dr. Olin Cook asked if this degree is also offered at the University of Arkansas, Fayetteville. Ms. Moten said that some emphasis areas are offered at Fayetteville but not the exact program.

Florine Milligan moved to recommend Agenda Item No. 10 to the full Board for consideration. Dr. Olin Cook seconded and the Committee approved.

Agenda Item No. 11
Ph.D. in Engineering Science and Systems
University of Arkansas at Little Rock

UALR currently offers the Ph.D. in Applied Science with specialty areas in applied biosciences, applied chemistry, applied physics, engineering science and systems, and computational science. The UALR proposal is to reconfigure the Ph.D. in Applied Science to create the Ph.D. in Engineering Science and Systems from existing specialties in engineering science and systems. The proposed degree will include specialties in systems engineering, electrical and computer engineering, telecommunications and networking engineering, and mechanical and materials engineering. Students will gain knowledge in the broad engineering fields necessary for multi- and cross-disciplinary research. *Three new courses* will be added to the curriculum.

RESOLVED, that the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board approves the Doctor of Philosophy in Engineering Science and Systems(CIP 14.0101) at the University of Arkansas at Little Rock effective Fall 2011.

FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Coordinating Board instructs the Director of the Arkansas Department of Higher Education to notify the President and Chair of the Board of Trustees of the University of Arkansas System, and the Chancellor of the University of Arkansas at Little Rock of the approval.

Agenda Item No. 15 Distribution of Mineral Lease Funds

According to the provisions of A.C.A. §6-61-801 through §6-61-808, there is established the Arkansas Research Development Program for providing Arkansas Research Development Program Grants to publicly-supported universities in Arkansas by the Department of Higher Education. Act 1229 of 2007 provides that after the sum of \$13,200,000 has been deposited into the Higher Education Building Maintenance Fund, the next \$10,000,000, or as much as is collected, is to

be transferred to the Higher Education Research Development Fund to be used as provided by law.

RESOLVED, That after review by the Legislative Council, the Director of the Arkansas Department of Higher Education is authorized to distribute the Higher Education Research Development Fund for ARE-ON's annual operating and maintenance costs.

FURTHER RESOLVED, That \$1 million be allocated in Fiscal 2011to the University of Arkansas, Fayetteville for expenses associated with the connection of all public universities to ARE-ON.

Dr. Joe Bennett asked if this is the same thing as the severance tax. Shane Broadway said it is not. These are federal funds.

Dr. Alan Sugg explained that the funds would be used to provide operating funds for ARE-ON, which was approved by the Board.

Dr. Michael Abbiatti, Executive Director of ARE-ON explained that ARE-ON is the future of Arkansas. Once complete, every academic program will be impacted by ARE-ON. In closing he noted that all four year campuses have been connected except one.

Steve Luelf asked why ARE-ON was only asking for \$1 million when they needed \$2.5 million. Jackie Holloway explained that the Legislature only appropriated \$1 million.

Kaneaster Hodges moved to recommend Agenda Item No. 15 to the full Board for consideration. Bob Crafton seconded and the Committee approved.

Agenda Item No. 16
Economic Feasibility of an E&G and Auxiliary Bond Issue
University of Arkansas, Fayetteville

The University of Arkansas, Fayetteville requests approval of the economic feasibility of plans to issue bonds not to exceed \$135.25 million in two series with terms of thirty (30) and ten (10) years at an estimated annual interest rate not to exceed 5.75 percent and 4 percent respectively. Proceeds from the bond issue will be used for E&G and Auxiliary purposes. The University of Arkansas Board of Trustees approved the two series at its meeting held on April 1, 2011.

RESOLVED, That the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board considers economically feasible plans for the University of Arkansas, Fayetteville to issue bonds not to exceed \$135.25 million in two series with terms of thirty (30) and ten (10) years at an estimated annual interest rate not to exceed 5.75 percent and 4 percent respectively.

Proceeds from the bond issue will be used for various E&G and Auxiliary projects.

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Director of the Arkansas Department of Higher Education is authorized to notify the President and the Chair of the Board of Trustees of the University of Arkansas and the Chancellor of the University of Arkansas, Fayetteville of the Coordinating Board's resolution.

Kaneaster Hodges asked if these are tax free bonds. Jackie Holloway said they are.

Steve Luelf asked if ADHE was satisfied with the maintenance fee amount set aside for this project. Jackie Holloway said yes.

Kaneaster Hodges moved to recommend Agenda Item No. 16 to the full Board for consideration. Bob Crafton seconded and the Committee approved.

Dr. Charles Allen presented the report of the Academic Committee and moved approval of Agenda Items 8 - 12. Horace Hardwick seconded the motion and the Board approved.

Steve Luelf presented the report of the Finance Committee and moved approval of Agenda Items 15 & 16. Dr. Bob Burns seconded the motion and the Board unanimously approved.

Chairman Leech opened the floor for public comments.

Chairman Leech announced that the next Coordinating Board meeting would be held at the Phillips Community College of the University of Arkansas Stuttgart campus on July 29, 2011.

Report of the Finance Committee

Steve Luelf presented the report of the Finance Committee and moved approval of Agenda Item No. 1. Kaneaster Hodges seconded the motion, and the Board unanimously approved.

Agenda Item No. 1 Economic Feasibility of Loan University of Arkansas at Little Rock

University of Arkansas at Little Rock requests approval of the economic feasibility of plans to obtain a loan not to exceed \$2 million with a term of up to ten (10) years at an expected annual interest rate of 0.0 percent. Proceeds from the loan will be used for educational and general purposes. The University of Arkansas Board of Trustees approved this action at its meeting held on May 20, 2011.

The loan is being sought from the Arkansas Sustainable Building Design Revolving Loan Fund which is managed by the Arkansas Building Authority. This loan fund was established with funds from the federal government under the American Reinvestment and Recovery Act.

RESOLVED, That the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board considers economically feasible plans for the University of Arkansas at Little Rock to obtain a loan up to \$2 million with a term of ten (10) years at an expected annual interest rate of 0.0 percent for campuswide lighting retrofit, expansion of a satellite chilled water plant distribution loop, and upgrade of HVAC control valves in the Center for Performing Arts

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Director of the Arkansas Department of Higher Education is authorized to notify the President and the Chair of the Board of Trustees of the University of Arkansas and the Chancellor of the University of Arkansas at Little Rock of the Coordinating Board's resolution.

Kaneaster Hodges moved to recommend Agenda Item No. 1 to the full Board for consideration. Dr. Bob Burns seconded, and the Committee unanimously approved.

Agenda Item No. 2
Revision of AHECB Policy 5.16.1a
Higher Education Participation in Arkansas Early
College High School (AECHS) AP/Concurrent Course Delivery

In 2007, ADHE authorized a pilot program to run through May 2009 that allowed for the teaching of concurrent enrollment and AP courses simultaneously. The Coordinating Board extended the pilot through May 2011. The most ambitious implementation of the pilot program had been the delivery of these blended courses via distance technology by the Arkansas Early College High School (AECHS)/ Southeast Arkansas Education Service Cooperative in Monticello.

After receiving many complaints, ADHE requested that the Arkansas Division of Legislative Audit investigate the program. Based on Division of Legislative Audit findings and the auditors' recommendations for further ADHE review of AECHS course rigor, the Board discontinued college and university participation with AECHS in the delivery of blended AP/concurrent courses for college credit effective May 2009.

RESOLVED, That the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board adopts the ADHE Executive Staff recommendation that Arkansas public colleges and universities will not participate with AECHS in the delivery of blended AP/concurrent courses for college credit via AECHS after May 30, 2009.

FURTHER RESOLVED, That Arkansas colleges and universities will not participate with AECHS in the offering of single courses for multiple higher education institutions after May 30, 2009.

FURTHER RESOLVED, That ADHE staff will review, in cooperation with ADE, other blended AP/concurrent offerings throughout the state to determine if these programs are pedagogically appropriate and in keeping with the ADHE guidelines contained in this agenda item. ADHE staff will submit an annual report on concurrent course enrollments to the Coordinating Board beginning Fall 2011. ADHE Executive Staff recommendations may be included in the annual report.

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the pilot report deadline will be extended from its initial due date of May 2009 (AHECB Policy 5.16) to May 2011 which will provide for the continuation of the statewide <u>Arkansas colleges</u> and universities may continue the offering of blended AP/concurrent courses pilot program for a minimum of two years in accordance with guidelines outlined in this Board policy.

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Coordinating Board instructs the Director of the Arkansas Department of Higher Education to provide a copy of the resolution to each president and chancellor.

Chairman Leech asked if the past problems regarding Early College High School had been worked out. Ms. Moten said they had been addressed.

Dr. Charles Allen moved to approve Agenda Item No. 2. Kaneaster Hodges seconded, and the Board unanimously approved.

At the April 14th Special Board meeting, the Coordinating Board made a motion to meet in October to discuss the Director search process. Dr. Charles Allen moved that instead of meeting in October, the Board meet at 4:00 p.m. on July 28th at Phillips Community College of the University of

Arkansas, Stuttgart Campus to discuss the Director position. Jodie Carter seconded the motion, and the Board unanimously approved.

Nichole Abernathy conducted a final roll call, reaffirming the quorum.

Chairman Leech thanked everyone for participating in the meeting and announced that the next Coordinating Board meeting would be held on July 28-29 at Phillips Community College of the University of Arkansas, Stuttgart Campus.

Report on the College-Going Rate of Public School Graduates


The college-going rate measures the proportion of students enrolling in postsecondary education in the fall semester after finishing high school, in most cases, immediately after high school. Since most students enrolling in postsecondary education do so immediately after completing high school, the college-going rate is an indicator of the total proportion that will enroll in postsecondary education. The percentage, therefore, reflects the accessibility of higher education as well as students' assessment of the value of attending college when compared to working, entering the military, traveling, or following other pursuits.

New Methodology: This report for the 2010 Fall semester reflects a new methodology. This new methodology focuses on students that (1) graduated from an Arkansas public school district in Academic Year 2009-2010, (2) are first-time entering students, and (3) are Arkansas residents. This new methodology more closely follows that used by the National Center for Education Statistics (NECS). However, there are three differences:

- (a) NECS filters by the age range of 16-24 ADHE ignores age but focuses on high school graduates from the previous year as most all high school graduates are between the ages of 16 and 24;
- (b) NCES includes GED students as their report is based on a survey. ADHE does not have data on annual graduating classes of GED students, therefore, GED students are excluded; and
- (c) Since the NCES report is a survey, it may include private high schools and home school students. ADHE has no data on annual graduating classes of private high schools or home school students. But ADHE does obtain data on graduating classes of Arkansas public high schools (from the Arkansas Department of Education). Therefore, the new methodology is a College-Going Rate calculation for Arkansas public high school graduates only.


Old Methodology: The old methodology consisted of the Fall student cohort including (1) first-time, (2) full-time, and (3) on-campus that attend an Arkansas public or independent institution after completing high school or GED.

The college-going rate for all Arkansas **public** <u>and</u> <u>independent institutions</u> in 2010 Fall is **51.7 percent**. This is an increase of 4.8 percent from the previous fall term (Attachment 3-A). The proportion of this cohort entering 4-Year Universities was 31.2 percent (an increase of 2.0 percentage points), while the 2-Year Colleges was 17.3 percent (a decrease of 0.4 percentage points) and the proportion of the cohort entering Private Institutions was 3.3 percent (an increase of 3.3 percentage points).




The College-Going Rate for all institutions increased by 4.8 percentage points to 51.7 percent.

NOTE: The Private Institutions did not begin submitting data on the high school graduation year of students until Academic Year 2011 (includes 2010 Fall term). However, this data will not be available in future years. Therefore, the below graph illustrates the College-Going Rate for public institutions only.



The college-going rate for all Arkansas **public institutions** in 2010 Fall is **48.5 percent**. This is an increase of 1.6 percent from the previous fall term.


Gender: The **public** <u>and</u> <u>independent</u> college-going rate in Arkansas in 2010 fall for females is 56.0 percent compared to 47.1 percent for males. The college-going rate **nationally** in 2009 for females is 73.8 percent and for males is 66.0 percent.



The **public and independent** college-going rate in the 2010 Fall term by race/ethnicity are as follows:

- American Indian or Alaskan Native only students (58.1 percent),
- Asian only any students (52.9 percent),
- White only students (52.3 percent),
- Black only students (46.1 percent),
- Hispanic any students (36.1 percent), and
- Hawaiian or Pacific Islander only students (11.4 percent).


The college-going rate **nationally** in 2009 for white students is 71.3 percent, for black students is 69.5 percent, and for Hispanics is 59.3 percent. NCES does not provide data for American Indian or Alaskan Native only students, Asian only any students, Hawaiian or Pacific Islander only students (11.4 percent).



This report does not take into account students that go to college out-of-state, out-of-country, or to institutions that do not participate in the AHEIS/SISDB reporting system.

New reports on the College-Going Rate by County and by High School District have been provided for the first time. These reports were enabled due to the new methodology.

Another new report is the report on Recently Graduated Public High School Students: Where Do They Attend College? This report, and the below chart, shows that the majority of recently graduated high school students attend 4-Year Universities.


Act 970 of 2009 requires the Arkansas Department of Higher Education to prepare reports on:

- 1. "Students who required remediation and who graduated... with a 3.0 or higher grade point average on a 4.0 scale..."
- 2. The number of "Attempts it takes a student to pass a postsecondary remedial course, beginning in the 2011-2012 school year."

The remediation report presented in February 2011 did not include the above reports – they are being presented at this time. These reports will be included in future remediation reports presented at the Winter AHECB meeting.

The following chart and Attachment 4-A shows that approximately 15 percent of students attempt a remediation course two or more times.



Remediation Attempts for Students that Pass






Remediation Rates for Students Graduating High School with 3.00 GPA or Higher

TECHNICAL CERTIFICATE IN PHARMACY TECHNOLOGY ASSOCIATE OF APPLIED SCIENCE IN PHARMACY TECHNOLOGY NATIONAL PARK COMMUNITY COLLEGE

Program Description

The Technical Certificate in Pharmacy Technology is designed to prepare students for employment as pharmacy technicians in health care and retail facilities. The certificate curriculum includes 29 credit hours of pharmacy technology-related coursework and internship, and 6-9 credit hours of computer and academic support courses. The associate degree program in pharmacy technology builds upon the technical certificate program and requires 27 additional credit hours of general education courses.

Students seeking admission into the Pharmacy Technology program will be required to meet institutional admission requirements and successfully complete a background check and drug testing. Students admitted into the program also must register with the State Board of Pharmacy to be eligible for the required internship.

Program faculty will include the Program Director, the Pharmacy Technician Specialist, and current Allied Health faculty. The institution will seek national accreditation by the American Society of Health-System Pharmacists. Partial funding (\$96,495) for the program will come from a federal grant (Title III) for strengthening institutions.

Program Need

Local pharmacists indicated a need for trained pharmacy technicians to help them provide additional services such as patient wellness checks, counseling, and other pharmacy-related customer services. More than half of the 17 pharmacies in the institutional service area indicated that they expected to hire 3-5 new employees over the next 3-5 years and would be willing to pay a higher salary for trained, certified technicians. Current salary for a pharmacy technician ranges from \$9 per hour for a non-certified pharmacy technician to \$13 per hour for a certified pharmacy technician. Students successfully completing the technical certificate or associate degree program will be eligible to take the certification examination administered by the Arkansas Board of Pharmacy.

American InterContinental University (AIU) was founded in Lucerne, Switzerland in 1970. AIU has campuses in London, England; Los Angeles, California; Atlanta, Georgia; Houston, Texas; and South Florida. AIU Online began in 2001 in Illinois.

In January 2001, Career Education Corporation acquired the University. AlU is owned by American InterContinental University, Inc., which is wholly owned by Career Education Corporation.

Faculty Orientation, Employment and Development

All new first-term faculty members and faculty members who have had a lapse of service of greater than six months are required to attend an orientation.

Professional development opportunities for faculty are provided on instructional or pedagogical issues.

Program Design and Delivery

Faculty program committees develop and approve master course outlines for online course curriculum and develop current course titles, credit value, descriptions, and terminal course objectives.

Through the Virtual Campus students may attend class, access academic support resources, interact with fellow students, staff, or faculty, and contact every student service department within the university. Students have access to tutoring services, support labs, peers to form study groups, and clubs within the Virtual Commons, which is the online campus' student center.

AIU Online degree programs are facilitated through a teaching - learning interaction engagement among learners and between learners and faculty. Faculty provide feedback, post course expectations, announcements; contact students that are inactive or behind in posting assignments; and engage in chat sessions that have a lecture component and a question and answer session.

Each online classroom is designed to provide students with synchronous and asynchronous activities. Chat rooms and instant messaging enable students and faculty members to dialogue with each other in real-time. Chat rooms permit faculty members to facilitate discussions supported by multimedia tools and are archived thereby allowing learners to review discussion.

Learners are supported with asynchronous activities and tools such as email interface, discussion boards, and a system designed to provide students with the ability to select a learning interface that suits them best. Content can be watched, viewed, read, or heard depending on the student's choice. Courses are six semester credit hours.

AIU programs are offered in all 50 states.

Assessment

Direct and indirect measures of student learning are used to assess and improve programs.

Direct assessments include course and program assessments of learning and capstone course performance data. Common assignments address key terminal course objectives and program outcomes. Faculty use common program rubrics designed to evaluate program content, as well as general education outcomes for undergraduate programs and graduate studies outcomes for graduate programs.

Online faculty members provide feedback related to the courses. Quality and quantity of faculty interactions are measured through class observations, student end-of-course surveys, faculty end-of-course surveys, and formative feedback.

Indirect assessment measures include end-of-course evaluations and student surveys, as well as retention and job placement data. Employer and graduate surveys also provide indirect assessment of learning for business-related job knowledge and skills, and general education competencies.

Student Services

Academic Advising

AIU Online has academic planning services available to help students plan their degree program of study. Students enrolled in undergraduate degree completion programs work with a Prior Learning Assessment Specialist to assist them in designing a coherent degree plan.

Students are assigned to a student advisor upon acceptance to the University who is a resource to the student on all matters for the duration of their time at AIU Online.

Financial Aid

AIU counsels students regarding loan indebtedness and gives the students an entrance interview regarding the loan programs available to ensure that the students understand the amount borrowed and their rights and responsibilities regarding repayment.

The student must report to the campus Financial Aid Department for student loan counseling should they fall below at least half-time enrollment status including withdrawal, dismissal, graduation/completion or leave of absence. Students are informed of the total loans received while in attendance at the University and any refunds that may have been made, as well as an estimated repayment schedule.

Library Services

The online library offers access to 2,220 selected web resources and 32 licensed article and book databases, comprised of a collection of 11,265 books, articles and reports from over 20,000 journals, magazines, newspapers, and other content providers. The library's collections are evaluated quarterly as curriculum and assignments change with new resources added in anticipation of new courses or degrees.

Career Services

Online students are provided with information and resources to create a job search strategy, assist in a career search, interviewing tips, submit a resume for review by an experienced advisor, and utilize a job search journal to organize their search. Career webinars and live chat sessions are available pertaining to career planning.

AlU offers internships in order for a student to gain experience in a new field before searching for a full time position and guidance regarding the benefits of participating in an internship program as well as strategies of researching and finding opportunities.

Advisory Boards

Alumni, employers of AIU graduates, and members of the Governing Board are participants in advisory boards. Faculty and academic program leaders consult regularly with local program advisory boards, comprised of industry experts and business leaders, to receive feedback, discuss trends in the field, and review curricular issues.

A Graduate Advisory Council comprised of faculty who teach in AIU's graduate programs was formed to provide advice regarding the improvement and development of graduate programs. Board members provide input to curricular review to assess the content of the curriculum to assure it provides the current knowledge and skills expected of graduate level programs.

Institutional History

Briarcliffe College was founded in 1966 in Nassau County, New York, to meet the careeroriented higher education needs of Long Island residents for success in the business world. The College works with local businesses, seeking their input and utilizing their expertise in developing curriculum designed to expand students' employment opportunities.

In 1980, the second campus was established in Patchogue, Suffolk County. During the 1980s, the College began offering high-technology associate degree programs in computers, computer-aided design, and graphic design and offered its first bachelor's degree program in business administration with a concentration in information technology. In 1999, the College added a bachelor of business administration degree in management.

In 2001 through 2003, bachelor and associate degrees in accounting, criminal justice, graphic design, digital photography, and technology were added.

In 2006, the Patchogue campus was approved to offer its first bachelor's degrees in business administration management and fine arts. Briarcliffe College was authorized by the New York State Education Department to establish an extension site in Long Island City, Queens, New York. In 2007, the New York State Education Department elevated the site to an Extension Center.

In 2010, Briarcliffe College became part of the Career Education Corporation Health Education Strategic Business Unit. The College's Board of Trustees approved an expansion of the major when it added healthcare management to its student learning objectives. This change was approved by the Middle States Commission on Higher Education. A new program in healthcare administration leading to the bachelor of science degree was approved by the New York State Board of Regents and registered by the New York State Education Department.

Students who completed developmental courses at other institutions, but have not completed the appropriate college level course in English Composition and/or mathematics must complete the placement examination.

Program assessment includes using data collected to measure the knowledge and skills gained by the students and the satisfaction of employers and graduates. Members of the College administration for each department and faculty work together on an institutional effectiveness plan. Faculty members participate in program assessment by reviewing

learning data to determine an appropriate level of expectation and any possible changes needed in the course outcomes, delivery methods, outcomes, or assessment tools. Faculty and administrative staff input is utilized in the strategic planning and budgeting process as it relates to assessment, including academic operations, new program needs, student learning outcomes, learning resources, and professional development.

Faculty Employment and Development

Orientation for online faculty uses the Educational Technology Standards and Performance Indicators established for teachers by the International Society for Technology in Education. A four-week faculty training course, delivered online using the CeCore Platform is required. Faculty-in-training must be able to competently navigate through the platform and use all online resources and tools. The online training is supplemented by an eight-week mentorship. Faculty-in-training may become faculty members upon successful completion of both the online faculty training and the first course mentorship.

Faculty members are assigned to participate in professional development activities. These activities are documented in an annual professional development plan and report. Adjunct faculty members must complete at least two in-service programs annually.

Program Delivery

Online instructors utilize the same syllabi as approved by the campus faculty. Online chat sessions and office hours start at prescribed times and continue for the stated duration.

A First Year Experience course is provided as a service to strengthen a student's success during the first two semesters of study. Early contact with students through the Student Management Department and Student Advisors with the goal of having a more focused personal relationship with students begins prior to the start of that student's first semester of degree study. During the first two semesters, advisors work with their cohort of new students and advise and mentor them for success at the College. Credit is assigned by semester credit hours.

Student Support Services

Advisement

The Offices of Academic Affairs and Student Affairs provide assistance on registration for courses, program of study questions, and college activities. Student enrolled in online programs are assigned an online academic advisor. The advisor assists in registration and tracks a student's academic progress throughout their degree program. They communicate with students on a regular basis, work with students to ensure their success in online courses, monitor performance in online courses and arrange for special services when needed.

The Student Advisement Center advisors and other Student Affairs professionals assist with academic related matters such as drop/add, withdrawals, tutoring support, reviewing class attendance, monitoring satisfactory academic progress, advising academic

probationary students, as well as assisting students with appeals relating to academic dismissal.

Students are transitioned to an academic faculty advisor after their first year of enrollment to assist the student in course registration and requirements until graduation.

Financial Aid

Briarcliffe College participates in the Federal Pell Grant, Federal Supplemental Educational Opportunity Grant, Federal Work-Study, and the Federal Family Education Loan Programs. A wide variety of financial aid programs are available, including scholarships, grants, loans, and work-study programs.

Library Services

The Briarcliffe College libraries are managed by credentialed librarians who assist students in using the research and learning resources. The College is a member of the Long Island Resource Council which provides access to materials at libraries located throughout the United States. The libraries have access to New York State Library's EmpireLink, an electronic gateway to public and commercial databases and information.

The CECybrary is an Internet-accessible information center. The "virtual library" contains a collection of full-text journals, books, and reference materials, links to websites relevant to each curricular area, and instructional guides for using electronic library resources. The collection includes full-text, peer-reviewed articles from scholarly journals and full-text electronic books.

Career Services

The Career Services Department assists students and alumni through a variety of career development and employment services. Students may have opportunities for part-time employment within their chosen career path. Career-related recruitment online job fairs are held regularly. Students post their resumes on the career website to search for employment opportunities.

Students are required to attend a Career Skills Workshop during their last semester at the College. This workshop addresses resume writing, interviewing techniques, and job search strategies.

Advisory Boards

Each academic department is responsible for selecting and convening a qualified advisory board. Each advisory board is scheduled to meet quarterly for input and recommendations for continuously improving academic direction in each department.

Assessment

The assessment process is comprised of two elements, the evaluation of institutional effectiveness and assessment of student learning. Course review is an annual collegewide process for course quality and consistency in meeting course outcomes and used to make decisions and implement change.

Faculty members are evaluated through the College's career management system. Class monitoring process, student perceptions of faculty's effectiveness and self-assessments are used in addressing classroom performance.

Student surveys are administered in each class, each term. Faculty are given the information that is to be used to guide future planning and performance.

Faculty Orientation, Employment and Development

Faculty hiring is based on qualifications judged with respect to academic credentials, additional teaching and/or workplace experience. All faculty members must possess, at minimum, a master's degree in the appropriate discipline.

Orientation is provided for in-coming faculty. Faculty development is focused on continual enhancement of faculty's teaching knowledge, skills, and abilities. Shared faculty research on teaching, system-sponsored in-services and workshops, topical meetings, virtual meeting spaces, and websites are provided. Faculty are required to develop an

individual development plan for professional growth in teaching and maintaining a teaching portfolio.

Program Delivery

Courses are awarded semester credit hours based on terms of 15 weeks. Online courses are offered in two 7.5 week sessions within the traditional 15 week semester. Online classes replicate the campus classroom. Faculty present lectures, course materials, evaluations/tests, and participate in discussion groups or teams. Classwork is required to be completed within specified timeframes. Classes have multiple weekly deadlines. The degrees are offered in New York, Ohio, Virginia and Wisconsin.

Students can attend a lecture, participate in a classroom discussion, ask questions of their advisors, determine the status of their financial aid package or receive technical support, all through the Virtual Campus. Students also have Outlook Web Access and can use the Live Interaction System instant messaging system to communicate real-time with classmates and/or teachers turning the Virtual Campus from an online portal to a cohesive online education experience.

The online or distance learning environment is a 24/7/365 capable technology platform. Students receive software packages related to their degree program and Adobe Connect which facilitates online classroom sessions where students and faculty virtually collaborate in real-time. Connect allows students and faculty to communicate via microphones and cameras, make presentations on-line, use virtual white boarding, classroom polling, and chat.

Students have the ability to attend a live asynchronous session with the instructor twice a week, listen to the live session recorded for continual review, and twice weekly course assignments designed to build on the student learners' knowledge and skills. The distance learning management platform has the capability to project PowerPoint slide shows, video clips, provide instant messaging to the faculty or between students, and provide immediate access to library research assets.

The development, design, and introduction of educational programs and offerings in all degree programs is a collaborative approach involving faculty from all campuses with support from market research

Students are contacted by the Financial Aid Department for online student loan counseling at the time of withdrawal, graduation or leave of absence and informed of the total amount of the loans borrowed while in attendance at the University. They are provided their rights and responsibilities regarding repayment, refunds applied to the student's loans, as well as an estimated monthly payment amount. The exit interview is completed electronically.

Tutoring

CTU offers approximately 29 "Online Learning Labs" in all academic areas and instruction for the Microsoft Office suite of Word, PowerPoint, and Excel.

Library Services

The CTU library is comprised of both online and campus level resources. The CTU library provides access to articles, books, and web sites selected for student and faculty use. The library offers research guides and tutorials, APA resources, and classes to assist students in doing research. It is staffed with professional librarians to assist the student and faculty by email or online chat. Online resources consist of research access to 29 searchable databases of documents, reference journals, reports, books, newspapers, and magazines. Including ProQuest, there are numerous discipline specific databases available for the students from the associate's to doctorate level. The online library maintains links to about 2000 websites reviewed for quality and relevance.

Advisory Boards

Advisory board members provide periodic input to curricular review. The board members, along with faculty, assess the content of the curriculum to assure it provides the current knowledge and skills expected of graduate level programs. Faculty and academic program leaders also consult regularly with local program advisory boards comprised of industry experts and business leaders to receive feedback, discuss trends in the field, and review curricular issues.

Liberty University is a religious, private, not-for-profit, co-educational institution. Dr. Jerry Falwell and the congregation of Thomas Road Baptist Church founded Liberty University (first known as Lynchburg Baptist College) in 1971. Jerry Falwell Jr., currently serves as Chancellor/President of the University.

The Thomas Road Bible Institute, which became Liberty Bible Institute, was started in 1972 to allow students to receive biblical training for Christian service. In 1980, the Institute became a part of Liberty University. Liberty Baptist Theological Seminary (first known as the Lynchburg Baptist Theological Seminary) was established in September of 1973. In 1985, the Seminary was merged with Liberty University as a separate graduate school. The school was renamed Liberty Baptist Theological Seminary and Graduate School in March 2007.

In 1985, Liberty University began offering distance learning in both undergraduate and graduate programs and added the MBA in distance learning in the fall of 1998.

In 2004, The School of Law began offering classes leading to the Juris Doctor degree and received full accreditation approval by the American Bar Association Council in 2010.

With four doctoral degrees, the University was reclassified from a Level VI institution from the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools Commission on Colleges in 2010.

Quantitative and qualitative information is used to monitor and assess the effectiveness and efficiency of its programs. Student end-of-course evaluations are completed electronically during the final weeks of regular classes.

Programs are assessed on a regular basis and reviews of outcomes and targets, analyzed data, report findings, and improvement plans when targets are not met. Course syllabi reviews for a program is conducted during the university three year cycle. Program reviews are conducted to assess and evaluate quality of faculty and staff, enrollment trends, facilities and equipment, comparison of the program to comparable programs at carefully-selected benchmark institutions, the structure and content of the curriculum.

Faculty evaluation is documented through student end-of-course evaluations and peer evaluations. Faculty are required to maintain a Faculty Evaluation Portfolio with input from the Department Chair and the Dean. Peer evaluation is conducted at least once every three years. Peers may come from outside the university, department, or school, depending on the discipline and the specialized teaching competency. Faculty self-evaluation must be documented at least once every three years. The self-evaluation includes: teaching effectiveness, scholarly activity, institutional service, church/community service, and analysis of plans for growth.

Faculty Orientation, Employment and Development

Faculty member are required to attend an orientation and training program. After successfully completing the training and orientation program, the faculty member is approved to begin teaching courses with the oversight of an Instructional Mentor.

Program Delivery

Liberty University Online offers its courses through several delivery methods. The University has adopted Blackboard®, an online software platform, as its primary delivery method.

The Liberty University Online academic school year consists of three terms: fall, spring, and summer. Terms consist of three eight-week sub-terms, and one semester-long sub-term which can range from fourteen to seventeen weeks in length. It operates on a semester credit system.

All University programs and courses, resident and online, follow the same curriculum guidelines for the initiation of new curriculum or changes to existing programs and courses. Curriculum is developed and proposed by faculty.

The programs are offered throughout the United States and internationally.

<u>Institutional History</u>

The Wesleyan Church founded Oklahoma Wesleyan University in order to provide higher education within a Christian environment. It began as Bartlesville Wesleyan College as a result of a series of mergers, which included Colorado Springs Bible College, Pilgrim Bible College, and Holiness Evangelistic Institute.

In 1959, the Bartlesville campus was purchased, and Colorado Springs Bible College was moved to Bartlesville, Oklahoma. The college was renamed Central Pilgrim College. The name Bartlesville Wesleyan College was adopted in 1968 after the merger of the Wesleyan Methodist and Pilgrim Holiness churches.

In 1974, the Oklahoma State Regents for Higher Education accredited Bartlesville Wesleyan College as a four-year liberal arts, degree-granting institution and in 1978, the College received accreditation with the Higher Learning Commission of the North Central Association of Colleges and Schools.

In 2001, planning to expand its offerings to include graduate degrees, the College changed its name to Oklahoma Wesleyan University.

The University's campus is located in Bartlesville and at multiple sites throughout the state of Oklahoma, including Afton, Enid, Hugo, McAlester, Miami, Midwest City, Muskogee, Norman, Oklahoma City, Okmulgee, Sallisaw, and Tulsa. Campuses in Kansas include Coffeyville and Topeka.

Faculty Employment, Development, and Orientation

An online training program has been developed for all faculty who wish to teach online. Before any credentialed adjunct is given a teaching assignment they are required to attend a seminar in Andragogy.

Once an instructor is part of the adjunct pool, they must successfully complete a three-week online faculty orientation class that allows the online teaching candidate to demonstrate specific competencies that they will be expected of them. They are recommended to teach one online class to determine readiness and actual demonstration of what they learned in the Online Assessment and Training. The new faculty member will be assigned a mentor for their first online teaching experience.

Throughout the year, continuing education opportunities are offered for online faculty members.

Program Design and Delivery

The traditional programs of the University operate on a semester basis and offer a summer school program. The non-traditional programs operate on a year-round, modular basis. Courses are offered in five schools: Arts and Sciences, Business, Education, Nursing, and Religion and Philosophy.

The University grants the Master of Business Administration (MBA), the Master of Education (MEd), the Bachelor of Arts (BA), the Bachelor of Science (BS), the Bachelor of Science in Nursing (BSN), the Associate of Applied Science (AAS), and the Associate of Arts (AA) degrees.

Student Support Services

The Office of Adult & Graduate Studies is responsible for online student services via the Department of Daily Operations. The office offers the services relative to the online programs of delivery of books and course materials and coordination of student class schedules. The office coordinates the students' class schedules in cases dropped or added courses. Academic program calendars are used to arrange the sequence of course offerings. Books are available through the bookstore website for every course.

Academic Advising Services

Online students are assigned to an academic advisor upon matriculation. They are responsible for setting up individual student sessions for pre-enrollment academic advising, follow-up academic progression advising, and graduation advising. The services are handled virtually via email or telephone, based on student preference.

Financial Aid Counseling

Financial aid operates through a centralized financial aid / student financial services office on the main OKWU campus, with a financial aid counselor dedicated to the needs of distance and online students. Financial aid counselors are available by telephone Monday through Friday.

Library Resources

Oklahoma Wesleyan University has a digital library collection capable of supporting online programs. Currently, the university has digital access to most databases and collections needed for the degrees the University offers. They can be accessed via the library homepage. The OWU library offers a net portal for use with online resources at other libraries, and a net library which contains the university's collection of e-books. In order to aid online students with library navigation, an online blog has been created to orient the distance learner with library operations. Students are able to access all resources via web link from within each online course.

Certain reference elements are kept in hard copy only in the on-campus library and a reference librarian is available to the online students via telephone or an email link within each online course for access to the materials.

Institutional History

The Rasmussen Practical School of Business, St. Paul, Minnesota, was founded in 1900 to prepare students to work in business, accounting, and office management.

The college was renamed Rasmussen Business College in 1945 and then Rasmussen College. Rasmussen College offers programs that include nursing, digital designing, early childhood education, as well as the business programs.

Rasmussen College began to offer online courses in 2001 and became regionally accredited by Higher Learning Commission of the North Central Association.

There are 21 physical campuses in five states: Florida, Illinois, Minnesota, North Dakota, and Wisconsin and central services offices in three states: Florida, Illinois, and Minnesota.

Rasmussen College, Inc. is a private corporation under the laws of the State of Delaware. Rasmussen, Inc. is the parent company of Rasmussen College, Inc.

Fall 2010 enrollment in Rasmussen College was 17,070.

Assessment

Academic assessment is done in three phases: incoming, ongoing, and outcome assessment. Incoming assessment is implemented through placement examinations administered to students at the time of enrollment and course pre-tests at the start of major/core classes indicating academic levels for a basis for later comparison of academic progress.

Ongoing assessment is done through major or core courses to monitor student progress and provide the faculty and staff the opportunity to assist students who may be struggling academically. Cohort analysis of embedded assessment provides basis for appropriate measures to take for curriculum development.

Outcome assessment is comprised of assignments completed during capstone courses, submission of the Graduate Achievement Portfolio, as well as the results of any required industry or programmatic certification examinations. The comparison of data from the various incoming, ongoing, and outcome assessment tools provides basis for curriculum changes.

Students taking online courses take a Mid-Quarter Student Survey and also take an End of Quarter (EOQ) Student Evaluation of Instruction survey in week five of the course. The main purpose of this survey is to identify any issues students are having before the end of the quarter in order to address them.

The process for monitoring and evaluating faculty's teaching, student advising, and counseling process involves class observations, student end-of-quarter evaluations common course assessments, and tracking retention rates. Two observations for faculty teaching online are provided for students to comment on instructor performance. Assessment scores serve as indicators of instructor teaching success, as well as student learning success, throughout the duration of a course, and feedback concerning faculty performance in advising and counseling students.

The development of the design and introduction of educational programs and offerings is determined by local, state, regional, and national employment trends. Curriculum is designed to ensure the structure of the programs is appropriate to similar school of business programs. Faculty members have input into the course development and text selections, including designing the courses to meet programmatic and School of Business objectives.

Faculty Employment, Development, and Orientation

Online faculty and on-site Florida, faculty members share the same requirements for professional development, credentialing, and teaching effectiveness.

New faculty orientation is accomplished through a six-week online orientation course, one-on-one mentoring provided by faculty managers, weekly meetings with the deans, and materials obtained through the Virtual Center for Learning and Teaching, established to foster the sharing of best practices and continued development of teaching expertise.

All faculty that teach online are evaluated each term and their evaluations in addition to the student end of quarter evaluations and the retention report. Faculty managers manage online faculty and ensure they are meeting all performance metrics throughout the term. Part-time faculty are integrated into their department and the institution by including them in all faculty meetings and conference calls.

Faculty teaching positions for bachelor of science programs require a minimum of a master's degree in the specific discipline of instruction. Additionally, faculty hold any certifications or licensures required in their discipline.

Faculty teaching positions for the associate of science programs require a minimum of a baccalaureate degree in the specific discipline of instruction. Additionally, faculty hold any certifications or licensures required in their discipline.

Authenticating Students

To authenticate student identity, Rasmussen College utilizes the FERPA code word supplied by the student at the time of enrollment. The code word is captured on the enrollment agreement and stored in the student's record. For students who did not complete the FERPA form, the College verifies information only known to the student, such as last courses attended and instructor name.

Program Delivery

Rasmussen College offers baccalaureate, associate, diploma, and certificate programs in six schools: School of Allied Health, School of Business, School of Education, School of Justice Studies, School of Nursing, and School of Technology and Design.

Arkansas residents are registered through Rasmussen College's residential campus in Ocala, Florida. All student records reside with, and student aid processed through, the Ocala campus. Programs that include a residential component (e.g., Medical Assisting, Practical/Professional Nursing) will not be offered to Arkansas residents.

Ocala and online faculty share common course descriptions and course objectives as well as common course assessments.

Rasmussen College defines an "Academic Year" as a minimum of 36 quarter credits or 30 weeks. Credit is awarded in quarter credit hours.

The proposed degrees are offered in Florida, Illinois, Minnesota, North Dakota, and Wisconsin.

Student Support Services

Academic Advising

Student academic advisors including schedulers and registrars are assigned to serve online students based on the program of study and the student's quarter of study. A scheduler creates an online student's class schedule and sends the student an email to confirm or reject their schedule. If the student wants to make a change or discuss the schedule, they can call or email the scheduler or registrar. New students are contacted by a program manager with their schedule to assist with any problems.

Financial Aid

Financial Aid services for online students are provided through Rasmussen College's Central Services offices and financial aid advisors through fax, phone, or email.

Library Services

Online students have access to all materials housed in the physical campus libraries, as well as online resources consisting of subscription databases and e-books. The collection holdings are focused to support both the programmatic and general education needs of students and faculty. Websites are provided by librarians and learning center coordinators to support students' fields of study and general research needs in research paper writing and APA editorial style assistance.

Online students can have real-time chats with a librarian or learning center coordinator (staffed daily, 80+ hours per week). All students have access to print resources and can check out items which are shipped to student's residence, along with a pre-paid envelope for return.

Interlibrary loan services to online students is available. Library resources include over 52,000 physical items, 90 databases, 60,000 serials, 100K images& videos, and 20,000 eBooks available 24 hours a day.

Career Services

Rasmussen College Online (RCO) directly notifies online students of job placement services. Career services are delivered through a live/recorded Wimba (online) session. Emails are sent quarterly which include career development articles. Live webinars are held once a quarter on current career trends and tips.

RCO career service advisors assist students with developing professional career-seeking skills, resumes, cover letters and reference sheet preparations, professional portfolios, and gives career guidance and planning.

Tutoring

Students have access to free academic support and tutoring services through Smarthinking tutoring services. Students have access to real-time tutoring in a variety of topics, including algebra, English, medical terminology, and accounting. Students may also submit writing assignments for grammar and structure review that results in a 24-hour turnaround.

Helpdesk

Online students have access to Rasmussen College's Personal Support Center, which is available at all times through a toll-free telephone number. The Personal Support Center provides technical support in addition to assisting with student issues related to faculty contact, address changes, and routing students to the appropriate department. Academic support is provided by the academic advisors, online learning center coordinator, online librarian, and program coordinators. Online tutoring is available and workshops are available to students in a variety of topic areas.

Advisory Boards

Advisory Boards provide direction for Rasmussen College's programs to help ensure that they prepare students for successful in-field employment. Each campus has its own advisory boards, which are composed of local business leaders, current faculty, current students, graduates, and Rasmussen College employees. These groups meet biannually to provide feedback on campus programs, curriculum, equipment and resources, local job market opportunities, and local employer needs. This information informs suggestions for changes to Rasmussen College's programs and campus operations.

National Advisory Boards exist for the School of Nursing, and for the School of Business, and School of Technology and Design (joint board). These boards are comprised of executives and school directors from Rasmussen College, who are joined by national business leaders who allocated their time and talent to the development of programs and curriculum.

Institutional History

Shorter College is a private, non-profit, two-year institution supported by the African Methodist Episcopal (AME) Church. The College has been in existence since the late 1880s, offering church-related training and academic degree programs. Shorter College was accredited by the Higher Learning Commission of the North Central Association of Colleges and Schools until 1998. Over the past twelve years, Shorter College has continued to offer church-related programs and GED training. Currently, the College offers an associate degree in church leadership and ministry.

Accreditation and Licensure

Accreditation – Candidate status Transnational Association of Colleges and Schools (TRACS) in April 2011, and expects to hold full accreditation status within three to five years.

Because the Higher Learning Commission withdrew accreditation from Shorter College in 1998, the College is obtaining institutional certification for planning and development to reinstate academic degree programs in accordance with Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board policy 5.2. Once Shorter College receives full accreditation, the institution will be reinstated to independent institution status and will not be required to seek recertification to continue institutional operations and to offer academic associate degree programs.

ADHE staff and a former community college president made a site visit to Shorter on June 9, 2011, to meet with College administrators and Shorter College Board Members about institutional operations, finances, and plans to resume the offering of academic degree programs.

Program Delivery

Courses are offered on the traditional 15-week semester schedule. All classes meet on the Shorter College campus. Class sessions are scheduled using the 50-minute per credit hour of credit formulation which translates into actual in-class time of 750 minutes a term.

The Academic Council, comprised of the academic dean, faculty, and other administrators, is responsible for reviewing and recommending changes in the curriculum. Faculty members develop course syllabi, recommend textbooks, and select appropriate materials with assistance from the department chairs.

Admissions Requirements

High school transcript, GED test scores, or a college transcript

ACT or comparable test, with an accumulative test score below 18 resulting in a requirement of developmental education courses in reading, math, or English with a score of "C" before proceeding.

Faculty Employment and Development

New faculty members have orientation with the academic dean, business manager, and human resource director. Faculty members are encouraged and supported to attend professional meetings related to their fields. Formal written evaluations are conducted at the end of an employee's initial period of hire.

Assessment

Student evaluations of faculty members are conducted at the end of each semester and reviewed by the Academic Dean, department chair, and the faculty member. Formal performance evaluations are conducted to provide both supervisors and employees the opportunity to discuss job tasks, identify and correct weaknesses, encourage and recognize strengths, and discuss positive, purposeful approaches for meeting goals.

The performance of all employees is generally evaluated according to an ongoing 9 to 12 month cycle.

Academic Advising

Academic advising is conducted by the faculty advisor. Shorter College plans to add more personnel to the advising staff after certification approval.

Financial Aid

Students receive assistance from the financial aid director in completing their application. If students drop classes and/or leave the institution, the business office contacts the students to alert them to their status.

Library Resources

The Shorter College Library currently houses textbooks on reserve, paperbacks, and periodicals. The Library collection contains approximately 8,000 volumes. There are currently approximately 650 volumes in the Ready Reference section including many standard reference works and approximately 13,000 titles. There are approximately 500 volumes of supplementary texts and other curriculum materials providing extra support for classroom work.

A collection development policy has been adopted. The library is currently in the middle of a revitalization project and is re-cataloging the initial collection of approximately 8000 books which remain from the earlier collection using MARC, a comprehensive digital library management system (Machine Readable Cataloging) capable of being imported to other systems when needed.

The library is currently cataloging materials into the electronic system that will meet curriculum and college needs. All records conform to standard Anglo-American cataloging rules and are in MARC format to be able to transport them to a more advanced automation system when available.

Non-print media is available through an online electronic resource; additional resources are planned to be added. The college provides access to a number of online databases through the Arkansas Traveler System administered through the Arkansas State Library. The Traveler System gives access to the EBSCO host data system covering full text articles of hundreds of magazine titles, peer-reviewed professional journals, and newspapers, the ERIC database, and many other books, maps, and images.

A computer lab is available that allows students to access Internet sites. Shorter College will employ a full-time librarian.

Tutorial Services

Tutorial service is provided to the students from peers that excel in the course work, faculty members, and community members.

Career Counseling

Career Counseling is provided by a counselor housed in the Student Services Department. Faculty provide their professional expertise to assist students by suggesting and providing information on corporate internships for on-the-job training.

Verizon Wireless identified a need for on-site business degree programs for its call center employees nationwide to Strayer University. The reasons cited included creating an additional recruiting tool that differentiates Verizon Wireless as an employer of choice,

increasing the business knowledge, skills and job performance of its workforce, improving their customer service, and better competition for and retention of call center employees.

In 2005, Verizon Wireless chose Strayer University to serve as an on-site educational provider at its call centers, through a competitive bidding process. Since 2005, Strayer University has provided its business administration programs at numerous Verizon Wireless sites throughout the country. Verizon Wireless Center is at 1 Allied Drive in Little Rock, Arkansas. Each class will be conducted in one of the dedicated training rooms within the Verizon Wireless facility, equipped with overhead projection, Internet access, sound system and whiteboards. The training rooms are equipped and maintained by Verizon Wireless for their own training programs, and are made available to Strayer University for the program.

Strayer University will maintain an on-site Academic Office which will provide students with fax, scanning and photocopying capabilities to support their coursework. The equipment, computers and facilities at the Little Rock call center will be consistent with those provided to students at the other Verizon Wireless call centers where Strayer University has offered this program to Verizon Wireless employees. Classes will be held onsite as well as through distance technology.

Institutional History

The University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill (UNC Chapel Hill) is a non-profit, state-supported public institution and the flag ship University in the 16-school North Carolina State Higher Education System. It was the nation's first state university and the only public university to award degrees in the 18th century.

Authorized by the North Carolina Constitution in 1776, the University was chartered by the North Carolina General Assembly December 11, 1789, the same year George Washington was inaugurated as president. The cornerstone was laid for Old East, the nation's first state university building, October 12, 1793. Hinton James, the first student, arrived from Wilmington, North Carolina on February 12, 1795.

UNC Chapel Hill enrolled 18,579 undergraduates in the fall of 2010. Total enrollment including graduate, doctoral, and professional students is currently 29,390.

In the UNC Chapel Hill Kennan-Flagler Business School there are currently 1,746 enrolled students.

UNC Kennan-Flagler Business School is accredited by the Association to Advance Collegiate Schools of Business, which conducts maintenance of the accreditation process to evaluate programs, instruction, and effectiveness of curricula and teaching in all Kenan-Flagler Business School degree programs.

The MBA@UNC online program had an administrative review process to ensure that the program is consistent with the quality of other offerings of the MBA program across all dimensions.

The effectiveness of the delivery method is monitored in order to assess that online students get the same value out of an activity that an on-campus student does.

MBA@UNC online students have the ability to comment and provide feedback on every aspect of the program, platform, and delivery system.

Faculty Employment and Development

Professors in the online MBA program are currently teaching or have taught in some capacity in on-campus programs. Most professors are required to have a doctorate degree, but extraordinary professional experience and qualification can change this requirement.

Orientation

Orientation meetings occur every semester, and potentially more frequently as needed, dedicated to instructor training. The meeting focuses on learning to navigate and utilize the Learning Management System on which the program is hosted, including an understanding of the features and capabilities of the technology that instructors use to conduct classes (synchronous content) and develop asynchronous course materials.

Other topics include the similarities and differences between in-class instruction and instruction in an online environment. The orientation focuses on dealing with technical issues in an efficient manner that will prevent isolated technical issues from expanding and affecting other students within a particular class.

Every faculty member has virtual 24-hour access to a dedicated faculty support specialist in the Learning Management System and all related technologies that faculty and students may rely on. This faculty support specialist monitors class sessions and other content to identify issues and make suggestions for changes that will ultimately improve the quality and delivery of the program.

Authenticating Students

The MBA@UNC online program authenticates student identities and proctors examinations via a secure online synchronous video connection. A program-required web

camera allows the class professor to confirm student identity compared against an official record of government-issued ID that is confirmed genuine at the time of enrollment, registration, and orientation.

Program Delivery

The entire curriculum for the online program is identical to that of the on-campus program. MBA@UNC online is 66 credit hours over at least eight semesters and must be completed within 36 months. Two of the 66 credit hours are associated with required attendance at two of eight possible Global Immersion Weekends that will take place in cities across the world. Each class meets once per week for two hours in an online, synchronous, live-classroom environment via audio/video web connection. The classes of about ten students plus a professor has the ability to interact and engage in real-time for discussion, debate, and lecture. The platform also gives the professor the ability to break the entire class out into smaller groups to work on group projects or assignments as necessary.

Total fee for the program is \$89,000 – \$83,500 for tuition, \$3,500 for textbooks, cases, required software, and other necessary course material, and \$2,000 for the cost of room and board and other expenses associated with the two required Global Immersions Weekends.

Student Services

Advisement

Upon enrollment, each student is assigned a student services advisor and access to other student services professionals via email, chat, telephone, and web-conference. These student support professionals offer assistance with class registration and academic advising to navigating the virtual environment and technical support. Enrichment activities that take place on campus are available online to the MBA@UNC online students. Each faculty member has online office hours in a virtual office. Faculty members can meet with students face-to-face one-on-one or in groups. Many professors are available outside of office hours via email and/or instant message.

Financial Aid

All MBA@UNC online students have full access to the same financial aid services and support available to any on-campus UNC student. UNC at Chapel Hill financial aid specialists are available via phone or online via instant messenger during normal business hours.

Library

All University Library resources including journals, databases, e-books, and white paper articles are available to MBA@UNC online students using a University-issued ONYEN login. Textbooks and class specific resources are provided at the beginning of each semester. Distance education students and faculty may request delivery of books and scanned copies of articles from UNC-Chapel Hill or other locations. Through Interlibrary Loan Borrowing Service, books are mailed to students via the U.S. postal service and return postage is included. Photocopies and other appropriate media are delivered electronically to a student's ILB account.

Career Services

The career development staff provides career coaching to students and alumni. Students can discuss topics such as career strategies and networking techniques, or receive guidance on crafting resumes and preparing for interviews, performance reviews, and/or salary negotiations. Students have access to career and leadership assessment tools such as webinars and other online resources to help them identify or confirm their career interests. Students are provided a global network online database where students can search and connect with alumni working in their field or profession and local alumni groups and events located around the world.

Students receive in-person career development support at the weekend immersions held around the world.

Advisory Boards

There is no advisory board for the MBA program as a whole; however, advisory boards made up of external friends of the school provide industry-related guidance and focus on hot topics within their specific field. The external advisory boards have nothing to do with the curriculum, design, focus, or strategy and direction of the Business School in any way.

The University of the Rockies was founded in 1998 as the Colorado School of Professional Psychology to provide a professional graduate education in psychology to those seeking licensure as psychologists or practice in the profession. The University of the Rockies is a private, independent graduate school that offers the Master of Arts degree in Psychology and the Doctor of Psychology degree.

The University of the Rockies is a wholly owned subsidiary of Bridgepoint Education, Inc.

The University uses an assessment plan that measures outcomes at the course level, program level, and institutional level. Waypoint and e-College embedded grading and evaluation software program is used that aggregates all assessment data.

Faculty Employment and Development

Members of the core faculty are practicing professionals in the fields of mental health, organizational leadership, consulting, business, education, or research. All faculty members hold doctorates and professional certifications and memberships in professional organizations appropriate to their disciplines.

Online faculty training is comprised of two segments, training for new faculty candidates and ongoing professional development for existing faculty. Training for new faculty candidates consist of three weeks of online training. Candidates must pass the first two-week session in order to move into the new faculty orientation session. Online training and evaluation is set up to duplicate the experience of the students and to demonstrate their competencies as instructors.

Authenticating Students

The University verifies the identity of online students through the use of logins and passwords. Exploration into more sophisticated approaches is currently underway with a variety of third party solutions that will be both cost effective and minimally invasive of student's privacy. To date, the University has been in discussion with Acxiom, Software Secure, Kryterion, ProctorU, and CSIdentity.

Program Delivery

Course credits are expressed in semester credit hours. An online semester is six weeks for graduate programs. The curriculum is designed from the existing curriculum into appropriate format for online delivery and semester credit hours are consistent with the standard measurement of achievement of one classroom lecture hour per week.

Students are required to attend their asynchronous online course at a minimum of two times per week and complete all assigned work within a specified time frame within that week. All online coursework is equivalent to expected outcomes on campus, with the difference being that the programs are accelerated.

Student Services

Advisement

Students are assigned an advisor who counsels them throughout their program on issues pertaining to their degree path and class schedules. The advisor can be reached through their student portal or by telephone.

Financial Aid

A Financial Aid advisor assists students with any issues pertaining to tuition or financial aid. The financial aid advisor can be reached either by email or telephone.

Library

Library and data bank resources, staffed by a full-time librarian, are available. The University uses the Quad-LINC consortium online public access catalog with over 3,000

E-books is available to faculty and students. Materials for online students can be mailed, faxed, or emailed. The library is active in the Online Computer Library Center national network with borrowing agreements in Illinois and Iowa.

An Advisory Board supports the University with input on student and faculty needs and interest regarding curriculum, recommendations on new programs, services, facilities, resources, and assessment goals and technology.

REPORT ON ANNUAL REVIEW OF FACULTY PERFORMANCE

Arkansas Code Annotated §6-63-104 and Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board (AHECB) policy 5.5 require that each college and university conduct an annual performance review of faculty members. Pursuant to this statute, Arkansas Department of Higher Education (ADHE) staff is required to monitor the faculty evaluation processes adopted at public institutions, and make a report to the Coordinating Board and Legislative Council each year. Each institution must have on file with ADHE a plan detailing the procedures for faculty evaluation at each institution. Significant amendments to these plans are to be submitted for Board approval. Institutions also were required to submit a report to ADHE that describes the process followed during the 2010-2011 academic year.

Faculty Performance Review Activities

Faculty performance was assessed using a variety of methods including assessment by students, classroom visits by administrators, peer review, and self-evaluation activities. Findings were shared with faculty members being evaluated and, when appropriate, an improvement plan was jointly developed between the faculty member and the administrator who conducted the evaluation. Evaluation methods and time frames of the process varied among institutions. All teaching faculty members including teaching assistants as well as full-time, part-time, adjunct, and visiting faculty were evaluated.

Institutional Monitoring of the Evaluation Process

Administrators at various levels were responsible for oversight of the evaluation process. Results, whether related to faculty performance or to the effectiveness of the process, were monitored and appropriate actions were taken. Evaluation results provided the basis for personnel promotion, merit salary increases, and reappointment decisions. Based on established faculty review processes, the performance of most faculty members exceeded satisfactory standards.

Specific remedial or disciplinary actions also were taken as a result of performance deficiencies revealed by the evaluation process. Most often this involved the development of professional improvement plans.

Appropriate stakeholders were involved in the formulation of the institution's faculty performance evaluation plan. Most faculty members viewed the process as a useful tool for providing continuous assessment and improvement in instruction delivery and student learning.

Efforts in Working with Faculty Having Demonstrated Deficiencies in the Use of the English Language

The English language proficiency of faculty members at all institutions was assessed prior to employment and then on an ongoing basis through student and administrator evaluations of faculty members' classroom performances. A variety of means including increased use of PowerPoint presentations, required participation in English as a Second Language courses, and accent reduction training are used for remedy when deficiencies are found.

Compliance with Statutory Requirements that Colleges of Education Work Collaboratively with Accredited Public Schools

The collaboration between Colleges of Education and the public schools in their respective areas was documented in these reports. Institutions partnered with public schools through Educational Renewal Zone, secondary career centers, educational cooperatives, and other programs that encouraged high school students to pursue postsecondary education. Institutions also engaged in numerous activities that provided assistance with staff development and school improvement programs, including advisory councils, professional development, mentoring programs, teacher job fairs, and data collection and needs assessments.

MINORITY RECRUITMENT AND RETENTION REPORT

Act 1091 of 1999 (ACA § 6-61-122) requires all state-supported colleges and universities to establish a program for the recruitment and retention of students, faculty, and staff who are members of minority groups. The Act requires institutions to prepare a 5-year action plan and an annual report on recruitment and retention activities. Initial plans were developed by the institutions in 2000 and must be prepared on a continuing basis every 5 years. CERTIFICATION OF INTERCOLLEGIATE ATHLETIC REVENUES AND EXPENDITURES FOR 2011-12

A.C.A. §6-62-805 (Act 366 of 1991) requires each state-supported institution of higher education to annually certify by June 15 to the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board that its intercollegiate athletic program will generate sufficient revenues to meet expenditures or that any athletic deficit will be met by separate institutional board-sanctioned student athletic fees.

Verification of Athletic Budgets and Fee Information

Institutions with intercollegiate athletic programs submitted ADHE Form 21-2, "Certification of Budgeted Athletic Revenues and Expenditures" and proper supporting documentation. ADHE finance staff verified that the athletic data submitted by the institutions matched the overall 2011-12 institutional operating budgets.

A.C.A. §6-62-804 requires that any student athletic fees assessed must be clearly defined in all publications and institutional board minutes, and listed separate and distinct from tuition or other student fees on student tuition and fee statements. All institutions assessing a student athletic fee have certified to the Department compliance with this requirement and have submitted copies of their student fee billing statements illustrating the disclosure of the athletic fee to each student.

Summary of Data

The institutional submissions establish the 2011-12 operating budgets for intercollegiate athletic programs and certify to the Coordinating Board any student athletic fees that will be charged to cover operating deficits. The University of Arkansas, Fayetteville (UAF), North Arkansas College (NAC), and Mid-South Community College (MSCC) have never charged an athletic fee and expect to continue to meet their athletic operating costs without assessing a student athletic fee for the 2011-12 fiscal year. The following institutions have increased their athletic fee per student semester credit hour (SSCH):

A summary chart of 2011-12 athletic certification data from each institution is shown on page 12-3. The summary chart, excluding the University of Arkansas, Fayetteville (UAF), indicates that 45.3 percent of athletic program budgets are being funded from student athletic fees, while 25.8 percent comes from athletic-generated revenues and other athletic income. Transfers from educational & general funds contribute 16.9 percent of the funding. The remaining 12.0 percent is funded from other auxiliary profits and other athletic income.

Other than the educational and general transfer, the use of auxiliary profits is the most sensitive source of income for financing athletic budgets. Other auxiliary profits are included as a revenue source for intercollegiate athletic programs; however, the use of auxiliary funds to support intercollegiate athletic programs should not undermine sound fiscal management of those auxiliary enterprises.

ADHE Executive Staff recommend that the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board approve the following resolution:

RESOLVED, That the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board accepts the Certification of Intercollegiate Athletic Revenues and Expenditures Budgeted for 2011-12 as prepared in accordance with Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board uniform accounting standards and definitions for athletic reporting.

ECONOMIC FEASIBILITY OF BOND ISSUE ARKANSAS TECH UNIVERSITY

Arkansas Tech University requests approval of the economic feasibility of plans to issue bonds not to exceed \$12,505,000 with a term of thirty (30) years at an annual interest rate not to exceed 5.25 percent. Proceeds from the bond issue will be used for auxiliary purposes. The Arkansas Tech University Board of Trustees approved this financing at its meeting on June 16, 2011.

The auxiliary issue will not exceed \$12,505,000 with an annual debt service payment of \$805,053. Proceeds will be used to construct a new five-story 64,170 square foot residence hall. The debt service on the bond issue will be supported by net housing revenue. Coordinating Board policy regarding debt service for auxiliary projects provides that annual net auxiliary revenues should be no less than 120 percent of the total annual auxiliary debt service.

The above data demonstrates that Arkansas Tech University has sufficient revenue to support an auxiliary bond issue of approximately \$12,505,000 with a term for thirty (30) years at an estimated annual interest rate not to exceed 5.25 percent.

In accordance with board policy, Arkansas Tech University will provide for the maintenance of the facility by transferring annually to plant funds based on the APPA recommendation. The current APPA recommendation is \$1.25 per gross square foot for Auxiliary facilities. Based on an estimated total of 64,170 gross square feet, \$80,213 will be transferred annually.

ADHE Executive Staff recommend that the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board approve the following resolution:

RESOLVED, That the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board considers economically feasible plans for Arkansas Tech University to issue bonds in an amount not to exceed \$12,505,000 with a term of thirty (30) years at an estimated interest rate of 5.25 percent to construct a new five story residence hall.

FUTHER RESOLVED, That the Director of the Arkansas Department of Higher Education is authorized to notify the President and the Chair of the Board of Trustees of Arkansas Tech University of the Coordinating Board's resolution.
