Minutes of Meeting

The Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board held a special meeting on Thursday, July 26, 2018, at the University of Arkansas in Fayetteville. Chair Dr. Charles Allen called the meeting to order at 4:00 p.m.

Chairman Allen welcomed presidents and chancellors to the special board meeting and thanked everyone for attending.

Agenda Item No. 1
Report on the College-Going Rate
of Public School Graduates

The college-going rate measures the proportion of students enrolling in postsecondary education in the fall semester after finishing high school, in most cases, immediately after high school. Since most students enrolling in postsecondary education do so immediately after completing high school, the college-going rate is an indicator of the total proportion that will or did enroll in postsecondary education. The percentage, therefore, reflects the accessibility of higher education as well as students' assessment of the value of attending college

when compared to working, entering the military or following other pursuits.

The public high school student college-going rate for all Arkansas public and independent institutions for the 2017 Fall term was 48.2 percent. This represents a decrease of 1.5 percentage points from the previous fall term. Arkansas experienced a 3.2% decrease (from 51.4% to 48.2%) in the College-Going Rate of public high school graduates over the past five years.

Data showed the number of public high school graduates entering into their institution of choice for the 2017 Fall term. The top three 4-Year Universities were UAF, ATU, and UCA. The top three 2-Year Colleges were NWACC, PTC, and ASUB. The top three Private/Independent Institutions were OBU, HC, and LC.

Data for 2015 showed that Arkansas is #11 out of 16 SREB states for the percentage of 18-24 year olds attending higher education institutions. Data for 2016 has yet to be published.

Keven Anderson asked if ADHE knew what percentage of Arkansas's public school population is home schooled or private. Sonia Hazelwood said she didn't have that data but would check with the Department of Education to see if they do.

Dr. Charles Allen asked if charter schools were included in the data. Hazelwood said she believed they were.

Al Brodell asked if the data captured students that go outside the state. Hazelwood said it did not.

Agenda Item No. 2 Report on Annual Review of Faculty Performance

Dr. Jessie Walker presented a summary report on the Annual Review of Faculty Performance. Arkansas Code Annotated §6-63-104 and Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board (AHECB) policy 5.5 require that each college and university conduct an annual performance review of faculty members. Pursuant to this statute, Arkansas Department of Higher Education (ADHE) staff is required to monitor the faculty evaluation processes adopted at public institutions, and make a report to the Coordinating Board and Legislative Council each year. Each institution must have on file with ADHE a plan detailing the procedures for faculty evaluation at each institution. Significant amendments to these plans are to be submitted for Board approval.

There were no questions.

Agenda Item No. 3 Academic Program Review

Dr. Walker presented the periodic report on academic program review and program viability Arkansas. Code §6-61-214 requires that the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board (AHECB) review existing academic programs at Arkansas public

colleges and universities to identify certificate and degree programs not meeting minimum standards of quality and viability, and to establish schedules for either resolving these concerns or removing the programs from the AHECB approved program inventory. The existing academic program review policies (AHECB Policy 5.2) were adopted in 1988 and revised in 1995 and 1998. Institutions have been conducting program reviews for more than 20 years. Beginning Fall 2010, Arkansas colleges and universities were required to employ external consultants to review all certificate and degree programs over a period of 7-10 years with the findings from the reviews reported annually to the Coordinating Board. Accredited, licensed and state certified programs followed the usual review practices and the schedule of the accrediting/approval body. These programs did not require further ADHE staff review.

There were no questions.

Agenda Item No. 4 Program Viability Report

Dr. Walker presented a summary report on academic programs reviewed by the institutions for program viability purposes. The Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board (AHECB) adopted new program viability standards for Arkansas colleges and universities in October 2008. The program viability standards, based on a 3-year period, are as follows:

- 12 graduates (4 graduates per year) for career and technical education (CTE) certificates and associate (AAS) degree programs;
- 12 graduates (4 graduates per year) for bachelor's degrees in science, mathematics, engineering, computer science, foreign languages, middle school education, and secondary education programs for licensure in science and mathematics;
- 18 graduates (6 graduates per year) for transfer associate degrees (Associate of Arts, Associate of Science, and Associate of Sciences in Teaching) and bachelor's programs;
- 12 graduates for master's, specialist, and first-professional programs; and,
- 6 graduates for doctoral programs.

Chairman Allen began by thanking Chancellor Joseph Steinmetz and his wife Sandy for their hospitality on Thursday evening. He then introduced Dr. Steinmetz for a welcome.

Dr. Steinmetz began by thanking everyone for coming to the Fayetteville campus of the University of Arkansas. He then thanked Dr. Maria Markham and the AHECB for their higher education leadership. Dr. Steinmetz briefly discussed two large financial gifts that UAF received and their plans for future renovations and programs.

Chairman Allen thanked Dr. Steinmetz for his welcome.

Agenda Item No. 1 Approval of Minutes

Dr. Jim Carr moved to approve Agenda Item No. 1. Greg Revels seconded the motion and the Board unanimously approved.

Agenda Item No. 2 Director's Report

Finance Items

The July board meeting is of great importance to the institutions as the funding recommendations and operating budgets for the next fiscal year are presented for the board's approval, said Markham. The recommendations are the result of the second iteration of the productivity funding model, and will be presented to the legislature over the next few months. Development of these recommendations has kept the ADHE staff very busy in an already busy time of year for the agency. ADHE is preparing our legislative agenda for the general session beginning in January and also currently complying with pre-session reporting requirements.

Masterplan Retreat

ADHE senior staff recently conducted a three-day master plan update retreat. Institutions will receive a progress report on the state master plan goals, the productivity metrics as well as a summary of the higher education legislative agenda items, during the October AHECB meeting. Presidents and chancellors will be invited to attend a strategic planning retreat in late April or early May of 2019 to develop goals and objectives for 2020 – 2025.

ADHE Staff Changes

Dr. Markham announced that Mason Campbell has left ADHE and is now Dean of Students at Pulaski Technical College. ADHE wishes Mason well and are currently in search of his replacement as Academic Affairs Program Specialist, said Markham.

Institutional Changes

Dr. Cam Patterson is the new chancellor at the University of Arkansas for Medical Sciences. Patterson is COO of Weill-Cornell Medical Center of New York Presbyterian Hospital. He began at UAMS on June 1.

Effective July 1, Dr. Jennifer Methvin became the next chancellor of ASU-Beebe Methvin spent the last four years as president of Crowder College in Neosho, Mo. From 2005-2014.

Policy Makers Award

The College Board presented Dr. Markham with the Policy Makers Award for her efforts in supporting the recent adoption of statewide AP credit policy in Arkansas.

Agenda Item No. 3 Teacher Opportunity Program

In compliance with Act 1258 of 2015, the amendments to the Teacher Opportunity Program (TOP) rules and regulations are presented to AHECB for final adoption.

In accordance with Act 160 of 2017, the amendments to the Teacher Opportunity Program provide for the first priority of awards of funds under this program is the award of reimbursements for additional education in: science, technology, engineering, or mathematics fields; computer science; literacy or reading; prekindergarten education; or special education.

RESOLVED, That the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board adopts the rules and regulations presented in this agenda item for the Teacher Opportunity Program to be administered by the Arkansas Department of Higher Education.

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Director of the Arkansas Department of Higher Education or her designee is authorized to make technical changes and corrections when necessary in the program rules for the Teacher Opportunity Program.

Al Brodell moved to approve Agenda Item No. 3. Dr. Jim Carr seconded the motion and the Board unanimously approved.

Agenda Item No. 4 Arkansas Workforce Challenge Scholarship

In compliance with Act 1258 of 2015, the rules for the Arkansas Workforce Challenge Scholarship are presented to AHECB for final adoption.

In accordance with Act 613 of 2017, the Department of Higher Education shall promulgate rules to implement the Arkansas Workforce Challenge Scholarship. The Arkansas Workforce Challenge Scholarship will provide scholarships to students enrolling in a program of study that leads to an associate degree or a certification in one of the following high-demand fields: (A) Industry; (B) Health Care; (C) Information Technology; and whose program of study will result in the student's being qualified to work in an occupation identified by the Department of Workforce Services. The Department of Workforce Services shall provide annually to the Department of Higher Education by March 1, a list that identifies the five (5) most in-demand occupations in this state in each high-demand field.

RESOLVED, That the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board adopts the rules and regulations presented in this agenda item for the Arkansas Workforce Challenge Program, to be administered jointly by the Arkansas Department of Higher Education and approved Arkansas Institutions of Higher Education.

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Director of the Arkansas Department of Higher Education or her designee is authorized to make technical changes and corrections when necessary in the program rules for the Arkansas Workforce Challenge Program.

Greg Revels moved to approve Agenda Item No. 4. Al Brodell seconded the motion and the Board unanimously approved.

Agenda Item No. 5 Productivity-Based Funding Distribution

The productivity-based funding formulas were approved by the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board (AHECB) at its Special Meeting held on May 22, 2017. This report provided the outcomes for each University and College based on the productivity-based funding formulas aforementioned for the 2019-2020 fiscal year.

RESOLVED, That the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board adopts the recommendation for distribution of productivity funding to the Arkansas public institutions of higher education in the 2019-20 fiscal year as included in Table A.

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Director of the Arkansas Department of Higher Education is authorized to prepare appropriate documents for transmission to the Governor and the General Assembly of the 2019-20 productivity funding distribution recommendation of the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board.

FURTHER RESOLVED, That should any errors of a technical nature be found in this recommendation, the Director of the Arkansas Department of Higher Education is authorized to make appropriate corrections consistent with the policy established by the Board's action on these recommendations.

Keven Anderson asked Fuller to explain the distribution process and how the 7.4 million is distributed. Fuller said that distribution of new funds is split between the 4-year and 2-year institutions based on the percentage of current funding each receives. Then, within each group of either the 4-year or 2-year institutions, the funding is distributed based on each institution's impact on the growth in productivity.

Greg Revels asked if the funding is going to be at least what it was last year. Fuller said that base-level funding is where they start. The funding is not guaranteed until the final revenue stabilization is drafted and passed into law during the session.

Revels asked how many institutions lost money. Fuller said there were 14 institutions that lost money.

Sam Sicard asked if the 14 institutions were part of the 7.4 million. Fuller said no.

Al Brodell asked if any institutions were affected by the 1.5 percent cap. Fuller explained that nine (9) institutions were affected.

Dr. Jim Carr commented that the new funding is such a small percentage of the total. He said that it appears that if you start off with a small base, you are stuck with a small base.

Keven Anderson moved to approve Agenda Item No. 5. Al Brodell seconded the motion and the Board unanimously approved.

Agenda Item No. 6
Economic Feasibility of Loan Issue
Henderson State University

Henderson State University (HSU) requests approval of the economic feasibility of plans to issue bonds not to exceed \$1.0 million with a maximum term of three (3) years at an estimated annual interest rate not to exceed 5.25 percent. Proceeds from the bond issue will be used for auxiliary purposes. Henderson State University Board of Trustees approved this financing at its meeting on July 18, 2018.

The auxiliary issue will be up to \$1.0 million with an annual debt service of \$1,052,500 and a term of up to three (3) years. Proceeds from the bond issue will be used to fund the renovation of Smith Hall residential facilities. The debt service on the auxiliary bond issues will be supported by auxiliary revenues. Coordinating Board policy regarding debt service for auxiliary projects provides that annual auxiliary revenues should be no less than 120 percent of total annual auxiliary debt service.

RESOLVED, That the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board considers economically feasible plans for Henderson State University to issue bonds in an amount not to exceed \$1.0 million with a term of three (3) years at an estimated interest rate not to exceed 5.25 percent for auxiliary purposes to fund the renovation of Smith Hall residential facilities.

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Director of the Arkansas Department of Higher Education is authorized to notify the President and the Chair of the Board of Trustees of Henderson State University of the Coordinating Board's resolution.

There were no questions.

Greg Revels moved to recommend the approval of Agenda Item No. 6 to the full Board for consideration. Keven Anderson seconded and the Committee approved.

Agenda Item No. 7 Economic Feasibility of Loan Issue Arkansas Tech University

Arkansas Tech University (ATU) requests approval of the economic feasibility of plans to obtain a loan from the College Savings Bond Revolving Loan Fund in an amount not to exceed \$1.1 million with a term of up to fifteen (15) years at an annual interest rate not to exceed 2.44 percent. Proceeds from the loan will be used for educational and general (E&G) purposes. Arkansas Tech University Board of Trustees approved this financing at its meeting on May 17, 2018.

The E&G loan will not exceed \$1.1 million with an annual debt service of \$88,016 and a term of up to fifteen (15) years. Proceeds from the loan will be used to finance an Energy Performance Project under the guidelines of the Arkansas Energy Performance Contracting (AEPC) Program overseen by the Arkansas Energy Office. The project includes campus-wide energy improvements to include campus HVAC controls and lighting. As required by the AEPC Program, these improvements will generate annual savings guaranteed by the Energy Service Company, which will exceed the total project cost (construction, equipment and financing). Coordinating Board policy regarding debt service for E&G projects provides that a maximum of 25 percent of net tuition and fee revenue less unrestricted E&G scholarship expenditures may be pledged to E&G debt service.

RESOLVED, That the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board considers economically feasible plans for Arkansas Tech University to obtain a loan from the College Savings Bond Revolving Loan Fund in an amount not to exceed \$1.1 million with a term of up to fifteen (15) years at an annual interest rate not to exceed 2.44 percent to finance an Energy Performance Project under the guidelines of the Arkansas Energy Performance Contracting (AEPC) Program overseen by the Arkansas Energy Office.

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Director of the Arkansas Department of Higher Education is authorized to notify the President and the Chair of the Board of Trustees of Arkansas Tech University of the Coordinating Board's resolution.

There were no questions.

Keven Anderson moved to recommend the approval of Agenda Item No. 7 to the full Board for consideration. Sam Sicard seconded and the Committee approved.

Agenda Item No. 8
Operating Recommendations for 2019-2021 Biennium

A.C.A. §6-61-234 (Act 148 of 2017) directs the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board (AHECB) to adopt polices developed by the Arkansas Department of Higher

Education (ADHE) necessary to implement a productivity-based funding model for state-supported institutions of higher education.

The operating recommendations are based upon the productivity funding formula policies approved by the AHECB in October 2017 as well as requests submitted by the non-formula entities.

The two-year college and university productivity funding models have been calculated using academic year 2014 through academic year 2017 student data as well as academic year 2013 through academic year 2016 expenditure data reported to and published by the Integrated Postsecondary Education Data System (IPEDS). The productivity funding model calculations represent a total productivity increase of 1.34% for two-year colleges and universities, which supports the recommendation for state funding of those institutions of higher education of \$637,941,147 in 2019-20. The total funding recommendation for the non-formula entities is \$230,431,317 in 2019-20.

RESOLVED, That the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board adopts the recommendations for state funding of the educational and general operations of Arkansas public institutions of higher education in the 2019-21 biennium as included in Tables 1A, 1B, 1C, 1D and 1E.

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Director of the Arkansas Department of Higher Education is authorized to prepare appropriate documents for transmission to the Governor and the General Assembly of the 2019-21 operating recommendations of the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board.

FURTHER RESOLVED, That should any errors of a technical nature be found in these recommendations, the Director of the Arkansas Department of Higher Education is authorized to make appropriate corrections consistent with the policy established by the Board's action on these recommendations.

Al Brodell asked Nick Fuller to explain the difference in the amount that was projected versus what was actually recommended.

Fuller explained that for the current year's funding, we are projecting to need an additional \$860,000 for the productivity side of funding for the institutions. The nonformula institutions are requesting a \$21 million dollar increase, which is similar to past requests. The funding has ran flat for the past couple of years with no increases in funding, said Fuller.

Brodell asked for a definition of a non-formula entity. Fuller said that non-formula entities do not generate FTE's.

Brodell commented on the increase in STEM enrollment and asked if the increase was due to the STEM definition change. Fuller said yes.

Greg Revels moved to recommend the approval of Agenda Item No. 8 to the full Board for consideration. Sam Sicard seconded and the Committee approved.

Agenda Item No. 9 Personal Services Recommendation for Non-Classified Personnel

A.C.A. §6-61-209 requires the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board to present a consolidated budget request from the state-supported colleges and universities to the General Assembly and the Governor prior to each regular session of the General Assembly. As part of this process, the quantity of positions, titles, and line-item maximum salaries for all non-classified administrative, academic, and auxiliary positions at each Arkansas public institution of higher education have been reviewed, and changes are recommended.

Institutions of higher education, apart from UAMS, have 19,355 positions currently authorized. For the 2019-21 Biennium, institutions requested an increase of 543 positions and the deletion of 251 positions, for a net new request of 292 positions. ADHE staff recommends a net increase of 175 positions, for a total recommendation of 19,530 positions (a 0.9 percent increase). UAMS currently has 8,801 authorized positions and had a net new position request of 254. ADHE staff recommends a net increase of 84 for a total of 8,885 positions.

RESOLVED, That the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board adopts the recommended number of positions, titles, and maximum salaries for non-classified positions in academic, administrative, and auxiliary positions for the 2019-21 Biennium as recommended by staff.

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Director of the Arkansas Department of Higher Education is authorized to make technical corrections consistent with Coordinating Board action.

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Coordinating Board requests the Director to transmit the Personal Services recommendations to the Governor and the General Assembly for consideration for the 2019-21 Biennium.

There were no questions.

Keven Anderson moved to approve Agenda Item No. 9. Sam Sicard seconded the motion and the Board unanimously approved.

Agenda Item No. 10 Recommendations for State funding of Capital Projects: 2019-2021 Biennium

Capital priorities for General Improvement Fund projects in 2019-21 remain the same as those established in past biennia by the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board (AHECB). Those priorities are as follows:

- Technology infrastructure improvements including: installations or upgrades
 of local area networks (LANS), campus infrastructure to support increased
 bandwidth, and instructional technology equipment for classrooms and
 laboratories, as well as distance learning delivery systems.
- Critical maintenance projects where critical needs are defined as those which
 must be addressed before the end of 2021 and which, if neglected, could
 result in substantial damage to the structural integrity of the building, or are
 related to the imminent failure of building systems such as HVAC, electrical
 and plumbing. In addition, critical maintenance projects include those
 associated with ADA compliance and/or safety needs.
- Improvements in research, instructional and clinical equipment as well as library holdings and technology.
- Renovation of existing facilities to address changing program needs.
- New construction of facilities when renovation of an existing building to meet the need is either not cost effective or is not an option, e.g., new space to address enrollment growth.

In light of these priorities, institutions have responded with capital needs for the 2019-21 biennium. ADHE staff have evaluated the requests and have recommended capital projects that meet the strategic needs of higher education through 2021.

RESOLVED, That the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board adopts the staff recommendations for state funding of capital projects totaling \$251.25 million as identified in the accompanying agenda materials.

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Director is authorized to transmit to the Governor and the General Assembly the Board's recommendation for state funding.

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Director is authorized to make such technical adjustments to these recommendations as may be required.

Greg Revels commented that out of 1 billon dollars, ADHE is recommending 251 million dollars. Fuller said that is correct.

Revels questioned how that would affect the institutions down the road. Fuller said unfortunately, the funds have dwindled across the state.

Greg Revels moved to approve Agenda Item No. 10. Keven Anderson seconded the motion and the Board unanimously approved.

Agenda Item No. 11 Certification of Intercollegiate Athletic Budgets for 2018-19

A.C.A. §6-62-805 (Act 366 of 1991) requires each state supported institution of higher education to annually certify by June 15 to the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board that its intercollegiate athletic program will generate sufficient revenues to meet expenditures or that any athletic deficit will be met by separate institutional board sanctioned student athletic fees.

Verification of Athletic Budgets and Fee Information Institutions with intercollegiate athletic programs submitted ADHE Form 21-2, "Certification of Budgeted Athletic Revenues and Expenditures" and proper supporting documentation. ADHE finance staff verified that the athletic data submitted by the institutions matched the overall 2018-19 institutional operating budgets.

A.C.A. §6-62-804 requires that any student athletic fees assessed must be clearly defined in all publications and institutional board minutes, and listed separate and distinct from tuition or other student fees on student tuition and fee statements. All institutions assessing a student athletic fee have certified to the Department compliance with this requirement and have submitted copies of their student fee billing statements illustrating the disclosure of the athletic fee to each student. There were no questions.

RESOLVED, That the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board accepts the Certification of Intercollegiate Athletic Revenues and Expenditures Budgeted for 2018-19 as prepared in accordance with Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board uniform accounting standards and definitions for athletic reporting.

There were no questions.

Greg Revels moved to recommend the approval of Agenda Item No. 11 to the full Board for consideration. Sam Sicard seconded and the Committee approved.

Agenda Item No. 12
Certificate of Proficiency in Surgical Scrub Technician
Technical Certificate in Surgical Technology
Associate of Applied Science in Surgical Technology
Ozarka College

The proposed Certificate of Proficiency, Technical Certificate, and Associate of Applied Science in Surgical Technology will prepare students to work in hospital operating rooms and surgery clinics. Graduates will work as surgical technologists to perform the following duties: prepare operating rooms for surgery, sterilize equipment and make certain that supplies are adequate for surgery, prepare patients for surgery, assist surgeons during surgery, count supplies, and maintain a sterile environment.

Graduates will be eligible to sit for the National Board of Surgery Technology and the Surgical Assisting examination. Ozarka will seek accreditation through the Commission on Accreditation of Allied Health Programs (CAAHEP).

RESOLVED, That the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board approves the Certificate of Proficiency in Surgical Scrub Technician (CIP 51.0909; 18 credit hours); Technical Certificate in Surgical Technology (CIP 51.0909; 44 credit hours); Associate of Applied Science in Surgical Technology (CIP 51.0909; 60 credit hours) offered by Ozarka College, effective August 2019.

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Coordinating Board instructs the Director of the Arkansas Department of Higher Education to inform the President and Chair of the Board of Trustees of Ozarka College of the approval.

The proposed Bachelor of Arts in Teaching (BAT) degrees will prepare students for teacher licensure at the secondary level in the humanities with pedagogical skills, the content knowledge, and the dispositions for teaching and learning in 21st century classrooms in the areas of English, French, German, Social Studies, or Spanish. The 120 credit hour programs will include 40 hours of pedagogy, 33 hours in the individual content area, 35 hours of required core, and 12 hours of electives. In addition, students will have several field experiences in partner schools, including observations, practicum, student teaching and internship. The proposed BATs are teaching degrees with an education major in the content area.

RESOLVED, That the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board approves the Bachelor of Arts in Teaching in English Education; Bachelor of Arts in Teaching French Education; Bachelor of Arts in Teaching German Education; Bachelor of Arts in Teaching in Social Studies Education; and Bachelor of Arts in Teaching in Spanish Education (CIP 13.1205; 120 credit hours) offered by the University of Arkansas, Fayetteville, effective Fall 2018.

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Coordinating Board instructs the Director of the Arkansas Department of Higher Education to inform the President and Chair of the Board of Trustees of the University of Arkansas System and the Chancellor of the University of Arkansas, Fayetteville of the approval.

Agenda Item No. 14 Bachelor of Science in Cybersecurity University of Central Arkansas

The proposed 120 credit hour Bachelor of Science in Cybersecurity is designed to produce graduates who can identify, assess, and manage cyber threats. Cybersecurity comprises both the technologies and techniques used to protect information and the underlying systems. The proposed 120 credit hour program will add ten new required courses in cybersecurity. Existing degrees in Computer Science, Management Information Systems, and Political Science will support the proposed program and contribute to a 12-credit hour concentration in Cybersecurity.

RESOLVED, That the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board approves the Bachelor of Science in Cybersecurity with concentrations in Cybersecurity Strategic Policy; Management of Cybersecurity; and Cyber-Physical Security (CIP 11.1003; 120 credit hours) offered by the University of Central Arkansas, effective August 2018.

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Coordinating Board instructs the Director of the Arkansas Department of Higher Education to inform the President and Chair of the Board of Trustees of the University of Central Arkansas of the approval.

Approval of Academic Programs: Crowley's Ridge Technical Institute
to East Arkansas Community College

During the regular session of the General Assembly, Act 636 of 2017 set forth the process for a possible merger of Crowley's Ridge Technical Institute (CRTI) to East Arkansas Community College (EACC) if the institutions chose to merge. On July 25, 2017, the Board of Directors of CRTI voted to merge CRTI with EACC with a proposed effective date of August 1, 2017. On July 26, 2017, the Board of Trustees of EACC voted to approve/accept the offer by CRTI's Board to merge with EACC effective August 1, 2017. On July 31, 2017, the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board (AHECB) approved the merger of CRTI and EACC, effective August 1, 2017.

Over the past several months, Arkansas Department of Higher Education staff and the academic affairs officers from CRTI and EACC have discussed the process for the review and approval of the programs that are offered at the technical institute. The following recommendations listed on page two are presented to the Board for consideration. The certificates of proficiency and technical certificates will be added to EACC's AHECB's Approved Degree Programs inventory thereby providing assurance that students in these programs will be eligible to receive federal financial aid.

RESOLVED, That the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board approves the attached list of programs for East Arkansas Community College, effective August 2018.

Agenda Item No. 1 Economic Feasibility of Loan Issue Arkansas Tech University

Arkansas Tech University (ATU) requests approval of the economic feasibility of plans to obtain a loan from Centennial Bank in an amount not to exceed \$4 million with a term of up to fifteen (15) years at an annual interest rate not to exceed 3.0

percent. Proceeds from the bond issue will be used for educational and general (E&G) purposes. Arkansas Tech University Board of Trustees approved this financing at its meeting on May 17, 2018.

The E&G issue will be up to \$4 million with an annual debt service of \$335,066 and a term of up to fifteen (15) years. Proceeds, along with those from the \$1.1 million loan issue approved by the AHECB on July 27, 2018, will be used to finance an Energy Performance Project under the guidelines of the Arkansas Energy Performance Contracting (AEPC) Program overseen by the Arkansas Energy Office. The project includes campus-wide energy improvements to include campus HVAC controls and lighting. As required by the AEPC Program, these improvements will generate annual savings guaranteed by the Energy Service Company, which will exceed the total project cost (construction, equipment and financing). Coordinating Board policy regarding debt service for E&G projects provides that a maximum of 25 percent of net tuition and fee revenue less unrestricted E&G scholarship expenditures may be pledged to E&G debt service.

RESOLVED, That the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board considers economically feasible plans for Arkansas Tech University to issue bonds in a total amount, including this request for \$4 million as well as the prior \$1.1 million approved in July, not to exceed \$5.1 million, with a term of up to fifteen (15) years at an expected annual interest rate not to exceed 3.0 percent to finance an Energy Performance Project under the guidelines of the Arkansas Energy Performance Contracting (AEPC) Program overseen by the Arkansas Energy Office.

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Director of the Arkansas Department of Higher Education is authorized to notify the President and the Chair of the Board of Trustees of Arkansas Tech University of the Coordinating Board's resolution. There were no questions.

Dr. Olin Cook moved to approve Agenda Item No. 1. Dr. Jim Carr seconded the motion and the Board unanimously approved.

Report on the Financial Statements

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of the major fund of the Department of Higher Education, a department of Arkansas state government, as of and for the year ended June 30, 2017, and the related notes to the financial statements, which collectively comprise the Arkansas Department Higher Education's departmental financial statements as listed in the table of contents.

Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America; this includes the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

Auditor's Responsibility

Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit. We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free from material misstatement.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditor's judgment, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers internal control relevant to the entity's preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control. Accordingly, we express no such opinion. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the financial statements.

Emphasis of Matter

As indicated above, the financial statements of the Arkansas Department of Higher Education are intended to present the financial position, changes in financial position, and budgetary comparisons of only that portion of the major fund of the State that is attributable to the transactions of the Arkansas Department of Higher Education. They do not purport to, and do not, present fairly the financial position of the State as of June 30, 2017, changes in its financial position, and budgetary comparisons for the year then ended, in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America. Our opinion is not modified with respect to this matter.

Other Matters

Required Supplementary Information

The Governmental Accounting Standards Board requires that a Management's Discussion and Analysis be presented to supplement government-wide financial statements. However, as discussed in the "Emphasis of Matter" paragraph above, the financial statements of the Arkansas Department of Higher Education are only for the specific transactions and activity of the Agency and not for the State as a whole. Therefore, the Management's Discussion and Analysis is not required to be presented for the Arkansas Department of Higher Education individually. Our opinion on the departmental financial statements is not affected by the omission of this information.

Other Information

Our audit was conducted for the purpose of forming an opinion on the financial statements that collectively comprise the Arkansas Department of Higher Education's financial statements. The Schedule of Selected Information and Other General Information are presented for purposes of additional analysis and are not a required part of the departmental financial statements.

The Schedule of Selected Information and Other General Information have not been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the departmental financial statements, and accordingly, we do not express an opinion or provide any assurance on this information.

Other Reporting Required by Government Auditing Standards

In accordance with Government Auditing Standards, we have also issued our report dated July 19, 2018, on our consideration of the Arkansas Department of Higher Education's internal control over financial reporting and on our tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, grant agreements, and other matters. INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

Arkansas Department of Higher Education Legislative Joint Auditing Committee

We have audited, in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States, the financial statements of the major fund of the Arkansas Department of Higher Education (the "Agency"), a department of Arkansas state government, as of and for the year ended June 30, 2017, and the related notes to the financial statements, which collectively comprise the Arkansas Department of Higher Education's departmental financial statements, and have issued our report thereon dated July 19, 2018.

Internal Control Over Financial Reporting

In planning and performing our audit of the financial statements, we considered the Agency's internal control over financial reporting (internal control) to determine the audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances for the purpose of expressing our opinion on the financial statements but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the Agency's internal control. Accordingly, we do not express an opinion on the effectiveness of the Agency's internal control.

A deficiency in internal control exists when the design or operation of a control does not allow management or employees, in the normal course of performing their assigned functions, to prevent or detect and correct misstatements on a timely basis. A material weakness is a deficiency, or a combination of deficiencies, in internal control such that there is a reasonable possibility that a material misstatement of the entity's financial statements will not be prevented or detected and corrected on a timely basis. A significant deficiency is a deficiency, or a combination of deficiencies, in internal control that is less severe than a material weakness yet important enough to merit attention by those charged with governance.

Our consideration of internal control was for the limited purpose described in the first paragraph of this section and was not designed to identify all deficiencies in internal control that might be material weaknesses or significant deficiencies; therefore, material weaknesses or significant deficiencies may exist that have not been identified. Given these limitations, during our audit we did not identify any deficiencies in internal control that we consider to be material weaknesses. We did identify certain deficiencies in internal control, described in the accompanying Schedule of Findings and Responses, that we consider to be significant deficiencies that are described below in the Schedule of Findings and Responses as item 2017-1.

Compliance and Other Matters

As part of obtaining reasonable assurance about whether the Agency's financial statements are free from material misstatement, we performed tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, and grant agreements, noncompliance with which could have a direct and material effect on the determination of financial statement amounts. However, providing an opinion on compliance with those provisions was not an objective of our audit, and accordingly, we do not express such an opinion. The results of our tests disclosed no instances of noncompliance or other matters that are required to be reported under *Government Auditing Standards*.

SCHEDULE OF FINDINGS AND RESPONSES

2017-1

Agencies are required to record amounts due for student loans in accordance with Ark. Code Ann. § 19-2-304. Additionally, per Ark. Code Ann. § 19-2-305(a), "A state agency shall diligently and actively pursue the collection of their accounts and notes receivable." The Agency oversees several state-funded student loan programs. Students who receive the loans may be eligible to have the loans forgiven if they meet certain criteria; students not meeting the criteria are placed in repayment status. The Agency is required to maintain student loan subsidiary ledgers to track changes to total loan balances throughout the year. These subsidiary ledgers are then used to adjust loans receivables in AASIS during the fiscal year-end closing process.

Review of 60 active individual student loan files revealed the following deficiencies in loans receivable;

- Nine instances totaling \$83,567 in which student loan balances did not match the subsidiary ledgers, resulting in an overstated receivables balance.
- One \$10,000 student loan balance for which it was unclear if collection should have been pursued
 or if forgiveness was warranted due to no current contact made by the Agency.

Follow-up on prior-year audit deficiencies in active loans receivable revealed 5 of 9 deficiencies remained uncorrected as of the completion of fieldwork.

Review of 30 inactive student loan files revealed the following deficiencies in loans receivable:

- Four instances totaling \$18,000 of student loan balances that should have been placed into repayment status and collection pursued as a result of recipients not meeting the loan requirements.
- Four instances totaling \$1,831 in which student loan balances did not match the subsidiary ledgers, resulting in an understated receivables balance.
- One \$20,000 student loan balance that was believed to be added to the subsidiary ledger in error.

Follow-up on prior-year audit deficiencies in inactive accounts receivable revealed 5 of 9 deficiencies remained uncorrected as of the completion of fieldwork.

We recommend the Agency continue to review the subsidiary ledgers to ensure receivables are properly reported and actively pursued for collection. In addition, we recommend the Agency maintain procedures to ensure student loan files are regularly monitored and updated.

Management Response: The Department agrees with the finding. ADHE has dedicated a staff member full time as well as additional staff to correct the deficiency in the student loan programs. Once account ledgers have been reconciled, staff will ensure that AASIS and the subsidiary ledgers are balanced on a monthly basis and that the subsidiary ledgers are also balanced monthly with our servicing agent, Campus Partners. ADHE staff will also be auditing files for all student loan files with a remaining balance to verify all necessary documentation has been included in the file and that the proper loan status has been assigned.

Agency's Response to Findings

The Agency's response to the finding identified in our audit is described above. The Agency's response was not subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the financial statements, and accordingly, we express no opinion on it.

Purpose of this Report

The purpose of this report is solely to describe the scope of our testing of internal control and compliance and the results of that testing and not to provide an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control or on compliance. This report is an integral part of an audit performed in accordance with *Government Auditing Standards* in considering the entity's internal control and compliance. Accordingly, this communication is not suitable for any other purpose. However, pursuant to Ark. Code Ann. § 10-4-417, all reports presented to the Legislative Joint Auditing Committee are matters of public record, and distribution is not limited.

NOTE 1: Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

A. Reporting Entity/History

Act 38 of 1971, as amended, established the Arkansas Department of Higher Education, as a department of Arkansas state government, to provide greater coordination of financing the higher education program of the State, certifying new educational programs and new institutions of higher learning, and administering certain student financial aid programs.

Act 1114 of 1998 created the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board and transferred to it all the powers, duties, and functions of the State Board of Higher Education, effective May 1, 1998. The Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board consists of 12 members appointed by the Governor. Board members serve without compensation but may receive reimbursement for performing official duties at the rate established for state employees by state travel regulations in accordance with Ark. Code Ann. §§ 25-16-901, 25-16-908.

Act 565 of 2017 transferred the State Board of Private Career Education to the Department of Higher Education, effective March 22, 2017. The State Board of Private Career Education consists of seven members appointed by the Governor.

B. Basis of Presentation - Fund Accounting

The accounting system is organized and operated on a fund basis. A *fund* is defined as a fiscal and accounting entity with a self-balancing set of accounts recording cash and other financial resources, together with all related liabilities and residual equities or balances and changes therein, which are segregated for purposes of carrying on specific activities or attaining certain objectives in accordance with special regulations, restrictions, or limitations. The following types of funds, if applicable to this Agency, are recognized in the accompanying financial statements.

Governmental Funds

<u>General Fund</u> – General Fund is the general operating fund and is used to report all financial resources, except those required to be accounted for in another fund.

C. Basis of Accounting

Basis of accounting refers to when revenues and expenditures or expenses are recognized and reported in the financial statements. Financial statements for governmental funds are presented using the current financial resources measurement focus and the modified accrual basis of accounting. Revenues are recognized when they become both measurable and available. "Available" means collectible within the current period or soon enough thereafter to pay current liabilities (i.e., 45 days). Expenditures are generally recognized under the modified accrual basis when the related fund liability is incurred. Revenues from federal grants and federal reimbursements are recognized when all applicable eligibility requirements and the availability criteria of 45 days have been met.

D. Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include demand accounts, imprest accounts, cash on hand, cash in State Treasury, all certificates of deposit with maturities at purchase of 90 days or less, and all short-term instruments with maturities at purchase of 90 days or less. All short-term investments are stated at fair value.

E. Deposits and Investments

State Board of Finance Policies

Ark. Code Ann. § 19-4-805 requires that agencies holding monies not deposited in the State Treasury, other than the institutions of higher learning, abide by the recommendations of the State Board of Finance. The State Board of Finance promulgated cash management, collateralization, and investments policies and procedures, effective July 14, 2012, as referenced in the Financial Management Guide issued by the Department of Finance and Administration for use by all state agencies.

The stated goal of state cash management is the protection of principal, while maximizing investment income and minimizing non-interest earning balances. Deposits are to be made within the borders of the State of Arkansas and must qualify for Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation (FDIC) deposit insurance coverage. Policy requires a minimum of four bids to be sought on interest-bearing deposits in order to obtain the highest rate possible.

Policy states that funds are to be in transactional and non-transactional accounts as defined in the Financial Management Guide. Funds in excess of immediate expenditure requirements (excluding minimum balances) should not remain in non-interest bearing accounts.

State Board of Finance policy states that cash funds may only be invested in accounts and investments authorized under Ark. Code Ann. §§ 19-3-510, -518. All noncash investments must be held in safekeeping by a bank or financial institution. In addition, all cash funds on deposit with a bank or financial institution that exceed FDIC deposit insurance coverage must be collateralized. Collateral pledged must be held by an unaffiliated third-party custodian in an amount at least equal to 105% of the cash funds on deposit.

Deposits

Deposits are carried at cost and consist of cash in bank and cash in State Treasury totaling \$5,156,340 and \$20,524,725, respectively. State Treasury Management Law governs the management of funds held in the State Treasury, and the Treasurer of State is responsible for ensuring these funds are adequately insured and collateralized.

<u>Custodial Credit Risk</u> – Custodial credit risk for deposits is the risk that, in the event of the failure of a depository institution, the Agency will not be able to recover deposits or will not be able to recover collateral securities that are in the possession of an outside party. The Agency has adopted the State Board of Finance Policy requiring the use of depository insurance and collateralization procedures to manage the risk that deposits may not be returned. As of June 30, 2017, none of the Agency's bank balance of \$5,156,340 was exposed to custodial credit risk.

Investments

Except for certain interest-earning investment contracts and money market investments, investments are reported at fair value based on quoted prices in active markets for identical assets.

Nonparticipating contracts (certificates of deposit) and participating interest-earning investment contracts that have a remaining maturity at the time of purchase of one year or less are reported at amortized cost. Changes in the fair value of investments are recognized as revenue in the operating statements.

For purposes of the statement of cash flows, all highly liquid investments with maturity of three months or less when purchased are considered to be cash equivalents.

Interest Rate Risk – Interest rate risk is the risk that changes in interest rates will adversely affect the fair value of an investment. The Agency does not have a formal investment policy that limits investment maturities as a means of managing its exposure to fair value losses arising from increasing interest rates. The summary shown above indicates that none of the Agency's investment maturities are one year or longer.

<u>Credit Risk</u> – Credit risk is the risk that an issuer or other counterparty to an investment will not fulfill its obligations. The Agency has adopted the State Board of Finance Policy that limits investment choices to certificates of deposit, repurchase agreements, treasury bills, treasury notes, and securities issued by the State of Arkansas and its political subdivisions. The Agency's exposure to credit risk as of June 30, 2017, is as follows:

F. Interfund Balances and Transfers

Interfund receivables and payables arise from interfund transactions and are recorded by all funds affected in the period in which transactions are executed. Details of interfund transfers are disclosed in the financial statements.

G. Prepaid Expenses

Prepaid expenses generally represent the cost of consumable supplies on hand or unexpired services at year-end. The cost of these items is included with expenditures at the time of purchase. Prepaid expenses, as reported in the general fund financial statements, are also recorded as a nonspendable component of fund balance indicating that they do not constitute "available, spendable financial resources."

H. Deferred Outflows of Resources and Deferred Inflows of Resources

Deferred outflows of resources represent a decrease of net position that applies to future periods. Thus, these items will not be recognized as an outflow of resources (an expense or expenditure) until a future period.

Deferred inflows of resources represent an increase of net position that applies to future periods. These items will not be recognized as an inflow of resources (revenue) until a future period.

I. Fund Equity

Fund Balance

In the financial statements, fund balance is reported in one of five classifications, where applicable, based on the constraints imposed on the use of the resources.

The nonspendable fund balance includes amounts that cannot be spent because they are either (a) not in spendable form (e.g., prepaid items, inventories, long-term amount of loans and notes receivables, etc.) or (b) legally or contractually required to be maintained intact.

The spendable portion of fund balance, where applicable, comprises the remaining four classifications: restricted, committed, assigned, and unassigned.

Restricted fund balance. This classification reflects constraints imposed on resources either (a) externally by creditors, grantors, contributors, or laws or regulations of other governments or (b) by law through constitutional provisions or enabling legislation.

Committed fund balance. These amounts can only be used for specific purposes according to constraints imposed by legislation of the General Assembly, the government's highest level of decision-making authority. Committed amounts cannot be used for any other purpose unless the General Assembly removes or changes the constraint by the same action that imposed the constraint.

Assigned fund balance. This classification reflects amounts constrained by the State's "intent" to be used for specific purposes but are neither restricted nor committed. The General Assembly has the authority to assign amounts to be used for specific purposes by legislation or approved methods of financing.

Unassigned fund balance. This amount is the residual classification for the general fund.

When more than one spendable classification is available for use, it is the State's policy to use the resources in this order: restricted, committed, assigned, and unassigned.

J. Budgetary Data

The State utilizes an annual budgeting process with budget amounts initially derived from the previous fiscal year's funded allocation. In accordance with the appropriations and funding provided by the Legislature, individual state agencies have been charged with the responsibility of administering and managing their programs as authorized by the Legislature. Agencies are also charged with the responsibility of preparing an annual operations plan as a part of the budgetary process for the operation of each of their assigned programs. State law provides for the establishment of a comprehensive financial management system that includes adequate controls over receipts, expenditures, and balances of Agency funds. It is mandated that this system include a modified accrual system, conform with generally accepted governmental accounting principles, and provide a reporting system whereby actual expenditures are compared to expenditures projected in the Agency's annual operation plan.

NOTE 2: Transfer of State Board of Private Career Education to the Department of Higher Education

Act 565 titled "An Act to Transfer the State Board of Private Career Education to the Department of Higher Education," enacted in the 2017 Regular Session of the 91st General Assembly, will restructure the Agency by adding the State Board of Private Career Education and was effective upon approval by the Governor due to the Emergency Clause. Act 565 was signed and approved by the Governor on March 22, 2017. The fund balance combined at that time is presented as an other financing source in the Statement of Revenues, Expenditures, and Changes in Fund Balance. All other activities of the State Board of Private Career Education for the period subsequent to the transfer through the end of fiscal year 2017 are presented in aggregate with those of the Arkansas Department of Higher Education.

A. Capital Assets

Capital assets purchased and in the custody of this Agency were recorded as expenditures at the time of purchase. Assets with costs exceeding \$5,000 and an estimated useful life exceeding one year are reported at historical cost, including ancillary costs (such as professional fees and costs, freight costs, preparation or setup costs, and installation costs). Infrastructure or public domain fixed assets (such as roads, bridges, tunnels, curbs and gutters, streets and sidewalks, drainage systems, and lighting systems) are also capitalized. Gifts or contributions are generally recorded in the accounts at acquisition value at the time received. Acquisition value is the market value if the Agency would have purchased the item. In accordance with current accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America, general capital assets and depreciation are reported in the State's "Government-Wide" financial statements but are not reported in the governmental fund financial statements. Depreciation is reported for proprietary fund capital assets based on a straight-line method, with no salvage value. Estimated useful lives generally assigned are as follows:

B. Pension Plan

Arkansas Public Employees Retirement System

<u>Plan Description</u> – The Agency contributes to the Arkansas Public Employees Retirement System (APERS), a cost-sharing, multiple-employer defined benefit pension plan administered by the APERS Board of Trustees. APERS provides retirement and disability benefits, annual redetermination of benefit adjustments, and survivor benefits to plan members and beneficiaries. The Constitution of Arkansas, Article 5, vests with the General Assembly the legislative power to enact and amend benefit provisions of APERS as published in Chapters 2, 3, and 4 of Title 24 of the Arkansas Code Annotated. APERS issues a publicly available financial report that includes financial statements and required supplementary information. This report may be obtained by writing to Arkansas Public Employees Retirement System, One Union National Plaza, 124 West Capitol, Little Rock, Arkansas, 72201 or by calling 1-501-682-7855.

<u>Funding Policy</u> — Contributory plan members are required to contribute 5% of their annual covered salary. The Agency is required to contribute for all covered state employees at the rate of 14.50% of annual covered payroll. The contribution requirements of plan members are established and may be amended by the Arkansas General Assembly. The contribution requirements of the Agency are established and may be amended by the APERS Board of Trustees. The Agency's contributions to APERS for the years ended June 30, 2017, 2016, and 2015, were \$225,067, \$230,322, and \$240,482, respectively, equal to the required contributions for each year.

Arkansas Teacher Retirement System

<u>Plan Description</u> – The Agency contributes to the Arkansas Teacher Retirement System (ATRS), a cost-sharing, multiple-employer defined benefit pension plan administered by the ATRS Board of Trustees. ATRS provides retirement and disability benefits, annual redetermination of benefit adjustments, and survivor benefits to plan members and beneficiaries. The Constitution of Arkansas, Article 5, vests with the Arkansas General Assembly the legislative power to enact and amend benefit provisions of ATRS as published in Chapter 7 of Title 24 of Arkansas Code Annotated. ATRS issues a publicly-available financial report that includes financial statements and required supplementary information. This report may be obtained by writing to Arkansas Teacher Retirement System, 1400 West Third Street, Little Rock, Arkansas 72201 or by calling 1-800-682-1517.

<u>Funding Policy</u> – Contributory plan members are required to contribute 6% of their annual covered salary. The Agency is required to contribute for all covered state employees at the rate of 14% of annual covered payroll. The contribution requirements of plan members and the Agency are established and may be amended by the Arkansas General Assembly. The Agency's contributions to ATRS for the years ended June 30, 2017, 2016, and 2015, were \$73,699, \$46,312, and \$43,544, respectively, equal to the required contributions for each year.

Teachers Insurance and Annuity Association/College Retirement Equities Fund

<u>Plan Description</u> – The Agency participates in the Teachers Insurance Annuity Association/College Retirement Equities Fund (TIAA/CREF), a defined contribution plan. The plan is a 403(b) program as defined by the Internal Revenue Service Code of 1986 as amended, and is administered by TIAA/CREF. TIAA is an insurance company offering participants a traditional annuity with guaranteed principal and a specific interest rate plus the opportunity for additional growth through dividends. CREF is an investment company that offers a variable annuity. Arkansas Code Annotated authorizes participation in the plan.

<u>Funding Policy</u> – TIAA/CREF has contributory and non-contributory plans. Contributory members are required to contribute at least 6% of earning to the plan. The Agency contributes 10% of earnings for members. The Agency's contributions for the years ended June 30, 2017, 2016, and 2015 were \$28,330, \$51,797, \$59,298, respectively, equal to the required contributions for each year.

C. Compensated Absences - Employee Leave

Annual leave is earned by all full-time employees. Upon termination, employees are entitled to receive compensation for their unused accrued annual leave up to 30 days. Liabilities for compensated absences are determined at the end of the year based on current salary rates.

Sick leave is earned by all full-time employees and may be accrued up to 120 days. Compensation up to a maximum of \$7,500 for unused sick leave is payable to employees upon retirement.

Compensated absences are reported in the State's "government-wide" financial statements but are not reported as liabilities or expenditures in the governmental funds. However, the compensated absences payable attributable to this Agency's employee annual and sick leave as of June 30, 2017 and 2016, amounted to \$203,817 and \$246,871, respectively. The net changes to compensated absences payable during the year ended June 30, 2017, amounted to \$43,054.

D. General Obligation Bonds Long-Term Debt

The Constitution of the State does not limit the amount of general obligation bonds that the State may issue; however, no such bonds may be issued unless approved by the voters of the State at a general election or a special election held for that purpose. Principal, interest, and paying agent fees are recorded as debt service expenditures when due. When a bond is issued, the face amount of the debt is recorded as an other financing source, and the bond premium, discount, and/or issuance cost is recognized. Premiums and discounts are recorded as other financing sources and uses, respectively. Issuance costs are recorded as debt service expenditures.

In accordance with current accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America, the liability; deferred premiums, discounts, and/or issuance costs; and amortization of deferred premiums, discounts, and/or issuance costs are reported in the State of Arkansas' Comprehensive Annual Financial Report, the State's "government-wide" financial statements, but are not reported in the governmental fund financial statements.


Details of general obligation bonds outstanding are as follows:

Higher Education General Obligation Bond — Act 1282 of 2005 authorized the State to issue Higher Education General Obligation Bonds. All bonds issued under the authority of this Act are direct general obligations of the State and are secured by an irrevocable pledge of the full faith, credit, and resources of the State. The Act limited the total principal amount to approximately \$250 million. However, the total outstanding principal amount of Higher Education General Obligation Bonds issued under Act 1282 of 2005 and the College Savings Bond Act of 1989 shall not have scheduled debt service payments on a combined basis in excess of \$24 million in any one fiscal year. The Higher Education General Obligation Bonds were issued to provide funds to finance technology and facility improvements for state institutions of higher education and to refund certain outstanding bonds. The bonds are payable from the net general revenues of the State and investment earnings on the proceeds of the bonds. During the 2017 fiscal year, an \$83.2 million bond refunding of previously issued bonds was issued under this Act.


REPORT ON ACADEMIC PROGRAM DELETIONS Academic Year 2017-2018

This report provides summary and detailed information about program deletions during Academic Years 2014 – 2018.


In AY2018, colleges and universities deleted 104 programs as compared to 69 in AY2017, 46 deletions in AY2016, 43 deletions in AY2015, and 40 deletions in AY2014. Of the 104 programs deleted in AY2018, 83 were from 2-Year Colleges while 21 programs were offered at 4-Year Universities.




Of all program deletions in AY2018, 88 percent were for Associate Degrees, Technical Certificates, and Certificates of Proficiency. Only 13 programs deleted were for Bachelor's degrees or higher-level credentials.

ANNUAL STATUS REPORT FOR SEXUAL ASSAULT PREVENTION ON CAMPUS (ACT 563 OF 2017)

Under Act 563 of 2017, the Higher Education Coordinating Board was to develop an action plan to address the prevention of sexual assault. ADHE communicated this to the 33 institutions of higher education and asked them what their plans were. This information was then relayed to the AHECB and reported to the House and Senate Chairs of Education Committees and the House and Senate Chairs of the Committees of Public Health, Welfare, and Labor. We have collected the annual campus status reports for the 2017–2018 academic year, as required by the legislation. The legislative requirements for the action plan direct Arkansas public colleges and universities:

- 1) To incorporate sexual assault prevention into advising and student orientation;
- 2) To integrate information into academic courses as appropriate;
- 3) To identify opportunities to raise awareness and provide resources for sexual assault prevention across the entire student population;
- 4) To identify available grants and partnerships to assist with the work;
- 5) To collaborate with sources for access to care; and
- 6) To identify other topics or issues relating to the prevention and reduction of sexual assault.

During the legislative committee discussion on the bill, institutions of higher education testified that this information was already being reported to the federal government under the Clery Act. (The Clery Act is a federal law that requires colleges and universities to submit crime statistics to the USDOE. The list of included crimes was expanded to include stalking, intimidation, dating violence, domestic violence, sexual assault and hate crimes that happen on or around campuses. A reporting of crime prevention efforts is not required.) The bill's sponsor agreed to a friendly amendment that allows campuses to share the prevention portion of their efforts, if included in their Clery reports, to ADHE in fulfillment of Act 563.

Highlights from these reports will be shared during the presentation to the Board.

UNPLANNED PREGNANCY PREVENTION ANNUAL REPORT

Under Act 943 of 2015 the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board (AHECB) was directed to develop an action plan to address unplanned pregnancies on college campuses. In the uncodified portion of the legislation the high rate of unplanned pregnancy among older teens of college age was addressed and institutions of higher education were called upon to act. ADHE has collected the campus implementation reports for 2017-2018.

Act 943 requires the ADHE to report annually to the Chairs of the Senate and House Committees on Public Health, Welfare, and Labor and to the Chairs of the Senate and House Education Committees on the status of the action plans from all public two and four-year colleges and universities. The Arkansas Department of Higher Education has collected reports from all 11 public four year universities in the state and all 22 two year colleges. The reports show that all campuses are in compliance with Act 943.

The legislation directs higher education institutions in nine areas (listed in their entirety at the end of this report.) Among those directives, colleges and universities are to identify methods of addressing the problem of unplanned pregnancy, to collaborate with health centers, to identify a measure of success, and to incorporate into academic coursework "as appropriate". *The legislation mandates that campuses include in their orientation information on the prevention of unplanned pregnancy.*

The implementation reports will be scanned and posted on the ADHE website for campuses to use as they look for additional ways to address this important issue.

In addition to meeting the mandate, some noteworthy activities for 2017-2018 were reported, and are highlighted below.

Universities

Arkansas Tech University had ongoing programming throughout the school year that began with resident hall director training on health services available for students, including birth control. A fall workshop and a sexual responsibility week in February offered training and presentations that informed students about abstinence, safe sex and preventing unplanned pregnancy. Notably, a campus produced online magazine that included several topics related to unplanned pregnancy and sexual health had over 3,500 visits.

Henderson State University's campus health center works with the local Department of Health to obtain contraceptives for students and their APRN has implemented a priority oral contraception policy which helps students in need of

birth control, but unable to get an immediate appointment. The APRN assists not only with a temporary prescription, but with finding a provider for future women's health visits. Their health center screens all student patients for sexual health, drug/alcohol abuse and depression. The campus is also engaged in year round activities that include mentor programs, training, and online lesson plans. They report integrated unplanned pregnancy content into 17 different academic courses.

At **Southern Arkansas University**, every student who sees a nurse or nurse practitioner, regardless of ailment, receives information about unplanned pregnancy. The campus provides data on the statistics for unplanned teen pregnancy to parents attending freshman orientation. Parents are made aware that their students will be provided with resources for preventing unplanned pregnancy throughout the school year. First year seminar unplanned pregnancy information is shared via the first year seminar classes. As requested in item #4 in the legislation, SAU is including unplanned pregnancy counseling conversations with their Upward Bound students.

At **UA Fort Smith** a resource list is shared with parents of incoming students that includes nearby resources for health and other human services. Actual workshops for pregnancy prevention were held as part of their multi-day immersion experience for new students. Residence halls had themes each month hash tagged #UMatter with bulletin boards decorated accordingly. January and February both had health and pregnancy prevention as themes.

UA Little Rock's activities included a number of activities in their residence halls aimed at prevention, including the distribution of 4 x 6 cards on birth control to every student resident. They have incorporated material into their first year experience course. UA Little Rock also collaborated with ADHE to present at the Partners for Student Success Conference with a program titled "Preventing Unplanned Pregnancies on Your Campus in 140 Characters or Less." This presentation was aimed at spreading awareness of the legislation and promoting campus activities for compliance. Notably, Health Services at UA Little Rock are able to offer eligible students long acting contraceptives by expanding their third-party billing and certification of their APRNs.

Two-year Colleges

ASU-Mid South has utilized their first year experience course to impress upon students the challenges an unplanned pregnancy can bring to completing a college credential. They took students to the East Arkansas Family Health Center and familiarized them with the services offered there. An annual campus health fair in the spring and the campus-wide unplanned pregnancy fall event distributed information on unplanned pregnancy. ASU-Mid South developed

programs for their athletes and partnerships with Home Visiting Services to reach more students with unplanned pregnancy information.

College of the Ouachitas has incorporated the unplanned pregnancy material into freshman experience courses by devoting a full class period to the delivery of medically accurate prevention information. The instructor is conducting pretests and post-tests to gauge student learning. "Student-parents" participate in various panels where they talk about the challenges of parenting while in college. All incoming students who indicate that they are also parents are screened for participation in the Career Pathways Initiative, for Healthy Family resources, and encouraged to apply for the CADC Single Parent Scholarship.

At **UACC Hope-Texarkana**, information was incorporated on unplanned pregnancy into their first year experience course; they conducted an awareness campaign in conjunction with the Arkansas Department of Health; and partnered with 1st Choice Pregnancy Resource Center for their abstinence program and adoption referral services. They worked with Hope Academy of Public Service 9th grade class with college preparedness and a discussion on unplanned pregnancy. UAHT has applied for a grant (as encouraged in the legislation) to move to a professional advising model which will have an emphasis on life coaching and include unplanned pregnancy prevention.

While the challenge of preventing unplanned pregnancy for students in college will undoubtedly remain, ADHE is pleased to report 100% compliance with Act 943. We are of the belief that the legislation has directed college campuses to take a more proactive approach to addressing the issue. Helping students to learn more and to make them aware of resources can only increase their likelihood of completing college, without the interruption that an unplanned pregnancy typically brings. ADHE will continue to work with campuses as needed, with the hope of greater student success.

Requirements of Act 943 of 2015

The action plans of these public colleges and universities must address the following:

- 1. Incorporation of unplanned pregnancy prevention information for students into student orientation and student advisors' unit plan on school campuses.
- 2. Integrate information that is recognized as medically accurate by the American Congress of Obstetricians and Gynecologists about the prevention of unplanned pregnancy into academic courses if and when appropriate, including without limitation abstinence education.

- **3.** Identification of opportunities to raise awareness and provide resources about the prevention of unplanned pregnancies across the student population.
- **4.** Identify opportunities for current students to reach out to younger teens to serve as mentors or role models of successful behaviors and healthy choices, including opportunities for outreach during summer vacation or during traditional after-school hours for grades kindergarten through twelve (K-12).
- 5. Identify private or federal grants available to address the prevention of unplanned pregnancy and promote student success, including any partnerships necessary to compete for such grants.
- **6.** Collaboration with the Department of Health or federally qualified health centers to promote access to care.
- 7. Identify child care, transportation, financial aid and other challenges specific to existing single parents.
- 8. Identify a method to measure effectiveness.
- **9.** Identify other topics or issues relating to the prevention and reduction of unplanned pregnancies among older teens.

REPORT ON AHECB POLICY FOR MAINTENANCE OF NEW FACILITIES

The AHECB policy for maintenance of new facilities, passed October 29, 2010, states that a report on the amount transferred to plant funds would be presented annually at the October Board meeting. This policy was proposed to ensure that in the future all newly constructed or purchased facilities would have a source of funding for maintenance of the new facility. Institutions seeking approval of a loan or a bond issue for the construction or purchase of a new facility must provide for the maintenance of that facility by transferring annually to plant funds an amount as recommended by the Association of Physical Plant Administrators of Universities and Colleges (APPA). This is currently \$2.50 per gross square foot for an educational and general facility or \$1.25 per gross square foot for an auxiliary facility. A lower rate per gross square foot for a specific building/facility can be approved with appropriate justification.

It is the expectation that the institution provide for the long term maintenance of the facility for which the funds were accrued. Funds may be utilized for facility renovation and upkeep including upgrade or replacement of equipment and furnishings of the designated building. These funds will be transferred to the plant fund annually and shall begin in the fiscal year following the completion and occupancy of the facility and will continue as long as the building is in use. The funds can also be used for critical and deferred maintenance of the institution. This report includes the status of the FY2016-17 and FY2017-18 maintenance transfers.

The University of Arkansas System (UA-SYS) requests approval of the economic feasibility of plans to secure a loan up to \$27.0 million with a term of ten (10) years at an annual interest rate not to exceed 4.0 percent. Proceeds from the loan will be used for educational & general (E&G) purposes. The University of Arkansas Board of Trustees approved this financing at its meeting on September 14, 2018.

The auxiliary issue will be approximately \$27.0 million with an annual debt service of approximately \$3,110,896 and a term of ten (10) years. Proceeds from the loan will be used for the implementation costs of the Workday Enterprise Resource Planning (ERP) system. The debt service on the loan issue will be supported by E&G revenues derived from billings to the campuses/units for administrative support including legal services, internal audit and risk management. Coordinating Board policy regarding debt service provides fee revenue should be no less than 120 percent of the estimated total annual debt service.

The above data demonstrates that the University of Arkansas System has sufficient billing revenue to support an E&G loan issue of approximately \$27.0 million with a term of ten (10) years at an estimated annual interest rate not to exceed 4.0 percent.

In accordance with board policy, any proceeds from bonds that require AHECB approval, which are used for the purchase or construction of new facilities, and result in additional square footage are subject to the AHECB maintenance policy as adopted in October, 2010. The above project does not provide additional square footage.

ADHE Executive Staff recommends that the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board approve the following resolution:

RESOLVED, That the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board considers economically feasible plans for the University of Arkansas to secure a loan up to exceed \$27.0 million with a term of ten (10) years at an estimated interest rate not to exceed 4.0 percent for E&G purposes for the implementation costs of the Workday ERP system.

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Director of the Arkansas Department of Higher Education is authorized to notify the President and the Chair of the Board of Trustees of University of Arkansas of the Coordinating Board's resolution.

ECONOMIC FEASIBILITY OF BOND ISSUES UNIVERSITY OF CENTRAL ARKANSAS

The University of Central Arkansas requests approval of the economic feasibility of plans to issue bonds not to exceed \$57.315 million with a maximum term of thirty (30) years at an estimated annual interest rate not to exceed 5.00 percent. Proceeds from the bond issue will be used for education and general (E&G) and auxiliary purposes. The University of Central Arkansas Board of Trustees will vote on this financing at its meeting on October 18, 2018.

The E&G issue will be up to \$45.17 million with an annual debt service of \$2,760,000 and a term of thirty (30) years. Proceeds from this bond issue will be used to (1) proceed with the planning, design, and construction of an approximately 80,000 sq. ft. Integrated Health Sciences Building; (2) fund the improvement, renovation, equipping and/or furnishing of information technology infrastructure; and (3) acquire various real property. The debt service bond issue will be supported by tuition and fee revenue. Coordinating Board policy regarding debt service for E&G projects provides that a maximum of 25 percent of tuition and fee revenue, may be pledged to E&G debt service.

The above data demonstrates that the University of Central Arkansas has sufficient tuition and fee revenue to support an E&G bond issue of up to \$45.17 million with a term of thirty (30) years at an estimated annual interest rate not to exceed 5.00 percent.

The auxiliary issue will be up to \$12.145 million with a term of thirty (30) years and an annual debt service of \$765,000. Proceeds from the bond issue will be used to (1) renovate the existing State and Carmichael residence halls and (2) complete brick remediation and roof replacement for portions of Bernard Hall. The debt service on the auxiliary bond issue will be supported by auxiliary revenues generated through student housing/rent, meal plans sold to students, as well as other dining revenue generated through direct sales to faculty, staff, students and campus guests. Coordinating Board policy regarding debt service for auxiliary projects provides that annual auxiliary revenues should be no less than 120 percent of total annual housing debt service.

The above data demonstrates that the University of Central Arkansas has sufficient auxiliary revenue to support a bond issue of approximately \$12.145 million with a term of thirty (30) years at an estimated annual interest rate not to exceed 5.00 percent.

In accordance with Coordinating Board's policy, the University of Central Arkansas will sustain a building maintenance fund to be supported by tuition and fee revenue for the E&G facilities. These funds will be held in a separate account for the maintenance of the new facilities by transferring annually to plant funds based on the Association of Physical Plant Administrators (APPA) of Universities and Colleges recommendation. The current APPA recommendation is \$2.50 per gross square foot for E&G facilities and \$1.25 for auxiliary facilities. The projects of the E&G issue provide additional square footage to the campus of 80,000 sq. ft. for the Integrated Health Sciences facility. The construction related to Information Technology Refresh results in no additional square footage. Therefore, based on an estimate of 80,000 new square footage for all projects (as they are completed over the next few years), \$200,000 will be transferred annually beginning in the fiscal year after the projects are placed into service. For auxiliary projects, based on the 103,340 combined square feet of State and Carmichael, \$129,175 will be transferred annually.

ADHE Executive Staff recommends that the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board approve the following resolution:

RESOLVED, That the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board considers economically feasible plans for the University of Central Arkansas to issue bonds in an amount not to exceed \$57.315 million with a term of thirty (30) years at an estimated interest rate not to exceed 5.00 percent for E&G purposes to (1) proceed with the planning, design, and construction of an approximately 80,000 sq. ft. Integrated Health Sciences Building; (2) fund the improvement, renovation, equipping and/or furnishing of information technology infrastructure; and (3) acquire various real property. For auxiliary purposes to (1) renovate the existing State and Carmichael residence halls and (2) complete brick remediation and roof replacement for portions of Bernard Hall.

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Director of the Arkansas Department of Higher Education is authorized to notify the President and the Chair of the Board of Trustees of the University of Central Arkansas and the President of the University of Central Arkansas of the Coordinating Board's resolution.

REPORT OF 2017-18 INTERCOLLEGIATE ATHLETIC REVENUES AND EXPENDITURES

Act 245 of 1989 (A.C.A. §6-62-106) directed the Coordinating Board to develop and establish uniform accounting standards and procedures for reporting revenues and expenditures. Based on these standard definitions and formats, the Coordinating Board is to collect the financial data and provide a uniform report of each institution's athletic revenues and expenditures for the previous fiscal year to the Legislative Joint Auditing Committee and the public by November of each year.

Athletic revenues and expenditures for 2017-18 for each institution have been collected according to uniform standards and compiled in a summary report that follows this agenda item. An explanation of the reporting format follows:

- 1. The athletic report details revenues and expenditures for each institution.
- 2. Athletic revenues will match athletic expenditures unless there is an ending fund balance.
- 3. Act 366 of 1991 (A.C.A. § 6-62-804) prohibits athletic deficits. A designated athletic fee must be charged to the students by the institution if athletic-generated revenues (i.e., ticket sales, media/tournament/bowl, concessions/program sales, and game guarantees), foundations/clubs and other private gifts, other athletic income, auxiliary profits, and the allowable educational and general transfer do not cover the total expenditures for athletics.
- 4. In accordance with the uniform reporting and auditing of intercollegiate athletic expenditures of state-supported institutions of higher education, maintenance of facilities expenditures related to all intercollegiate teams and spirit groups, excluding bands, shall be reported as actual costs of operating such athletic facilities or a proration of actual costs based on athletic usage (A.C.A. § 6-62-807).

The 2017-18 total amount of athletic expenditures reported by state-supported universities is \$188,954,411 and two-year colleges is \$607,886. The statewide total is \$189,562,297 – an increase of \$12,899,183 (7.3%) from \$176,663,114 in 2015-16.

A comparison of 2017-18 actual expenditures to 2017-18 budgeted revenues certified to the Coordinating Board in July 2017 is also illustrated at the bottom of the summary chart. Certified budgeted expenditures for 2017-18 totaled

\$184,152,271 for all institutions. Total actual expenditures for 2017-18 for all institutions exceeded this budgeted amount by 2.9% percent. Actual expenditures varied from the Board of Trustees-certified budgeted expenditures by a range of 18 percent over the budgeted amount to 24 percent under the budgeted amount.

The following resolution is presented for the Board's consideration:

RESOLVED, That the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board accepts the Report of 2017-18 Intercollegiate Athletic Revenues and Expenditures as prepared in accordance with Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board uniform accounting standards and definitions for athletic reporting.

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Coordinating Board authorizes the Director to transmit the Report of 2017-18 Intercollegiate Athletic Revenues and Expenditures to the Legislative Joint Auditing Committee according to the provisions of A.C.A. §6-62-106.

TECHNICAL CERTIFICATE IN PARAMEDIC ASSOCIATE OF APPLIED SCIENCE IN PARAMEDIC ARKANSAS STATE UNIVERSITY – NEWPORT

ADHE Executive Staff Recommendation

RESOLVED, That the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board approves the Technical Certificate in Paramedic (CIP 51.0904; 48-52 credit hours) and the Associate of Applied Science in Paramedic (CIP 51.0904; 61 credit hours) offered by Arkansas State University - Newport, effective Spring 2019.

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Coordinating Board instructs the Director of the Arkansas Department of Higher Education to inform the President and Chair of the Board of Trustees of Arkansas State University System and the Chancellor of Arkansas State University – Newport of the approval.

Program Justification

The proposed Technical Certificate and Associate of Applied Science in Paramedic will provide students with the skills, knowledge, and clinical experience required to provide safe and effective pre-hospital care. Graduates will be prepared to work in hospitals, emergency rooms, and fire departments. The program integrates classroom, laboratory, and applied clinical practice that follows the standard curriculum of the Arkansas Department of Heath for paramedic education. The proposed program will collaborate with local fire departments, hospitals and emergency departments for medical, trauma, and specialty rotations. Students are required to pass a national board exam to practice as a paramedic in Arkansas. ASUN will pursue national accreditation from the Committee on Accreditation of Educational Programs for the Emergency Medical Services Professions (COAEMSP) following approval by the Arkansas Department of Health Division of Emergency Medical Services (EMS).

ASUN offers the Certificate of Proficiency in Emergency Medical Technician (EMT). Eighteen students graduated from the EMT program in the Spring 2018, and twelve or 66% of this cohort indicated an interest in pursuing the proposed paramedic program if it were available. Surveys were sent to employers including the Newport Fire Department, Emerson Ambulance Service and the Medic One Ambulance service to determine current and future openings in this field. Findings indicated that there are 10 current openings for EMT/Paramedics and a projected 10 to 20 openings in the next three to five years. Salaries average \$30,000 per year.

According to COAEMPS accreditation standards, one new faculty member will be hired as a program director who has at least a Bachelor's Degree. Additional full-time faculty will be hired who have at least an Associate's Degree. Program funding will come primarily from tuition and fees. Students may qualify for scholarships from employers in return for a work commitment.

Program Justification

The proposed welding technology programs will prepare students for entry-level employment as welders. Students will gain proficiency to weld metals using processes including material processing, welding and cutting, SMAW, GMAW, and GTAW. Further, students will learn to follow safe practices in performing welding tasks. The Certificates of Proficiency and Technical Certificate in welding will allow graduates to continue their academic pathway to obtain an Associate of Applied Science in Welding Technology.

Welding Technology is a degree designation for College of the Ouachitas (COTO) on the Arkansas Future Program Approved Degree list for 2018-19. The proposed degrees are an effort to address the identified need for the service area. Surveys were sent to Dock Leveling Manufacturers (DLM), West Fraser, Prospect Steel, and C.G. Rosanne LLC. Employers' responses indicated that there was a need for over 60 welders currently and over 70 in the next three to five years. Entry-level salaries would range from \$15 to \$17 per hour.

COTO will utilize the services of its High School Career Center Advisory Committee for these proposed programs. COTO currently offers several welding courses through its High School Career Center Welding Program. The creation of the Associate of Applied Science in Welding Technology will provide those high school students with a more, developed career pathway in this field. In addition to the hiring of a full-time instructor in Fall 2019, sixteen welding stations will be added with the existing twenty-four. The proposed programs will be housed in the recently acquired CAST Building. Perkins funding will equip the lab. Program funding will come primarily from tuition and fees.

UNIVERSITY OF ARKANSAS SYSTEM eVersity

The University of Arkansas Board of Trustees approved the establishment of the University of Arkansas System eVersity on March 24, 2014. eVersity is a 100 percent online institution created to serve students who are unable to access traditional higher education campuses. On October 31, 2014, the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board admitted eVersity as an organizational unit of the University of Arkansas System. The AHECB recognized eVersity to offer degrees in collaboration with and under the authority of existing institutions in the University of Arkansas System. The Board acknowledged eVersity's collaborative approach with its member institutions as it sought independent accreditation; the Board also recognized that when accreditation is obtained, degree authority would reside with eVersity. The University of Arkansas System eVersity would like to secure independent listing of its programs and recognition by the Arkansas Department of Higher Education. Currently, its programs are listed through the University of Arkansas at Monticello. eVersity is also currently seeking approval for independent accreditation through the United States Department of Education of the programs listed below. This approval will allow eVersity to be able to offer Title IV funds to students. Based on approval by the AHECB, the programs will be listed independently under eVersity on the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board's Approved Degree Programs list.

CARROLL COUNTY CENTER NORTH ARKANSAS COLLEGE

The administration and Board of Trustees of North Arkansas College (NAC) request Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board to recognize an off-campus instructional site in Carroll County, to be called the North Arkansas College—Carroll County Center (The Center). NAC is also requesting Coordinating Board approval to offer remedial/developmental education courses in addition to courses required for the following degree programs: Associate of Arts in General Studies, Certificate of General Studies, Associate of Science in Business, Associate of Applied Science in Business Administration, Technical Certificate in Accounting, Technical Certificate in Computer Support Technician, Certificate of Proficiency in Administration Medical Assistant and the Certificate of Proficiency in Nursing Assistant. These programs will be offered via a combination of online and onsite delivery. NAC has had an educational presence in Carroll County for the last ten years offering concurrent credit classes, Adult Education courses, and English as a Second Language (ESL) courses. The center also has a bilingual staff member to help students and parents.

The Carroll County Center is located at 804 West Freeman, Berryville, Arkansas. Approximately 6,800 square feet, the Center is comprised of three general purpose classrooms, one CNA lab classroom, a distance delivery computer lab classroom with 15 computer stations, one distance delivery general purpose classroom, a student resource room, and five office spaces. The Center is staffed by an Operations Coordinator, Adult Education staff (two full-time; six part-time), part-time IT support, and an Educational Opportunity Center Counselor (one day per week). Student support services will be available onsite during registration periods. The Center can accommodate approximately 200-300 students each semester via onsite and distance delivery.

NAC leases the building in Berryville for \$43,200 annually. The three-year lease ends on June 30, 2021.

TECHNICAL CERTIFICATE IN MASSAGE THERAPY UNIVERSITY OF ARKANSAS – RICH MOUNTAIN

ADHE Executive Staff Recommendation

RESOLVED, That the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board approves the Technical Certificate in Massage Therapy (CIP 51.3501; 38 credit hours) offered by the University of Arkansas – Rich Mountain, effective Spring 2019.

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Coordinating Board instructs the Director of the Arkansas Department of Higher Education to inform the President and Chair of the Board of Trustees of the University of Arkansas System and the Chancellor of the University of Arkansas – Rich Mountain of the approval.

Program Justification

The proposed Technical Certificate in Massage Therapy will provide students with skills and techniques to help with pain management, expedite the healing of injuries, improve circulation, promote relaxation, and support the general wellness of a client. Trained massage therapists utilize touch to manipulate the muscles and other soft tissues of the body in order to treat clients. Massage therapy encompasses many different techniques for various health-related purposes and is considered a part of complementary and alternative medicine.

The proposed program is driven by input from prospective employers in the region and a nine-member Advisory Committee composed of licensed massage therapists, cosmetologists, physical therapists, and physical education trainers who started meeting in March 2018.

The curriculum is designed to cover topics such as anatomy and physiology relevant to the field of massage therapy, hygiene and sanitation, ethics, law, water therapies, massage techniques, and the business aspects of owning and operating a massage therapy salon or spa. The Arkansas Department of Health (ADH) provides approval and oversight of the program and facilities. ADH also issues licenses for massage therapists. To practice massage therapy in Arkansas, one must be licensed.

Surveys were sent to 30 local and regional businesses. Fourteen of those businesses (46%) responded. Survey results indicated that there was a need for this occupation in the region. Employers who responded that have job openings for these graduates include Inside & Out Wellness Junction (Hot Springs); Fit Factory (Little Rock); Cutting Room & Company (DeQueen); Lottie-Da's Salon & Spa (Mena); Sacred Touch Massage Therapy, LLC (Mena); Friends & Company Salon (Mena); The Open Door (Mena); Tammy Parnell (Mena); Trista Hicks (Mena); Ginger Hale (DeQueen); and Cathy McEntire (Mena). Additionally, there are over 82 cosmetology salons, 50 resorts/hotels and multiple spa facilities within UARM's three-county service area that could be potential employers of these graduates. Results from student surveys indicated that UARM students and cosmetologists are strongly interested in this program.

A faculty coordinator/principal instructor will be hired according to ADH requirements. Instructional facilities include a dedicated massage therapy classroom and clinical facilities in the cosmetology building according to ADH guidelines. UARM's library has adequate materials to support the proposed certificate program. Projected, tuition and fees are expected to cover the costs of the program.

Agreement

It is agreed that any student who has earned the Associate of Science in Business Administration at SAUT will be admitted to the Bachelor of Science in International Business; the Bachelor of Science in Global Supply Chain Management; the Bachelor of Science in Management; the Bachelor of Science in Computer Information Technology; the Bachelor of Science in Business Economics; the Bachelor of Science in Business Administration; the Bachelor of Science in Accounting; the Bachelor of Science in Education in Business Technology; or the Bachelor of Arts in Economics at ASUJ with full junior classification, subject to the provisions listed below.

Admission Requirements

- The student must complete the requirements necessary for general admission to ASUJ as well as specific admission to the programs listed above.
- The student will have earned the Associate of Science in Business Administration at SAUT.
- Degree program admission requirements for students who transfer pursuant to this Agreement will be determined in the same manner as if their initial enrolment had been at ASUJ.

Transfer of Credits

- Course requirements for this Agreement are listed in the 2+2 agreements.
- A transfer student who has not completed all of the courses specified within the Associate of Science in Business Administration degree plan at SAUT, before entering ASUJ must work with an academic advisor to ensure timely completion of degree program requirements.
- Current and updated copies of catalogs/curricular requirements for the programs listed above will be available to SAUT online.

 Remedial course grades will not be computed in the cumulative GPA for purposes of admission to ASUJ.

Implementation and Review

- The Chief Academic Officers at each institution will implement the terms of this Agreement, including incorporation of any mutually agreed upon changes into subsequent revisions of this Agreement, assuring compliance with system policy, procedure and guidelines.

 The student will have earned the Associate of Science in Liberal Arts at UACCM with at least a 2.0 cumulative grade point average, on or after the Effective Date of this Agreement.

Transfer of Credits

- Course requirements for this Agreement are displayed in the 2+2 Degree Plan Checklist listed above.
- A transfer student who has not completed all of the courses specified within the
 Associate of Science in Education degree plan at UACCM as stipulated on the degree
 plan checklist, before entering UALR, must work with an academic advisor to ensure
 timely completion of degree program requirements before entering into the 2+2
 agreement.
- Remedial course grades will not be computed in the cumulative GPA for purposes of admission to UALR.
- UALR will accept the transfer of credits, up to a maximum of 6 credit hours, for "D" grades subject to conditions.

Admission Requirements

- The student must complete the requirements necessary for general admission to UALR, as well as specific admission to the Bachelor of Science in Information Science program.
- The student will have earned the Associate of Science in Liberal Arts & Sciences at UAPTC with at least a 2.0 cumulative grade point average, on or after the Effective Date of this Agreement.

Transfer of Credits

- Course requirements for this Agreement are displayed in the 2+2 Degree Plan Checklist listed above.
- A transfer student who has not completed all of the courses specified within the
 Associate of Science in Liberal Arts & Sciences degree plan at UAPTC as stipulated on
 the degree plan checklist, before entering UALR, must work with an academic advisor
 to ensure timely completion of degree program requirements before entering into the
 2+2 agreement.
- Remedial course grades will not be computed in the cumulative GPA for purposes of admission to UALR.
- UALR will accept the transfer of credits, up to a maximum of 6 credit hours, for "D" grades subject to conditions.

• Calculation of overall GPA for purposes of graduation and awarding of honors will be in accordance with UALR policy.

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- The Chief Academic Officers at each institution will implement the terms of this Agreement, including incorporation of any mutually agreed upon changes into subsequent revisions of this Agreement, assuring compliance with any applicable policies, procedures and guidelines.
- This Agreement will be reviewed on an annual basis by representatives from both institutions; both UALR and UAPTC agree to notify one another in a timely manner of any curriculum changes that would significantly impact the nature of this Agreement.
- UALR and UAPTC will work together cooperatively, in the best interest of affected students, to resolve any issues related to the transfer of courses should changes to either degree program occur while the Agreement is in effect.
- Students will be subject to the terms and conditions of this Agreement in accordance with their academic year of entry at UAPTC. A student may opt for a subsequent revision of this Agreement, but must meet all of the requirements specified therein.
- UALR and UAPTC will make every effort to inform students of this Agreement. This
