Minutes of Meeting

The Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board held a special meeting on Thursday, July 27, 2017, at Cossatot Community College of the University of Arkansas in Ashdown. Vice Chair Dr. Jim Carr called the meeting to order at 4:00 p.m.

Vice Chairman Carr welcomed presidents and chancellors to the special board meeting and thanked everyone for attending.

He then introduced new AHECB member Keven Anderson and his wife Lisa.

Agenda Item No. 1 Report on 2016 Fall College-Going Rate

The college-going rate measures the proportion of students enrolling in postsecondary education in the fall semester after finishing high school, in most cases, immediately after high school. Since most students enrolling in postsecondary education do so immediately after completing high school, the college-going rate is an indicator of the total proportion that will or did enroll in

postsecondary education. The percentage, therefore, reflects the accessibility of higher education as well as students' assessments of the value of attending college when compared to working, entering the military, traveling, or following other pursuits.

Dr. Marla Strecker reported that Arkansas experienced a 1.3% decrease (from 51.0% to 49.7%) in the 2016 College-Going Rate (CGR) of public high school graduates. It should be noted that almost half of these are due to the number of public high school graduates dropping by 0.7% (equivalent to 218 students).

Over five years, the share of CGR students at 4-Year Universities has decreased from 33.0 percent (2012) to 30.2 percent (a decrease of 2.8 percentage points). The share of CGR students at 2-Year Colleges has decreased from 18.2 percent (2012) to 15.7 percent (a decrease of 2.5 percentage points). The share of CGR students at Private/Independent Institutions has increased from 1.7 percent to 3.9 percent (an increase of 1.2 percentage points).

Of all CGR students (2016 public high school graduates), the majority enrolled in public 4-Year Universities. These represent decrease of 1.7% for 4-Year Universities, a decrease of 0.4% for 2-Year Colleges, and an increase of 2.3% for Private/Independent institutions from last year's CGR by Institution Type.

Greg Revels voiced concern regarding the drop in college-going rate percentage. He asked if there was any way the Coordinating Board could see the numbers to determine if there is an actual decrease or if the students have left Arkansas instead.

Dr. Marla Strecker said that the data is available; however, it is very expensive to purchase from the Clearing House.

Vice Chairman Carr pointed out that the national rate was twenty percentage points higher than Arkansas. He then asked if it included private school graduates.

Dr. Strecker said that students that go to private schools have a higher collegegoing rate. However, we receive our data from ADE and they do not collect private school data. Dr. Strecker noted that the national data does include the private school data and that is why their numbers are higher.

Greg Revels asked if the data in the report is consistent over the past five years. Dr. Strecker said it is.

Agenda Item No. 2 Concurrent Enrollment Policy

Carr explained that because the concurrent enrollment policy is an action item and requires a quorum to approve, it was moved to the July 28 agenda.

Minutes of Meeting

The July 28, 2017, regular meeting of the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board (AHECB) was held at Cossatot Community College of the University of Arkansas in Ashdown (UA Cossatot). Chair Sherrel Johnson called the meeting to order at 8:30 a.m. with a quorum present.

Presidents, chancellors, institutional representatives, members of the press, and quests were also present.

Chair Sherrel Johnson introduced new Coordinating Board member Keven Anderson and welcomed him to his first official board meeting. Mr. Anderson thanked Chair Johnson and said it is an honor to serve on the Coordinating Board.

Johnson then introduced Dr. Steve Cole, President of UA Cossatot, for a welcome. Cole began by thanking everyone for coming to the Ashdown campus of UA Cossatot. He noted that the Ashdown campus is the smallest of the three Cossatot campuses and is geared mainly towards technical training. Dr. Cole discussed the model used by UA Cossatot to impact workforce education in Southwest Arkansas.

Chair Johnson asked if Dr. Cole had retention numbers on the students that matriculated into the industries. Dr. Cole said he would get the information for chair Johnson.

Chair Johnson thanked Dr. Cole for his welcome.

Agenda Item No. 1 Approval of Minutes

Dr. Charles Allen moved to approve Agenda Item No. 1. Greg Revels seconded the motion and the Board unanimously approved.

Agenda Item No. 2 Director's Report

ADHE Staff Changes

Dr. Markham began by announcing a couple of new staff changes. Starting May 18, Program Specialist Angela Lasiter is acting interim program director for the Career Pathways Program. Mason Campbell began on July 31 as a new program specialist for Academic Affairs.

Institutional Leadership Changes

Markham announced that Dr. Kelly Damphousse, who served as dean or interim dean of the College of Arts and Sciences at the University of Oklahoma in Norman since 2013, began his duties as chancellor at A-State on July 1. He succeeds interim chancellor Dr. Doug Whitlock.

Agency Projects

Between now and December, ADHE will review all of their higher education policies and will update them on the ADHE website.

Act 365, placed the classification, compensation and benefits authority of employees of institutions of higher education under ADHE and away from the Office of Personnel Management (OPM). ADHE staff are working on this transition, said Markham.

Project Pipeline Repair Initiative

Dr. Esther J. Robinson, University of Arkansas Pine Bluff Assistant Professor, presented information regarding a grant the institution received for Project Pipeline Repair: Restoring Minority Male Participation and Persistence in Educator Preparation Programs. The grant funded by the W.K. Kellogg Foundation will fund the development and implementation of academic enrichment opportunities to prepare underrepresented male high school juniors and seniors for success in a postsecondary educator preparation program. This is in response to a growing national crisis – the absence of a critical mass of African-American and Latino males to meet the needs of states' increasingly diverse P-12 classrooms. It is a research-based strategy that also responds to states' needs to address escalating teacher shortages and gaps in student achievement.

Annual Faculty Performance Review

Dr. Marla Strecker reported that ADHE staff is required to monitor faculty evaluation processes adopted at Arkansas public institutions and report annually to the AHECB and Legislative Council.

Dr. Charles Allen asked if the reviews changed often. Dr. Strecker said, no.

Greg Revels said, if the reviews don't change, does that mean the board isn't doing anything. Strecker said the board is still holding the institutions accountable.

Agenda Item No. 3 Student Placement into General Education Core Courses

In accordance with A.C.A. §6-61-110, the Arkansas Department of Higher Education (ADHE) will address the placement standards necessary for enrollment of students into mathematics, English composition, and reading based on appropriate indicators of potential student success rates.

ADHE Executive Staff recommend that the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board approve the following resolution:

RESOLVED, That all institutions must adopt appropriate placement measures which are supported by student success data.

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board approves the policy on Student Placement into General Education Core Courses.

Dr. Jim Carr moved to approve the review of Agenda Item No. 3. Dr. Charles Allen seconded the motion and the Board unanimously approved.

Agenda Item No. 3b Concurrent Enrollment Policy

Arkansas law allows for the enrollment of high school students in college-level courses under certain conditions. Concurrent enrollment allows students to obtain credit toward a high school diploma at the same time they earn college credit.

AHECB Resolutions (Adopted July 26, 2013, Effective Fall 2013)

RESOLVED, That the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board approves the policy amendment on concurrent enrollment effective Fall 2013. The concurrent enrollment policy outlines the guidelines for concurrent program participation; however, Arkansas state-supported colleges and universities are

not required to participate in a concurrent enrollment program; and a high school/school district may choose to partner with more than one Arkansas college/university for concurrent courses.

FURTHER RESOLVED, That any Arkansas state-supported college or university that chooses to participate in a concurrent enrollment program with a public school district, private high school, or home-school student shall implement and administer the concurrent program in accordance with the policies of the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board and the rules of the Arkansas State Board of Education.

FURTHER RESOLVED, That any college or university that chooses to participate in a concurrent enrollment program must be accredited by the National Alliance of Concurrent Enrollment Partnerships (NACEP) or must be authorized by Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board no later than August 1, 2015. A college/university not offering concurrent courses currently must have AHECB initial authorization for the institutional concurrent enrollment program prior to the offering of concurrent courses.

FURTHER RESOLVED, That Arkansas state-supported colleges and universities will not participate with Arkansas Early College High School (AECHS) in the delivery of blended AP/concurrent courses for college credit.

FURTHER RESOLVED, That Arkansas state-supported colleges and universities will not participate with AECHS in the offering of single courses for multiple higher education institutions.

FURTHER RESOLVED, That ADHE staff will review, in cooperation with the Arkansas Department of Education, the blended AP/concurrent course offerings throughout the state to determine if these courses are in keeping with the concurrent enrollment policy as outlined in this agenda item.

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Coordinating Board instructs the ADHE staff to submit an annual report on concurrent course enrollment to the Board which will include institutional data on concurrent course offerings and locations, and could include ADHE Executive Staff Recommendations for policy amendments on the administration, continuance, and funding of the concurrent enrollment program.

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Coordinating Board instructs the Director of the Arkansas Department of Higher Education to provide a copy of the amended policy to presidents and chancellors, academic affairs officers, students affairs officers, and institutional research officers at Arkansas state-supported colleges and universities.

Dr. Jim Carr moved to approve the review of Agenda Item No. 3b. Greg Revels seconded the motion and the Board unanimously approved.

Economic Feasibility of Loan Issue
Arkansas State University – Beebe
Arkansas State University – Newport

Arkansas State University System on behalf of Arkansas State University-Beebe and Arkansas State University-Newport, requests approval of the economic feasibility of plans to obtain a loan from the College Savings Bond Revolving Loan Fund not to exceed \$1.1 million with a term of up to fifteen (15) years at an annual interest rate not to exceed 1.31 percent. Proceeds from the loan will be used for educational and general (E&G) purposes. Arkansas State University Board of Trustees approved this financing at its meeting on June 8, 2017.

RESOLVED, That the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board considers economically feasible plans for Arkansas State University System on behalf of Arkansas State University-Beebe and Arkansas State University-Newport to obtain a loan from the College Savings Bond Revolving Loan Fund not to exceed \$1.1 million with a term of up to fifteen (15) years at an expected annual interest rate not to exceed 1.31 percent to provide needed campus-wide energy improvements to include lighting retrofits, water and waste management strategies, chiller upgrades as well as installation of other energy control mechanisms. A portion of the ASUN project includes installation of a solar panel array to generate renewable energy for the campus. As required by the AEPC Program, these improvements will generate annual savings guaranteed by the Energy Service Company, which will exceed the total project cost (construction, equipment and financing).

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Director of the Arkansas Department of Higher Education is authorized to notify the President and the Chair of the Board of Trustees of Arkansas State University System, and the Chancellors of Arkansas State University-Beebe and Arkansas State University-Newport of the Coordinating Board's resolution.

Chair Johnson asked if staff knew the total amount in the College Savings Bond Revolving Loan Fund, which is managed by the Arkansas Building Authority. ASU System Executive Vice President Julie Bates said she believes they will receive the last of the funds.

Keven Anderson moved to recommend the approval of Agenda Item No. 4 to the full Board for consideration. Sherrel Johnson seconded and the Committee approved.

Agenda Item No. 5
Economic Feasibility of Loan Issue
Arkansas State University – Beebe
Arkansas State University – Newport

Arkansas State University System on behalf of Arkansas State University-Beebe and Arkansas State University-Newport, requests approval of the economic feasibility of plans to obtain a loan not to exceed \$1.25 million with a term of up to ten (10) years at an annual interest rate not to exceed 0.00 percent. Proceeds from the loan will be used for educational and general (E&G) purposes. Arkansas State University Board of Trustees approved this financing at its meeting on June 8, 2017.

RESOLVED, That the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board considers economically feasible plans for Arkansas State University System on behalf of Arkansas State University-Beebe and Arkansas State University-Newport to obtain a loan not to exceed \$1.25 million with a term of up to ten (10) years at an expected annual interest rate not to exceed 0.00 percent to provide needed campus-wide energy improvements to include lighting retrofits, water and waste management strategies, chiller upgrades as well as installation of other energy control mechanisms.

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Director of the Arkansas Department of Higher Education is authorized to notify the President and the Chair of the Board of Trustees of Arkansas State University, and the Chancellors of Arkansas State University-Beebe and Arkansas State University-Newport of the Coordinating Board's resolution.

Greg Revels asked if both loans would repay themselves. Tara Smith said, yes. It is one big project using two different loan funds to support it.

Keven Anderson moved to recommend the approval of Agenda Item No. 5 to the full Board for consideration. Sherrel Johnson seconded and the Committee approved.

Agenda Item No. 6 Economic Feasibility of Bond Issue University of Central Arkansas

The University of Central Arkansas requests approval of the economic feasibility of plans to issue bonds not to exceed \$8.5 million with a term of thirty (30) years at an annual interest rate not to exceed 5.50 percent. Proceeds from the bond issue will be used for auxiliary purposes. The University of Central Arkansas Board of Trustees approved this financing at its meeting on May 12, 2017.

RESOLVED, That the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board considers economically feasible plans for the University of Central Arkansas to issue bonds in an amount not to exceed \$8.5 million with a

term of thirty (30) years at an estimated interest rate not to exceed 5.50 percent for auxiliary purposes to fund the design and renovation of two housing facilities.

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Director of the Arkansas Department of Higher Education is authorized to notify the President and the Chair of the Board of Trustees of the University of Central Arkansas of the Coordinating Board's resolution.

There were no questions.

Keven Anderson moved to recommend the approval of Agenda Item No. 6 to the full Board for consideration. Sherrel Johnson seconded and the Committee approved.

Agenda Item No. 7 Certification of Intercollegiate Athletic Revenues and Expenditures for 2017-18

A.C.A. §6-62-805 (Act 366 of 1991) requires each state-supported institution of higher education to annually certify by June 15 to the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board that its intercollegiate athletic program will generate sufficient revenues to meet expenditures or that any athletic deficit will be met by separate institutional board-sanctioned student athletic fees.

A.C.A. §6-62-804 requires that any student athletic fees assessed must be clearly defined in all publications and institutional board minutes, and listed separate and distinct from tuition or other student fees on student tuition and fee statements. All institutions assessing a student athletic fee have certified to the Department compliance with this requirement and have submitted copies of their student fee billing statements illustrating the disclosure of the athletic fee to each student.

RESOLVED, That the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board accepts the Certification of Intercollegiate Athletic Revenues and Expenditures Budgeted for 2017-18 as prepared in accordance with Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board uniform accounting standards and definitions for athletic reporting.

Chair Johnson questioned why UAM has a \$5 increase. Ms. Smith explained that this has been their first increase for some time. Their athletic budget is not growing by that amount, but they are projecting that their student athletic fees will have to make up a bigger portion of their athletic budget.

Greg Revels asked that as institutions deal with their athletic budgets that they do consider the students as much as possible.

Keven Anderson moved to recommend the approval of Agenda Item No. 7 to the full Board for consideration. Sherrel Johnson seconded and the Committee approved.

Agenda Item No. 8 Productivity-based Funding Distribution Policy

Due to recent adjustments, the productivity-based funding distribution policy has been delayed pending review by the presidents and chancellors. Then, a special meeting of the AHECB will be scheduled to review the policy.

Agenda Item No. 9 Institutional Certification Advisory Committee

Initial Program Certification-Distance Technology

RESOLVED, That pursuant to ACA §6-61-301, the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board grants initial certification to the institutions listed on pages 1-3 to offer the specified degree programs to Arkansas residents for a period of three years through December 31, 2020.

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Director of the Arkansas Department of Higher Education is authorized to notify the administration of said institutions that the certification of the degree programs requires the institution to notify the Arkansas Department of Higher Education whenever any of the following occurs: (1) major reorganization of the controlling body; (2) changes in the charter or incorporation documents of the institution; or (3) changes in the method of operation of the institution's programs in Arkansas.

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Coordinating Board instructs the Director to notify the administration of said institutions that any advertisement or published materials using the name of the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board or the Arkansas Department of Higher Education must contain the following statement:

Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board certification does not constitute an endorsement of any institution or program. Such certification merely indicates that certain criteria have been met as required under the rules and regulations implementing institutional and program certification as defined in Arkansas Code §6-61-301.

Dr. Jim Carr asked if Embry-Riddle Aeronautical University would be bringing in aircrafts to train students. Ms. Clemmer said she would find out.

Agenda Item No. 10 Nurse Anesthesia Option in the Doctor of Nursing Practice Arkansas State University Jonesboro

The Nurse Anesthesia Option in the Doctor of Nursing Practice (DNP) is a program that will be offered as a post baccalaureate or post master's professional registered nurse (RN) degree. The practice-focused doctoral program will prepare professional RN's for the nurse anesthesia role at the highest level of clinical nursing practice. In 2004, the American Associate of Colleges of Nursing (AACN) proposed that the DNP be the entry level for advanced practice nursing. In 2009, the Council on Accreditation of Nurse Anesthesia Education Programs (COA) mandated that all nurse anesthesia programs must be at the doctoral level by 2025. In October 2015, the COA mandated that all accredited programs must offer a doctoral degree for entry into practice by January 1, 2022. Currently, Arkansas State University offers the Master of Science in Nursing with an option in nurse anesthesia. This option will be required to change to the DNP degree plan to be in compliance with the COA's mandate.

RESOLVED, That the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board approves the Nurse Anesthesia Option in the Doctor of Nursing Practice (CIP 51.3818; 114 credit hours) offered by Arkansas State University - Jonesboro, effective Spring 2018.

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Coordinating Board instructs the Director of the Arkansas Department of Higher Education to inform the President and Chair of the Board of Trustees of Arkansas State University System and the Chancellor of Arkansas State University – Jonesboro of the approval. Program continuation is contingent on ASUJ meeting and maintaining program accreditation requirements of the Council on Accreditation of Nurse Anesthesia Education Programs.

Dr. Jim Carr asked what the total capacity of the new program would be. Dean of Liberal Arts at ASU-Jonesboro Dr. Gina Hogue said, thirty students the first year and every year for three years we will add 30 students (90 total). Ninety nine percent of those students are currently graduating at the Master's degree level are employed in the first six months of completion of the program.

Agenda Item No. 11 Bachelor of Science in Nuclear Medicine Henderson State University

The proposed Bachelor of Science in Nuclear Medicine Technology is a 120 credit hour program that is a collaboration between Henderson State University (HSU) and Baptist Health Schools-Little Rock (BHSLR). The proposed program will train students as nuclear medicine technologists to perform procedures using dedicated imaging equipment and detectors to perform functioning imaging in specialized areas such as nuclear cardiology, PET/CT and general nuclear medicine imaging. Students will complete the first three years at HSU and the final year at BHSLR.

RESOLVED, That the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board approves the Bachelor of Science in Nuclear Medicine Technology (CIP 51.0905; 120 credit hours) offered by Henderson State University, effective August 2017.

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Coordinating Board instructs the Director of the Arkansas Department of Higher Education to inform the President and Chair of the Board of Trustees of Henderson State University of the approval.

Bachelor of Science in Computer Engineering
University of Central Arkansas

The Bachelor of Science in Computer Engineering is a 126 semester credit hour program designed to prepare graduates to develop and adapt computer hardware for applications. The University of Central Arkansas (UCA) currently offers Bachelor of Science degrees in Computer Science and Information Systems; and the Bachelor of Business Administration in Management Information Systems that have a software emphasis with limited exposure to hardware. Software specialists are in high demand; there also is an unmet need for graduates in computer engineering who have a greater understanding of hardware systems. Further, existing Bachelor of Science degrees in Computer Science, Mathematics, and Physics will support the proposed program by providing some of the foundation and elective courses.

RESOLVED, That the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board approves the Bachelor of Science in Computer Engineering (CIP 14.0901; 126 credit hours) offered by the University of Central Arkansas, effective August 2017.

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Coordinating Board instructs the Director of the Arkansas Department of Higher Education to inform the President and Chair of the Board of Trustees of the University of Central Arkansas of the approval.

There were no questions.

Agenda Item No. 13 Master of Arts in Sport Management University of Central Arkansas

The proposed Master of Arts (MA) in Sport Management is a 30 semester credit hour program offered in an executive format for students who desire to enhance their knowledge base of sport management. The online only program will support students who are currently working and possess the desire to achieve an advanced degree to progress his/her career in the sport industry. Students will obtain knowledge in the sophisticated workings of the management, marketing, leadership, legal, and financial aspects of the sport industry. Graduates of UCA's MA in Sport Management will have a thorough understanding of the sport management industry with the ability to critically analyze data and situations involving various industry aspects in order to make betterinformed decisions; possess the skills to run a sport organization through different aspects of its operations (finance, decision-making, marketing, production, and leadership); and acquire the knowledge needed to understand both macro- and microlevel issues facing the sport management industry. Some of the employers who have jobs for these graduates and who responded to the Employer Needs Survey are the Arkansas Activities Association, Arkansas Travelers Baseball Club, Inc., Arkansas United Soccer Club, Fayetteville Parks & Recreation, and the Northwest Arkansas Naturals Baseball Club. These jobs range from coordinator to director positions at average salaries of \$50,000.

RESOLVED, That the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board approves the Master of Arts in Sport Management (CIP 31.0504; 30 credit hours) offered by the University of Central Arkansas, effective August 2017.

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Coordinating Board instructs the Director of the Arkansas Department of Higher Education to inform the President and Chair of the Board of Trustees of the University of Central Arkansas of the approval.

Chair Johnson asked how many students are enrolled on a regular basis in the four existing programs. Dr. Strecker said she would find out.

Dr. Jim Carr moved to recommend the approval of the review of Agenda Items No. 9 - 13 to the full Board for consideration. Dr. Olin Cook seconded and the Committee approved.

Letters of Notification and Letters of Intent

The Director of the Arkansas Department of Higher Education approved institutional requests for new programs not requiring Board action unless further review is requested by the Board. Greg Revels asked what is viability. Dr. Strecker said that in 1989, the AHECB adopted program productivity standards and established benchmarks of an average of 3 graduates per year over five years for undergraduate programs, 2 graduates per year for master's programs, and 1 graduate per year for doctoral programs. Programs identified as below the viability threshold will have two (2) *additional* years to meet the threshold or will be removed from the AHECB approved programs inventory.

Agenda Item No. 1
Merger of Crowley's Ridge Technical Institute to
East Arkansas Community College

Act 636 of 2017 sets forth the process for a possible merger of Crowley's Ridge Technical Institute (CRTI) to East Arkansas Community College (EACC) if the institutions choose to merge. The legislation governs the process of the merger of CRTI to EACC upon the approval of the Board of Directors of CRTI; the Board of

Trustees of EACC; and the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board (AHECB).

Upon approval of the merger, all statutory authority, powers, duties, functions, records, personnel, property, unexpended balances of appropriations, allocations, or other funds, including the functions of budgeting or purchasing, of CRTI shall be transferred to EACC. The Board of Directors of CRTI shall be abolished and the Board of Trustees of EACC shall assume the powers and duties of the Board of Directors of CRTI.

On July 25, 2017, the Board of Directors of CRTI voted to merge CRTI with EACC with a proposed effective date of August 1, 2017. On July 26, 2017, the Board of Trustees of EACC voted to approve/accept the offer by CRTI's Board to merge with EACC effective August 1, 2017. Upon approval of the merger by the AHECB, EACC will work with all accrediting bodies during the transition to reflect the merger. This merger will not cause EACC to request a change in their role and scope statement.

RESOLVED, That the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board hereby approves the merger of Crowley's Ridge Technical Institute to East Arkansas Community College, effective August 1, 2017.

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Director of the Arkansas Department of Higher Education is authorized to notify the President and the Chair of the Board of Trustees of East Arkansas Community College of the Coordinating Board's resolution.

Greg Revels asked why the AHECB had to approve the merger. Tara Smith replied that Act 636 of 2017 states that a merger or consolidation of a state-supported postsecondary vocational-technical institution with an existing community college, with a branch campus of a four-year institution, or with a four-year institution, is subject to the approval of the board of trustees of the existing community college or four-year institution and the AHECB.

Vice Chairman Carr noted the merger was approved by both the CRTI and EACC boards of Trustees.

Sam Sicard moved to approve Agenda Item No. 1. Dr. Michael Stanton seconded the motion and the Board unanimously approved.

Vice Chairman Carr thanked everyone for participating in the special meeting and announced that on Friday, August 4, the AHECB would have a special meeting to approve the productivity funding model. The next regular meeting would be October 27, 2017, at Arkansas State University in Mountain Home.

Agenda Item No. 1 Productivity Funding Distribution Policy

Act 148 of 2017 repealed the needs-based and outcome-centered funding formulas as prescribed in Arkansas Code § 6-61-210, Arkansas Code § 6-61-224, Arkansas Code § 6-61-228, Arkansas Code § 6-61-229, Arkansas Code § 6-61-230, and Arkansas Code § 6-61-233, and amended Arkansas Code § 6-61-234. The Act directs the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board (AHECB) to adopt polices developed by the Department of Higher Education (ADHE) necessary to implement a productivity-based funding model for state-supported institutions of higher education.

Dr. Maria Markham explained the timeline going forward. First, the Attorney General's Office will review the three funding policies (metrics 2-year, metrics 4-year, and distribution policy). Then, the Governor will review. Next, ADHE will file with the Bureau of Legislative Research triggering a 30-day comment period. Hopefully, the policy will be placed on the joint education community agenda by September 18, and placed on the ALC rules subcommittee by October 17. The policy will return to the AHECB for final adoption and first funding recommendations during the October 27 AHECB meeting.

This policy will be reviewed every three years to ensure that productivity funding distribution continues to respond to the needs and priorities of the state. However, if it is determined that the funding distribution framework created unintended consequences, this policy will be reviewed immediately.

Greg Revels asked if the board was merely approving the review of the policy, today. Dr. Markham said that was correct. The policy would come back before the board in October for adoption.

Greg Revels moved to approve the review of the productivity funding distribution policy. Dr. Jim Carr seconded the motion and the Board unanimously approved.

With no further comments, the meeting adjourned at 11:13 a.m.

REPORT OF THE DIRECTOR

2017 Year in Review

A lot has happened in the past year since Dr. Maria Markham began as Director of the Arkansas Department of Higher Education (ADHE) on August 15, 2016. Here are a few highlights.

Governor Asa Hutchinson and ADHE launched the Arkansas Future (ArFuture) scholarship program. This program was created to promote higher education, increase the skills and education of Arkansas's workforce, and attract students to high-demand, high-wage occupations. The scholarship will cover tuition and fees for eligible students in qualifying Associate's and Certificate programs at public institutions of higher education.

The University of Arkansas at Pine Bluff (UAPB) was awarded the Project Pipeline Repair: Restoring Minority Male Participation and Persistence in Educator Preparation Program's grant. Funded by the W.K. Kellogg Foundation, the grant will supply the development and implementation of academic enrichment opportunities to prepare underrepresented male high school juniors and seniors for success in a postsecondary educator preparation program. This is in response to a growing national crisis – the absence of a critical mass of African-American and Latino males to meet the needs of states' increasingly diverse P-12 classrooms. It is a research-based strategy that also responds to states' needs to address escalating teacher shortages and gaps in student achievement.

Act 565 of 2017, directed the Arkansas State Board of Private Career Education (ASBPCE) to transfer all authority, powers, duties, functions, records, personnel and property to the Department of Higher Education. The ASBPCE was established to provide consumer protection for students that enroll in private post-secondary career schools. Alana Boles is now program director for private career and out-of-state education at ADHE.

Act 148 was enacted by the 91st General Assembly, and was signed into law by Governor Asa Hutchinson on February 8, 2017. The purpose of Act 148 of 2017 was to adopt a productivity-based funding model for state supported institutions of higher education. Governor Hutchinson issued the following statement when he signed the bill into law:

"When I was elected Governor, I made it a goal for my administration to increase the percentage of Arkansans who attain post-secondary degrees from 40% to 60% by 2025. With the legislature's passing of the new Productivity Funding Formula, we have taken an important step toward achieving that goal.

This new formula will be based upon student progress rather than student enrollment. This shift in focus will encourage and empower our students to successfully attain their degree, license or certificate in a timely manner. I am thrilled that the legislature has approved this measure, and I look forward to continued work with the Department of Higher Education and our state's colleges and universities to make Arkansas a leader in student success."

The productivity funding formula consists of four categories: Effectiveness (80% of formula), Affordability (20% of formula), Adjustments, and Efficiency (+/-2% of formula).

Director Visits Philander Smith College

Dr. Roderick Smothers, PSC President, shared the College's history and mission with Markham while expressing his excitement about the College's new vision for the future. He also expressed his continued eagerness to collaborate with ADHE and other state agencies to solve some of Arkansas' challenges around education, health care, community engagement and the economy.

The wide-ranging conversation also covered topics related to remediation, college affordability and efforts designed to address the teaching shortage in Arkansas. After which, Dr. Smothers led Markham on a tour of the campus in which she was able to meet and engage with several members of the Philander Smith faculty and student body.



Academic Affairs Officers Meet to Discuss Academic Policies

On September 14, Mason Campbell and ADHE staff members welcomed Academic Affairs Officers (AAO) to discuss numerous issues including the productivity funding formula, degree and gateway exceptions and child maltreatment plans. The AAO quarterly meeting assembled a comprehensive list of the most effective policies, programs and practices that can be employed on our campuses to foster greater student success.

ADHE participants were: Director Maria Markham, Deputy Director Tara Smith and numerous other staff.






Arkansas Digital Government Transformation Awards

Financial Aid

Arkansas Future Grant Program

Policy Statement

These rules shall be known as the Arkansas Department of Higher Education Rules Governing the Arkansas Future Grant Program. This policy addresses the student eligibility criteria, method for recipient selection, continuing eligibility requirements, procedures for making payments to an approved institution of higher education, and other administrative procedures necessary for operation of the program.

Applicable Arkansas Code

Ark. Code Ann. 6-82-1801 ET. Seq.

Definitions

- (1) "Approved institution of higher education" means an institution of higher education approved by the Department of Higher Education to participate in the Arkansas Future Grant Program and that is:
 - (A) A state-supported two-year or four-year college or university;
 - (B) A state-supported technical institute; or
 - (C) An approved state-supported school of nursing;
- (2) "Approved state-supported school of nursing" means a state-supported school of nursing with its primary headquarters located in Arkansas that:
 - (A) Prepares students as registered nurses;
 - (B) Grants nursing diplomas;

- (C) Is eligible to participate in the federal student aid programs of the Higher Education Act of 1965, 20 U.S.C. § 1070 et seq.;
- (D) Is approved by the Arkansas State Board of Nursing;
- (E) Has been approved by the Department of Higher Education as eligible to participate in the Arkansas Future Grant Program; and
- (F) Is not a two-year or four-year college or university;
- (3) "Federal student financial assistance" means scholarships or grants awarded to a student as a result of:
 - (A) An approved Free Application for Federal Student Aid, including without limitation a Pell Grant; or
 - (B) The student's or other family member's service in the United States Armed Forces, including without limitation the Army National Guard or Air National Guard:
- (4) "Private scholarship" means a scholarship or grant awarded by a private entity or donor; and
- (5) "Regional high-demand field" means any field of study identified as in demand by the Arkansas Department of Workforce Services as published on its annual regional Projected Employment Opportunities List or any field of study identified as high demand by an approved institution of higher education and approved by the Department of Higher Education.
- (6) "State-supported student financial assistance" means a state-supported scholarship, grant, tuition waiver, or tuition reimbursement funded with state funds or net proceeds from the state lottery awarded by:
 - (A) The Department of Higher Education; or
 - (B) A scholarship or grant awarded by an approved institution of higher education in this state funded, in whole or in part, by state funds, including without limitation:
 - (i) Scholarships awarded on the basis of entrance exam scores or high school academic achievement;
 - (ii) Tuition waivers based on age, military service, occupation, or other factors;

- (iii) Performance scholarships for band, musical performing groups, arts, theater, forensics, and similar activities that are not awarded on the basis of entrance exam scores or high school academic achievement; and
- (iv) Any other publicly funded program under which students are not charged or are reimbursed by the approved institution of higher education for tuition, fees, books, or other costs of attendance.

Procedures

Eligibility Requirements.

- (a) A student is eligible for an Arkansas Future Grant if the student is an Arkansas resident who:
 - (1) Meets one (1) of the following requirements:
 - (A) Has either:
 - (i) Graduated from an Arkansas:
 - (a) Public high school;
 - (b) Private high school; or
 - (c) Home school under § 6-15-501 et seq.; or
 - (ii) Received a high school equivalency diploma approved by the Department of Career Education; or
 - (B) Verifies that he or she has resided in Arkansas for the three (3) years immediately preceding application for the grant and has either:
 - (i) Graduated from an out-of-state:
 - (a) Public high school;
 - (b) Private high school; or
 - (c) Home school recognized by another state; or
 - (ii) Received a high school equivalency diploma approved by another state;
 - (2) Is enrolled part-time or full-time at an approved institution of higher education in a program of study that leads to an associate degree or a certification in a:
 - (A) Science, technology, engineering, or mathematics field, including computer science; or
 - (B) Regional high-demand field; and

(3) Has completed and submitted to the United States Department of Education a Free Application for Federal Student Aid or a subsequent application required by the United States Department of Education for federal financial aid.

Continuing Eligibility Requirements.

- (a) A student may continue to be eligible until the student has:
 - (1) Received the grant for five (5) academic semesters;
 - (2) Obtained an associate degree;
 - (3) Failed to maintain satisfactory academic progress, as determined by the approved institution of higher education in which the student is enrolled; or
 - (4) Failed to complete the mentoring or community service requirements under the Grant Recipient Responsibilities section of this rule.

Grant Award Amounts.

- (a) (1) An Arkansas Future Grant shall be in an amount equal to the tuition, fees, and other charges incurred by a student who meets the requirements under the Eligibility Requirements and Continuing Eligibility Requirements sections of this rule to attend an approved institution of higher education less the amount the student receives in:
 - (A) State-supported student financial assistance;
 - (B) Federal student financial assistance; and
 - (C) Private scholarships.
 - (2) If the approved institution of higher education in which the student is enrolled is a four-year institution of higher education, the total amount of tuition, fees, and other charges under subdivision (a)(1) of this section shall be calculated as the average cost of tuition, fees, and other charges at approved institutions of higher education that are two-year institutions of higher education.
- (b) The Department of Higher Education shall disburse the grant directly to the approved institution of higher education.
- (c) The department shall award grants under this rule in the order in which the department receives applications from eligible students and based on availability of funds.

Grant Hold.

(a) (1) The Department of Higher Education may approve a grant hold for a period of twenty-four (24) months or less.

- (2) The reasons for a grant hold may include without limitation:
 - (A) A medical condition of the student or a member of the student's immediate family that, on the basis of a physician's good-faith judgment, necessitates the student or the student's immediate family member to be hospitalized or receive outpatient or home-based medical care or to recuperate until released by the attending physician;
 - (B) A personal or family emergency that requires the student to:
 - (i) Attend the funeral of an immediate family member; or
 - (ii) Visit a relative of the student if the relative has a medical condition in which death is possible or imminent;
 - (C) Military service under § 6-61-112; or
 - (D) (i) A commitment of twelve (12) to twenty-four (24) months for service in a national or international humanitarian project sponsored by a nonprofit corporation organized with a charitable or educational purpose.
 - (ii) The student's commitment shall be expressed in a written agreement with the nonprofit organization including the terms of completion for the student's service on the related project.
 - (iii) The department shall release a grant hold if the department determines that the student did not complete the commitment under the written agreement.

Grant Recipient Responsibilities.

- (a) A student who receives an Arkansas Future Grant shall enter into a written agreement with the Department of Higher Education to:
 - (1) (A) Receive monthly mentoring from a mentor from an organization determined by the Department of Higher Education.
 - (B) A mentor under subdivision (a)(1)(A) of this section shall:
 - (i) Receive annual mentoring training:
 - (a) Developed by the Department of Higher Education; and
 - (b) Provided by a local volunteer group approved by the Department of Higher Education; and

- (ii) Certify to the Department of Higher Education that at least one (1) time each calendar month the mentor has provided mentoring services by telephone, email, or in person to each student he or she is mentoring;
- (2) (A) Complete at least fifteen (15) hours of community service each semester the student receives a grant.
 - (B) (i) A student may select a community service project that meets requirements developed by the Department of Higher Education.
 - (ii) An approved institution of higher education may provide community services opportunities designed to benefit the approved institution of higher education community or the broader local community.
 - (C) A student shall certify his or her community service to the approved institution of higher education by the last regular day of the semester the student received the grant; and
- (3) (A) Reside in this state for three consecutive (3) years and be employed beginning within six (6) months after receiving an associate degree or a certification.
 - (B) The Department of Higher Education may defer the requirement under subdivision (a)(3)(A) of this section if:
 - (i) The Department of Higher Education, in consultation with the Department of Workforce Services, determines that there was no employment position available that would reasonably enable the student to meet this requirement; or
 - (ii) Special circumstances as determined by the Department of Higher Education exist.
 - (C) After the period of deferral, the student shall begin or resume working in this state or become subject to repayment under subsection (b) of this section.
- (b) The written agreement under subsection (a) of this section shall provide that the grant converts into a loan and the student shall repay the grant amount:
 - (1) On a pro rata basis at an interest rate and on a schedule as determined by the Department of Higher Education for each year the student does not reside in this state for three (3) consecutive years and become employed beginning within six (6) months after receiving an associate degree or a certification; or
 - (2) In its entirety at an interest rate and on a schedule as determined by the Department of Higher Education if the recipient does not comply with the written agreement under subsection (a) of this section.
- (c) It is the recipient's responsibility to notify the Arkansas Department of Higher Education of any change in status within 21 days. Failure to notify the Arkansas

Department of Higher Education of a change of status may affect future eligibility. Change of status will include:

- (1) Change in name
- (2) Change in address
- (3) Change in institution

Collection of Loan.

- (a) Accounts will be retained by the Department of Higher Education in the Financial Aid Division until the individual is no longer eligible for deferment. The account will be turned over to a vendor for repayment. The student will be notified by mail that their account is being placed with a vendor for collections and they will be sent a loan amortization schedule along with the letter. The account will remain with the vendor until repaid or 120 days past due. Loan recipients who are determined by the Department of Higher Education to be 120 days delinquent will be mailed their first letter of notification ten (10) days after the installment payment is due. If payment is not forthcoming within 60 days from the original payment due date, a second letter of notification will be sent to the loan recipient declaring their account is delinquent and requesting that the account be immediately brought up to date. If the loan recipient has not responded within 90 days from the original payment due date, the third and final letter of notification will be sent to the recipient informing them that the account will officially be in default if outstanding payments are not made within 30 days.
- (b) Skip Tracing Mechanisms
 - (1) ADHE will use these steps to locate recipients if communications are returned as undelivered:
 - (A) Contact the Motor Vehicle Division of the Arkansas Department of Finance and Administration:
 - (B) Contact references listed on the recipient's application;
 - (C) Utilize telephone directory or check with directory assistance in the area of the recipient's last known address;
 - (D) Contact institutional offices (alumni office, admissions office, registrar's office, fraternity or sorority, and the department that the recipient majored in) at the campus where the recipient last attended;
 - (E) Contact creditors, such as credit card companies, credit bureaus, or GSL lender;

- (F) Contact recipient's field of study--professional organization, union, or licensing board:
- (G) Contact post office;
- (H) Contact utility companies; and,
- (I) Contact Chamber of Commerce.
- (c) Credit Reporting Agencies
 - (1) Defaulted recipients will be reported to the following Credit Reporting Agencies:
 - (A) CSC Credit Reporting Services, Inc.
 - (B) T R W Credit Data
 - (C) Trans Union Credit Reporting
 - (2) Forms for reporting defaulted loan recipients are located in the collections file. The Department of Higher Education will also respond promptly to any inquiries it receives from credit reporting agencies concerning delinquent or defaulted loan recipients.
- (d) State Income Tax Set Off
 - (1) By the authority of Act 345 of 1993, the Department of Higher Education has been included as a claimant agency for the setoff of debts against state tax refunds.
- (e) Litigation
 - (1) No sooner than 30 days after sending the third letter of notification, the Department of Higher Education shall institute a civil suit against the recipient for repayment of the loan. Small Claims Courts will be used to satisfy debts of accounts up to \$3,000.00. If over \$3,000.01, the Department of Higher Education must use Circuit Court. If the account is \$3,000.01 or above, the Department of Higher Education may choose to use Small Claims Courts and waive the difference because of the expense involved in going to Circuit Court. If the Department of Higher Education chooses to waive the difference, it cannot later try to collect the difference. Forms to take the recipient to Small Claims Courts are requested from the recipient's county of residence.

(f) Write-Offs

- (1) Arkansas Future Grants that convert to loans may be written off as uncollectible if the Department of Higher Education shows due diligence to satisfy the collection of the debt, and documents in the recipient's file that:
 - (A) The cost of litigation would exceed the likely recovery if litigation were commenced; or
 - (B) The recipient does not have the means to satisfy a judgment on the debt, or a substantial portion thereof.
- (2) Proof of due diligence collection activities must be submitted to the Administrator of the Department of Finance and Administration and approval from the Administrator must be received before Arkansas Future Grant loan accounts may be written off.

(g) Nonpayment Penalties

(A) Loan recipients who fail to meet their repayment obligations may have added to their total obligation any costs for collection of the debt.

Institutional Responsibilities.

(a) College/University Responsibilities

(1) Administrative Agreement

The chief executive officer of the eligible institution is responsible for appointing one representative from the financial aid office to act as administrator of the Arkansas Future Grant Program and to receive all communications, forms, etc. This representative is responsible for verification, data and compliance with all program rules and regulations. The institution must comply with all rules and regulations in order to maintain continued eligibility status.

(2) Disbursement Records

The institution shall maintain information on the student indicating disbursement of scholarship funds.

(3) Institutional Verification

The institution shall provide certification of enrollment in eligible program of study and enrollment in courses that will meet satisfactory academic progress standards, as of the eleventh day of classes, by completing a Verification Roster each semester after registration. The Verification Roster is an alphabetical listing by institution of all persons receiving the award for a given academic term. The certifying official is responsible for completing the verification rosters each semester or trimester. The Arkansas Department of Higher Education shall provide electronic Verification Rosters to the Financial Aid Administrator for each semester or trimester as needed. The electronic Verification Rosters shall be returned to the Arkansas Department of Higher Education by November 1 for the fall term and by March 15 for the spring term. The Arkansas Department of Higher Education shall also provide electronic continuing eligibility rosters to the Financial Aid Administrator before the end of the fall and spring term. The continuing eligibility rosters shall be returned to the Arkansas Department of Higher Education no later than January 15 based on the Fall semester and June 1 based on the Spring semester to ensure that adequate time is provided to notify students of their status in the program.

(4) Deadlines for Disbursement of Funds

The deadline for disbursement of funds is no later than 10 days after receipt of funds. Any outstanding funds not disbursed by these dates must be returned to the Arkansas Department of Higher Education. For those students whose applications are received by ADHE too late to allow disbursement by these dates, disbursement will be made within 10 working days of receipt of the verification roster and electronic transfer of funds.

(5) Due Diligence

The institution will exercise due diligence in providing complete, accurate, and timely information as requested by the Arkansas Department of Higher Education on any Arkansas Future Grant recipient or former recipient. In addition, the institution will exercise due diligence in complying with all the rules and regulations of the Arkansas Future Grant Program. The Arkansas Department of Higher Education shall periodically review the institution's records concerning this program in an effort to exercise its due diligence requirements as a steward of state funds.

The following resolution is offered for the Board's consideration:

RESOLVED, That the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board adopts the rules and regulations presented in this agenda item for the Arkansas Future Grant Program, to be administered jointly by the Arkansas Department of Higher Education and approved Arkansas Institutions of Higher Education.

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Director of the Arkansas Department of Higher Education or his designee is authorized to make technical changes and corrections when necessary in the program rules for the Arkansas Future Grant Program.



Financial Aid

Arkansas Academic Challenge Scholarship Program

Policy Statement

These rules shall be known as the Arkansas Department of Higher Education Rules Governing the Arkansas Academic Challenge Scholarship Program. This policy addresses the student eligibility criteria, method for recipient selection, continuing eligibility requirements, procedures for making payments to an approved institution of higher education, and other administrative procedures necessary for operation of the program.

Applicable Arkansas Code

Ark. Code Ann. 6-85-202 ET. Seq.

Applicability

This rule is applicable to students who apply for a scholarship under the Arkansas Academic Challenge Scholarship Program for the academic year 2010-2011 and each academic year thereafter. Recipients of Arkansas Governor's Distinguished Scholarships are prohibited from receiving Arkansas Academic Challenge Scholarships.

Definitions

- (1) "Academic Year" means fall, spring, first and second summer semesters in that order, or as defined by the Department of Higher Education;
- (2) "ACT" means the ACT Assessment administered by ACT, Inc.;
- (3) "ACT equivalent" means the Scholastic Aptitude Test (SAT), COMPASS, Accuplacer, Asset or other nationally normed test that is correlated with the ACT and approved by the Department of Higher Education for use by institutions of higher education to assess a person's college readiness;

- (4) "Approved institution of higher education" means an institution of higher education approved by the Department of Higher Education to participate in the Arkansas Academic Challenge Scholarship Program -- Part 2 and that is:
 - (A) A state-supported two-year or four-year college or university;
 - **(B)** A private, nonprofit two-year or four-year college or university with its primary headquarters located in Arkansas that is eligible to receive Title IV federal student aid funds; or
 - **(C)** An approved school of nursing, subject to the provisions of § 6-85-213(c);
- **(5)** "Approved school of nursing" means a school of nursing with its primary headquarter located in Arkansas that:
 - (A) Prepares students as registered nurses;
 - (B) Grants nursing diplomas;
 - **(C)** Is eligible to participate in the Higher Education Act of 1965, Title IV federal student aid programs;
 - (D) Is approved by the Arkansas State Board of Nursing;
 - **(E)** Has been approved by the Department of Higher Education as eligible to participate in the Arkansas Academic Challenge Scholarship Program; and
 - **(F)** Is not a two-year or four-year college or university;
- **(6)** "Arkansas resident" means a natural person who provides evidence deemed sufficient by the Department of Higher Education that:
 - (A) For the twelve-month period required under basic eligibility requirements the person:
 - (i) Maintained a permanent home in Arkansas where the person resides for an average of no less than four (4) days and nights per calendar week; and
 - (ii) Either:
 - (a) Is an Arkansas registered voter;
 - **(b)** Holds a valid Arkansas motor vehicle driver's license;
 - (c) Receives benefits under an Arkansas public assistance program;

- **(d)** Uses an Arkansas residence address for federal or state tax purposes; or
- **(e)** Claims Arkansas as a residence to hold public office or for judicial actions; or
- **(B)** Before the deadline for filing a scholarship application under this rule the applicant:
 - (i) Is on active military status;
 - (ii) Qualifies for in-state tuition and fees if the student is a:
 - (1) Veteran who was discharged or released from a period of not less than ninety (90) days of active duty in the military, naval, or air service within three (3) years before the date of enrollment in a program of study;
 - (2) Dependent of a veteran under subdivision (1) of this section;
 - (3) Member of the armed forces; or
 - (4) Spouse of a member of the armed forces and,
 - (iii) Meets one (1) of the conditions under subdivision (6)(A)(ii) of this section;
- (7) "Continuously enrolled" means:
 - (A) For a traditional student, he or she successfully completes at an approved institution of higher education twenty-seven (27) semester hours in the first academic year as a recipient and, except while the recipient is enrolled as a part-time student if the recipient is enrolled in the number of credit hours necessary to complete the recipient's degree program, successfully completes thirty (30) semester hours each academic year thereafter;
 - **(B)** For a full-time nontraditional student, he or she successfully completes at an approved institution of higher education at least fifteen (15) semester hours of courses in consecutive semesters;
 - **(C)** For a part-time nontraditional student, he or she successfully completes at an approved institution of higher education at least six (6) semester hours of courses in consecutive semesters; and
 - (D) For a student who is enrolled in a degree plan that has a maximum number of semester hours in a semester that is less than the requirements of subdivisions (7)(A)-(C) of this section, he or she successfully completes at

- an approved institution of higher education the maximum number of hours required by the degree plan for the semester;
- (8) "Cost of attendance" means the recognized cost of attendance of an institution of higher education calculated under rules established by the Department of Higher Education;
- (9) "Full Time Student" means a student enrolled in at least twenty-seven (27) semester hours the first academic year and thirty (30) semester hours per academic year thereafter or the equivalent, as described in this rule, or the equivalent as defined by the Department of Higher Education;
- (10) "End-of-course assessment" means an examination taken at the completion of a course of study to determine whether a student demonstrates attainment of the knowledge and skills necessary for mastery of that subject;
- (11) "Enrolled" means that the approved institution of higher education where the student is attending class counts the student as enrolled for the hours claimed on the last day to add or drop a class at the approved institution of higher education;
- (12) "High school equivalency test" means a test measuring the knowledge and skills usually learned in high school that is administered by a state-approved institution or organization;
- (13) "High school grade point average" means the numbered grade average on a student's high school transcript calculated:
 - (A) For a traditional student, using the first seven (7) of the last eight (8) semesters the student completed prior to graduating high school; or
 - **(B)** For a nontraditional student, using the last eight (8) semesters the student completed before graduating high school;
- (14) "Incarcerated" means a person who has been convicted of a crime and is imprisoned for that crime or is being held in custody for trial or sentencing. Incarceration will result in applicant or recipient being ineligible for the Academic Challenge Scholarship;
- (15) "Lawful permanent resident" means a non-United States citizen who resides in the United States under a legally recognized and lawfully recorded permanent residence and who may receive state public benefits under 8 U.S.C. § 1622;
- (16) "Nontraditional student" means a student who is not a traditional student;
- (17) "Personally identifiable student data" means any information that, alone or in combination with other available information, is linked or linkable to a specific student that would allow a reasonable person in the student's school

community to identify the student with reasonable certainty;

- (18) "Postsecondary grade point average" means the cumulative numbered grade average for college credit courses as calculated using a 4.0 scale;
- (19) "Qualified certificate program" means a program:
 - (A) That is offered by an approved institution of higher education;
 - **(B)** For which credit hours are awarded that are creditable toward an associate degree or baccalaureate degree; and
 - **(C)** Recognized by the United States Department of Education for financial aid purposes;
- (20) "Recipient" means an applicant awarded a scholarship funded through the program;
- (21) "Scholarship hold" means the temporary suspension of a scholarship award to a traditional student under this rule approved by the Department of Higher Education under § 6-85-221;
- (22) "Semester" means one-half (1/2) of a traditional academic year at an institution of higher education, or an equivalent approved by the Department of Higher Education, in which a student enrolls for not less than:
 - (A) Fifteen (15) credit hours as a full-time student, except that in the first semester as a first-time full-time freshman, a traditional student shall enroll in not less than twelve (12) credit hours; or
 - (B) Six (6) credit hours as a part-time student;
- (23) "Smart Core" means:
 - (A) The college and career readiness curriculum by that name under rules of the State Board of Education; or
 - (B) A college and career readiness curriculum that is:
 - (i) Established by rules of the state board in coordination with the Department of Higher Education; and
 - (ii) Substituted for the curriculum named "Smart Core";
- (24) "State-supported student financial assistance" means a state-supported scholarship, grant, tuition waiver, or tuition reimbursement funded with state funds or net proceeds from the state lottery awarded by:

- (A) The Department of Higher Education; or
- **(B)** A scholarship or grant awarded by an institution of higher education in this state in whole or in part by state funds, including without limitation:
 - (i) Scholarships awarded on the basis of entrance exam scores or high school academic achievement:
 - (ii) Tuition waivers based on age, military service, occupation, or other factors;
 - (iii) Out-of-state tuition waivers for undergraduate students from contiguous states in close proximity to a college or university;
 - (iv) Scholarships for transfers from two-year institutions;
 - (v) Performance scholarships for band, musical performing groups, arts, theater, forensics, and similar activities that are not awarded on the basis of entrance exam scores or high school academic achievement; and
 - (vi) Any other publicly funded program under which students are not charged or are reimbursed by the institution of higher education for tuition, fees, books, or other costs of attendance;
- (25) "Successfully completed" means that a student completed a course at an institution of higher education and received the equivalent of a minimum letter grade of "D";
- (26) (A) "Traditional student" means a student who:
 - (i) Will enter postsecondary education as a full-time first-time freshman on or before the fall semester of the academic year that begins immediately following:
 - (a) The student's graduation from high school; or
 - **(b)** The last day of the school year:
 - (1) That would have been the student's junior or senior year of high school; and
 - (2) In which the student completes the requirements for high school graduation and obtains a General Educational Development certificate instead of receiving a diploma; and
 - (ii) Remains continuously enrolled as a full-time student;

(B) "Traditional student" includes a student who otherwise meets this definition but delays entering postsecondary education under a scholarship hold approved by the Department of Higher Education.

Procedures

Basic Eligibility Requirements.

The basic requirements for an applicant to be eligible for an award from the Arkansas Academic Challenge Scholarship Program are:

- (1) (A) The applicant has been an Arkansas resident for at least the twelve (12) months immediately preceding the date the applicant will enroll in an approved institution of higher education.
 - **(B)** If the applicant is less than twenty-one (21) years of age, either the applicant or a parent or guardian of the applicant shall have maintained Arkansas residency for at least the twelve (12) months immediately preceding the date the applicant will enroll in an approved institution of higher education.
 - **(C) (i)** To be considered an Arkansas resident, an applicant shall demonstrate residency by evidence deemed sufficient to the Department of Higher Education.
 - (ii) Evidence of residency may include without limitation information provided by the applicant on the Free Application for Federal Student Aid or a subsequent application required by the United States Department of Education for federal financial aid.
 - **(D)** During the twelve (12) months immediately preceding the date an applicant will enroll in an approved institution of higher education if the person for whom the twelve-month period is calculated under subdivision (1)(A) or (1)(B) of this section is deployed outside of Arkansas under military orders, the Department of Higher Education shall calculate the twelve (12) months by:
 - (i) Excluding months of military deployment outside of Arkansas that are within the twelve (12) months immediately preceding the date the applicant will enroll in an approved institution of higher education; and
 - (ii) Including months the person maintained Arkansas residency immediately preceding the military deployment outside of Arkansas;
- (2) The applicant is a citizen of the United States or is a lawful permanent resident;
- (3) (A) The applicant is accepted for admission as a full-time student or part-time student at an approved institution of higher education in a program of study that leads to or is creditable toward:

- (a) A baccalaureate degree;
- **(b)** An associate degree;
- (c) A certificate from a qualified certificate program; or
- (d) A graduate-level or professional degree; or
- (ii) An approved school of nursing in a program of study that leads to a nursing diploma under § 6-85-213.
- **(B)** A full-time student shall enroll in at least twenty-seven (27) semester hours the first academic year and thirty (30) semester hours per academic year thereafter or the equivalent, as described in this rule, or the equivalent as defined by the Department of Higher Education.
- **(C)** A part-time student shall complete at least six (6) semester hours but less than the minimum number of semester hours for a full-time student, as defined by the Department of Higher Education.
- **(4)** The applicant has not met the maximum continuing education eligibility requirements under § 6-85-210;
- **(5)** The applicant does not owe a refund on a federal or state student financial aid grant for higher education;
- **(6)** The applicant is not in default on a state or federal student financial aid loan for higher education;
- (7) The applicant has not borrowed, as determined by the approved institution of higher education to be attended, in excess of the annual loan limits under the Federal Family Educational Loan Program Systems, William D. Ford Federal Direct Loan Program, Income Contingent Loan Demonstration Program, Stafford Loan Program, Parent Loan for Undergraduate Students Program, or Supplemental Loan for Students Program in the same academic year for which the student has applied for assistance under this rule:
- **(8)** The applicant is not incarcerated at the time of the application for or during the time the applicant receives a scholarship under this rule;
- **(9)** The applicant has complied with United States Selective Service System requirements for registration;
- (10) The applicant has completed and submitted to the United States
 Department of Education a Free Application for Federal Student Aid or a
 subsequent application required by the United States Department of Education
 for federal financial aid; and

(11) The applicant certifies that he or she is drug-free and pledges in writing on the application form to refrain from the use or abuse of illegal substances in order to become eligible and maintain eligibility for this program.

Additional Eligibility Requirements for Traditional Students.

In addition to the basic eligibility requirements an applicant is eligible as a traditional student if the applicant:

- (1) Graduated from an Arkansas public high school and has a minimum composite score of nineteen (19) on the ACT or the equivalent score on an ACT equivalent;
- (2) Has a disability identified under the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act, 20
- U.S.C. § 1400 et seq., as it existed on July 1, 2009, and graduated from an Arkansas public high school, and either:
 - (A) Had a minimum composite score of nineteen (19) on the ACT or the equivalent score on an ACT equivalent; or
 - **(B)** Scored proficient or higher on all state-mandated end-of-course assessments, including without limitation end-of-course assessments on:
 - (i) Algebra I;
 - (ii) Geometry;
 - (iii) Biology; and
 - (iv) Literacy; or
- (3) Achieved a minimum composite score of nineteen (19) on the ACT or the equivalent score on an ACT equivalent; and
 - (A) Graduated from a private high school, an out-of-state high school, or a home school high school; or
 - **(B)** In the year in which the student would have been a junior or senior in high school, completed the requirements for high school graduation and obtained a high school equivalency diploma approved by the Department of Career Education instead of receiving a diploma; or
- **(4)** Meets the following criteria;

- (A) Was enrolled at an institution of higher education in the immediately preceding academic year as a full-time, first-time freshman;
- (B) Did not receive a scholarship under this rule as a first-time, full-time freshman;
- **(C)** Successfully completed at least twenty-seven (27) semester hours of courses as a full-time, first-time freshman; and
- **(D)** Achieved a postsecondary grade point average of at least 2.5 on a 4.0 scale as a full-time, first-time freshman.

Additional eligibility requirements for a nontraditional student.

In addition to the basic eligibility requirements an applicant is eligible as a nontraditional student if the applicant meets one (1) of the following requirements:

- (1) If the applicant has not been enrolled in an approved institution of higher education, has either:
 - (A) Graduated from an Arkansas public high school and achieved a 2.5 high school grade point average; or
 - **(B)** Graduated from an Arkansas public high school, a private high school, an out-of-state high school, a home school high school, or obtained a high school equivalency diploma approved by the Department of Career Education and had a minimum composite score of nineteen (19) on the ACT or the equivalent score on an ACT equivalent; or
- (2) If the applicant has been enrolled in an approved institution of higher education, has earned a postsecondary grade point average of at least 2.5.

Continuing eligibility.

- (a) (1) (A) A recipient who meets continuing eligibility criteria under this rule shall receive a scholarship for one (1) academic year renewable annually until the recipient has earned one hundred twenty (120) semester credit hours.
 - **(B)** A recipient may continue to receive a scholarship after he or she has earned one hundred twenty (120) semester credit hours, but not more than one hundred thirty (130) semester credit hours, if the student is enrolled in a baccalaureate degree program that requires more than one hundred twenty (120) semester credit hours as provided under § 6-61-232.
 - (2) A semester in which a student withdraws or fails to complete the number of credit hours for which the student first enrolled is counted toward the maximum number of semesters for which the student may receive a scholarship award

under this rule.

- (3) The maximums under this subsection apply to any degree program, regardless of whether or not the degree program requires additional semesters.
- **(4)** A recipient may attend summer terms at the student's own expense to earn credit hours necessary to maintain eligibility for a scholarship under this rule.
- (b) To maintain eligibility for an Arkansas Academic Challenge Scholarship under this rule, a recipient shall meet the following requirements:
 - **(2)** A recipient shall continue to meet the eligibility requirements of this rule while a recipient of a scholarship under this rule;
 - (3) (A) (i) A recipient shall meet the satisfactory academic progress standards required to receive other financial aid at the approved institution of higher education where the recipient is enrolled, as determined by the Department of Higher Education in conjunction with the institution of higher education where the recipient is enrolled.
 - (ii) (a) A recipient who does not successfully complete any credit hours toward degree completion in a semester in which he or she received a scholarship under this rule immediately forfeits the remainder of the scholarship award for that academic year.
 - **(b)** The department shall notify the recipient of the loss of eligibility under this subdivision.
 - (iii) By accepting scholarship funds under this rule, the receiving institution certifies that students will be enrolled in courses that will meet satisfactory academic progress standards leading toward a certificate, an associate degree, a nursing diploma, a baccalaureate degree, or a graduate-level or professional degree.
 - **(B)** The department may approve a leave of absence for a reason that includes without limitation:
 - (i) A medical condition of the student or a member of the student's immediate family that, on the basis of a physician's good-faith judgment, necessitates the student or the student's immediate family member to be hospitalized or receive outpatient or home-based medical care or recuperation until released by the attending physician;
 - (ii) A personal or family emergency that requires the student to:
 - (a) Attend the funeral of an immediate family member; or

- **(b)** Visit a relative of the student if the relative has a medical condition in which death is possible or imminent;
- (iii) Military service under § 6-61-112;
- (iv) (a) A commitment for twelve (12) to twenty-four (24) months of service in a national or international humanitarian project sponsored by a nonprofit corporation organized with a charitable or educational purpose.
 - **(b)** The student's commitment shall be expressed in a written agreement with the nonprofit organization including the terms of completion for the student's service on the related project;
 - **(c)** The department shall release a scholarship hold if the department determines that the student did not complete the commitment under the written agreement; or
 - (v) Any other reason approved by the department;
- (4) A recipient who enrolls in one (1) or more remedial courses shall complete all remedial courses required by the approved institution of higher education by the time the student completes the first thirty (30) semester hours attempted after receiving the scholarship;
- **(5)** A recipient shall earn a postsecondary grade point average of 2.5 or higher at an approved institution of higher education;
- **(6)** A recipient shall enroll in courses that lead toward a baccalaureate degree or graduate-level or professional degree after attempting the lesser of:
 - (A) Five (5) semesters; or
 - (B) The completion of an associate degree program; and
- (7) A recipient shall meet any other continuing eligibility criteria established by the Department of Higher Education.
- **(c) (1)** A traditional student recipient who loses eligibility for a scholarship may apply as a first-time nontraditional student.
 - (2) A recipient under subdivision (c)(1) of this section who loses eligibility for the nontraditional student scholarship is not eligible to apply for a scholarship under any eligibility provision of this rule.
- (d) If a recipient is subject to losing a scholarship under subsection (c) of this section due to a catastrophic event experienced by the recipient or a family

member of the recipient, the department may waive the requirements of this section and determine the appropriate requirements for the recipient to either retain or regain the scholarship.

Literacy tutoring.

- (a) As an additional component to the Arkansas Academic Challenge Scholarship Program:
 - (1) Each applicant for the scholarship shall agree that for each year the scholarship is awarded he or she may volunteer to serve as a literacy tutor for a minimum of twenty (20) clock hours each semester in a public school or a faith-based educational institution serving students in prekindergarten through grade six (preK-6);
 - (2) A recipient who agrees to volunteer as a literacy tutor:
 - (A) Shall complete the prerequisite training in literacy and college readiness skills provided under this section before he or she begins tutoring; and
 - **(B)** May receive college credit for the tutoring as determined by the institution of higher education where the recipient is enrolled; and
 - (3) An enrolled college student who participates in the tutorial program and fails to meet the academic eligibility requirement under this rule for the fall or spring semester shall be given the probationary opportunity during the subsequent spring or summer term to continue his or her education and improve academic performance before losing scholarship funding in the subsequent semester.
- **(b)** A recipient who agrees to volunteer as a literacy tutor under this section shall receive the prerequisite training in literacy and college readiness from an approved institution of higher education based on training modules developed by the Department of Education.

Scholarship award amounts.

- (a) The General Assembly may use net proceeds from the state lottery to fund the scholarships awarded under this rule and to supplement the state-supported student financial assistance that the General Assembly determines is necessary to meet the state's objective for broadening and increasing access of Arkansas citizens to higher education.
- (b) Net proceeds from the state lottery used to fund scholarships under this rule shall:
 - (2) Be used exclusively for the purposes set out in Arkansas Constitution, Amendment 87, and this rule; and

- (3) Supplement and shall not supplant nonlottery state educational resources.
- (c) It is the General Assembly's intent that before increasing award amounts for scholarships under this rule, the number of scholarships awarded to nontraditional students under § 6-5-208 be increased.
- (d) The scholarships established under this rule are subject to available funding and do not create for any student an entitlement to financial assistance to enable the student's attendance at an approved institution of higher education.
- (e) (1) (A) Beginning with the 2016-2017 academic year, the scholarship award amount under this rule for an academic year for a full-time recipient enrolled in a four-year approved institution of higher education is:
 - (i) One thousand dollars (\$1,000) for a recipient who has earned less than twenty-seven (27) semester credit hours;
 - (ii) Four thousand dollars (\$4,000) for a recipient who has earned at least twenty-seven (27) semester credit hours but less than fifty-seven (57) semester credit hours;
 - (iii)Four thousand dollars (\$4,000) for a recipient who has earned at least fifty-seven (57) semester credit hours but less than eighty-seven (87) semester credit hours; and
 - (iv) (a) Five thousand dollars (\$5,000) for a recipient who has earned at least eighty-seven (87) semester credit hours but no more than one hundred twenty (120) semester credit hours, unless the recipient is enrolled in a baccalaureate degree program that requires more than one hundred (120) semester credit hours, but not more than one hundred thirty (130) semester credit hours, as provided under § 6-61-232, then up to the number of credit hours required to complete the baccalaureate program.
 - **(b)** A recipient shall receive no more than one (1) year of the scholarship provided under subdivision (e)(1)(A)(iv)(a) of this section unless the recipient is enrolled in a baccalaureate degree program that requires more than one hundred (120) semester credit hours as provided under § 6-61-232.
 - (c) (1) A recipient who is eligible to receive the scholarship under subdivision (e)(1)(A)(iv)(a) of this section may receive the scholarship while enrolled in a semester as a part-time student if the recipient is enrolled in the number of credit hours necessary to complete the recipient's degree program.
 - (2) The scholarship amount for the semester in which a recipient is enrolled as a part-time student under subdivision (e)(1)(A)(iv)(c)(1) of this section shall be prorated by the number of credit hours in which the

recipient is enrolled.

- **(B)** The Department of Higher Education shall not accept new applications for scholarships for current achiever students under § 6-85-209 after June 1, 2012.
- **(C) (i)** To determine the correct scholarship award amount based on credit hours, a first-time recipient shall submit a current college or university transcript if the first-time recipient has earned any semester credit hours to the Department of Higher Education no later than a date determined by the department prior to the academic year for which the first-time recipient will receive an initial scholarship award.
 - (ii) A first-time recipient who does not submit a transcript to the department on or before the date determined by the department shall receive the award amount under subdivision (e)(1)(A)(i) of this section.
- **(D) (i)** An Applicant may elect for the earned semester credit hours under subdivision (e)(1)(A) of this section to be only those semester credit hours earned after graduating from high school or obtaining a high school equivalency diploma approved by the Department of Career Education.
 - (ii) If the applicant makes the election under subdivision (e)(1)(D)(i) of this section, any semester credit hours earned through concurrent credit or any other method before graduating high school or obtaining a high school equivalency diploma approved by the Department of Career Education shall not be counted as earned semester credit hours for the purposes of determining a recipient's scholarship award amount under subdivision (e)(1)(A) of this section.
- (2) (A) Beginning with the 2017-18 academic year, the department shall award an aggregate amount of scholarship awards to nontraditional students of up to twelve million (\$12,000,000).
 - **(B) (i)** The department shall return to the Office of the Arkansas Lottery the excess funding, if any, for scholarship awards the department received under § 23-115-801.
 - (ii) The office shall deposit any funds received from the department under this subdivision (e)(2)(B) into a trust account established under § 23-115-801(b).
 - **(C)** Priority for scholarships awarded to nontraditional students is based on:
 - (i) The applicant's level of progress toward completion of a certificate, an associate degree, a nursing diploma, a baccalaureate degree, or a graduate-level or professional degree; or

- (ii) Other criteria established by the Department of Higher Education.
- (3) The scholarship award for an academic year for a full-time student enrolled in one (1) of the following institutions of higher education is one thousand dollars (\$1,000) for the first year and three thousand dollars (\$3,000) for the second year:
 - (A) A two-year approved institution of higher education;
 - (B) A branch campus of a four-year approved institution of higher education; or
 - **(C)** An approved nursing school.
- (4) The scholarship award amount for a part-time student recipient shall be:
 - (A) One-half (1/2) of the award amount for a full-time student recipient, if the recipient is enrolled in at least six (6) semester hours but less than nine (9) semester hours; or
 - **(B)** Three-quarters (3/4) of the award amount for a full-time student recipient, if the recipient is enrolled in at least nine (9) semester hours but less than the number of hours required for a full-time student recipient.
- **(5)** A current recipient who maintains eligibility for the scholarship under this rule shall continue to receive the scholarship award amount first awarded to the recipient.
- **(6)** The department shall give priority for a scholarship award to a full-time or part-time student:
 - (A) Who meets the eligibility requirements under this rule; and
 - **(B)** Whose parent, by birth or legal adoption:
 - (i) Was a resident of the State of Arkansas at the time that person entered the service of the United States Armed Forces or whose official residence is in Arkansas; and
 - (ii) Was a member of the United States Armed Forces who was killed while performing military duty:
 - (a) In a status identified under 32 U.S.C. § 101 et seq. or 10 U.S.C. § 101 et seq. as they existed on January 1, 2011; or
 - (b) In state active duty status.
- **(f)** Annually by December 15, the Legislative Council shall provide to the General Assembly its recommendations for any changes to the:

- (1) Award amounts;
- (2) Number or type of scholarships; and
- (3) Eligibility requirements.
- (g) It is the intent of the General Assembly that in determining award amounts under this rule the General Assembly will consider whether sufficient funds will be available to pay for scholarship awards through the anticipated completion of the degree or certificate a recipient is seeking.
- (h) All awards under this subchapter are subject to the prohibition under § 6-80-105 against using public funds in a student financial package in excess of the recognized cost of attendance at the institution where the student is enrolled.
- (i) (1) If the department has less than a sufficient amount from net proceeds from the state lottery to provide for the scholarship commitments under this rule, the department shall give priority for continued financial support under this rule to a student with continuing eligibility superior to first-time applicants.
 - (2) If the funding is insufficient to fully fund the scholarships for students with continuing eligibility created under this rule, the department shall award scholarships based upon the following criteria to students with continuing eligibility as follows:
 - **(A)** First, to students who have the highest level of progress toward completion of a certificate, an associate degree, a baccalaureate degree, or a graduate-level or professional degree, and who are enrolled in a program of study that is:
 - (i) In an area of critical workforce need as determined by the department; or
 - (ii) In a science, technology, engineering, or mathematics field;
 - **(B)** Second, to students who have the highest level of progress toward completion of a certificate, an associate degree, or a baccalaureate degree, or a graduate-level or professional degree, and who are enrolled in a program of study other than those listed in subdivision (i)(2)(A) of this section; and
 - **(C)** Last, in the event funding is insufficient to fully fund students under subdivision (i)(2)(A) or (i)(2)(B) of this section, to students who have the highest postsecondary grade point average.
 - (3) (A) If after funding all students with continuing eligibility under this section funding is insufficient to fund all qualified first-time applicants, the department shall award scholarships to first-time applicants in order of priority based upon the applicants' highest ACT or ACT equivalent scores.
 - (B) If after prioritizing first-time applicants based upon the applicants' ACT or ACT

equivalent scores funding is insufficient to fund all applicants with like ACT or ACT equivalent scores, the department shall determine who receives an award by random drawing.

Payments of Scholarships.

- (A) The Arkansas Department of Higher Education shall disburse scholarships to the approved institution of the student's choice. The Arkansas Department of Higher Education shall send funds to the institution via electronic funds transfer or state warrant. After verification of full-time enrollment, the institution will disburse the scholarship to the student according to the institution's disbursement procedures. The scholarship payment will correspond to academic terms, semesters, quarters, or equivalent time periods at the eligible institution. In no instance may the entire amount of the scholarship disbursement for an educational year be paid to or on behalf of such student in advance.
- **(B)** Transfer of Scholarships to another Approved Institution

A recipient who has received an Academic Challenge Scholarship may transfer the scholarship to another approved Arkansas institution of higher education, provided that:

 The student notifies the Arkansas Department of Higher Education of the change of status by October 1 for the fall term and by February 1 for the winter and/or spring terms by changing the college on the student's ADHE YOUniversal financial aid account;

(C) Repayment of Scholarships

If the recipient of a scholarship withdraws, drops out, or is expelled on or after the first day of class of a payment period, the institution will determine whether the student received an overpayment of financial aid funds for non-institutional expenses. Overpayment is the difference between the amount received as cash disbursements and the amount incurred for non-institutional costs during the portion of the payment period that the student was actually enrolled. It is the institution's responsibility to contact students and recover overpayments.

(D) Refunds

The Arkansas Academic Challenge Scholarship Program is entitled to a refund of the scholarship or loan amount, for that semester, if the recipient of a scholarship or loan withdraws, drops out, or is expelled on or after his or her first day of class of the payment period and the situation falls under the refund policy of the institution. The institution shall pay the refund to the Arkansas Department of Higher Education.

(E) Overpayment

If the award of an Arkansas Academic Challenge Scholarship results in an overpayment to the student according to the state law (Arkansas Code § 6-80-105) governing the stacking of scholarships, the institution shall follow the ADHE Stacking policy in reducing the student's financial package to prevent the student from receiving funds above the federally recognized cost of attendance.

Institutional Responsibilities.

I. College/University Responsibilities

A. Administrative Agreement

The chief executive officer of the eligible institution is responsible for appointing one representative from the financial aid office to act as administrator of the Arkansas Academic Challenge Scholarship Program and to receive all communications, forms, etc. This representative is responsible for verification, data and compliance with all program rules and regulations. The institution must comply with all rules and regulations in order to maintain continued eligibility status.

B. Disbursement Records

The institution shall maintain information on the student indicating disbursement of scholarship funds.

C. Institutional Verification

The institution shall provide certification of full-time enrollment and enrollment in courses that will meet satisfactory academic progress standards, as of the eleventh day of classes, by completing a Verification Roster each semester after registration. The Verification Roster is an alphabetical listing by institution of all persons receiving the award for a given academic term. The certifying official is responsible for completing the verification rosters each semester or trimester. The Arkansas Department of Higher Education shall provide electronic Verification Rosters to the Financial Aid Administrator for each semester or trimester as needed. The electronic Verification Rosters shall be returned to the Arkansas Department of Higher Education by November 1 for the fall term and by March 15 for the spring term. Students who are enrolled less than full-time in the current term shall not receive scholarship benefits in that term. The Arkansas Department of Higher Education shall also provide electronic continuing eligibility rosters to the Financial Aid Administrator before the end of the spring term. The continuing eligibility rosters shall be returned to the Arkansas Department of Higher Education no later than

June 1 to ensure that adequate time is provided to notify students of their status in the program.

D. Deadlines for Disbursement of Funds

The deadline for disbursement of funds is no later than 10 days after receipt of funds. Any outstanding funds not disbursed by these dates must be returned to the Arkansas Department of Higher Education. For those students whose applications are received by ADHE too late to allow disbursement by these dates, disbursement will be made within 10 working days of receipt of the verification roster and electronic transfer of funds.

E. Due Diligence

The institution will exercise due diligence in providing complete, accurate, and timely information as requested by the Arkansas Department of Higher Education on any Arkansas Academic Challenge Scholarship recipient or former recipient. In addition, the institution will exercise due diligence in complying with all the rules and regulations of the Arkansas Academic Challenge Scholarship Program. The Arkansas Department of Higher Education shall periodically review the institution's records concerning this program in an effort to exercise its due diligence requirements as a steward of state funds.

II. Recipient's Responsibilities

It is the recipient's responsibility to notify the Arkansas Department of Higher Education of any change in status within 21 days. This will include:

- Change in name
- Change in address
- Change in institution
- Change in full-time status (twelve college credit hours for those students who are in their first fall semester following high school graduation, fifteen college credit hours for those students who are beyond the first fall semester following high school graduation)

Failure to notify the Arkansas Department of Higher Education of a change of status may affect future eligibility.

Scholarship hold.

- (a) (1) The Department of Higher Education may approve a scholarship hold for a traditional student for a period of twenty-four (24) months or less.
 - **(2)** The reasons for a scholarship hold may include without limitation:
 - (A) A medical condition of the student or a member of the student's immediate family that, on the basis of a physician's good-faith judgment, necessitates the student or the student's immediate family member to be hospitalized or receive outpatient or home-based medical care or to recuperate until released by the attending physician;
 - **(B)** A personal or family emergency that requires the student to:
 - (i) Attend the funeral of an immediate family member; or
 - (ii) Visit a relative of the student if the relative has a medical condition in which death is possible or imminent;
 - (C) Military service under § 6-61-112; or
 - **(D) (i)** A commitment of twelve (12) to twenty-four (24) months for service in a national or international humanitarian project sponsored by a nonprofit corporation organized with a charitable or educational purpose.
 - (ii) The student's commitment shall be expressed in a written agreement with the nonprofit organization including the terms of completion for the student's service on the related project.
 - (iii) The department shall release a scholarship hold if the department determines that the student did not complete the commitment under the written agreement.

The following resolution is offered for the Board's consideration:

RESOLVED, That the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board adopts the rules and regulations presented in this agenda item for the Arkansas Academic Challenge Scholarship Program, to be administered jointly by the Arkansas Department of Higher Education and approved Arkansas Institutions of Higher Education.

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Director of the Arkansas Department of Higher Education or his designee is authorized to make technical changes and corrections when necessary in the program rules for the Arkansas Academic Challenge Scholarship Program.

PRODUCTIVITY FUNDING MODEL POLICY UNIVERSITIES

Background

Act 148 of 2017 repealed the needs-based and outcome-centered funding formulas as prescribed in Arkansas Code § 6-61-210, Arkansas Code § 6-61-224, Arkansas Code § 6-61-228, Arkansas Code § 6-61-230, and Arkansas Code § 6-61-233, and amended Arkansas Code § 6-61-234. The Act directs the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board to adopt policies developed by the Department of Higher Education (ADHE) necessary to implement a productivity-based funding model for state-supported institutions of higher education.

Productivity-based funding is a mechanism to align institutional funding with statewide priorities for higher education by incentivizing progress toward statewide goals. At the same time, such models encourage accountability to students and policymakers by focusing on the success of students through the achievement of their educational goals. The new funding model is built around a set of shared principles developed by institutions and aligned with goals and objectives for post-secondary attainment in our state.

A set of guiding principles, which is described below, is important to orient the design of a new funding model for public higher education institutions. These guiding principles allow the development of a productivity-based funding model which is student-centered and responsive to post-secondary attainment goals, while creating a funding context which enables innovation, increased efficiency and enhanced affordability.

Guiding Principles

Student-centered:

The model should place at its center students and students' needs including both access to and completion of meaningful and quality post-secondary learning.

Outcomes:

The model should focus on completion, and particularly on completions of underserved and at-risk students and completions in areas of need by the state and industry. This structure should recognize differences in investment associated with meeting the evolving needs of students, the workforce, and the state.

Collaboration:

The model should provide incentives for cross-institutional collaboration and reward the successful transition of students across institutions.

Supporting institutional mission:

The model should respect and be responsive to the diverse set of missions represented by each public institution of higher education.

Formula structure:

The model should maintain clarity and simplicity.

Flexibility:

The model should be adaptable in the face of a dynamic institutional and external environment.

Stability and transition:

The model should support short-, mid- and long-term financial stability of the public institutions of higher education, while focusing attention on outcomes and the goals of the state. The transition from the current funding formula to a productivity-based funding formula should allow for a managed and intentional transition process which mitigates negative impact at any one or group of institutions.

Measures

In addition to incorporating the guiding principles above, measures adopted in the productivity-based funding model should acknowledge the following priorities:

- Differences in institutional missions are recognized and encouraged.
- Completion of students' educational goals should be the most important priority of every institution.
- Progression toward completion recognizes that funding must follow the student.
- Affordability is encouraged through on-time completion, limiting excess credits, and efficient resource allocation.
- Collaboration is rewarded by encouraging successful transfer of students and reducing barriers to student success.
- Potential unintended consequence of raising academic requirements or lowering academic quality to increase completions must be discouraged.

The measures adopted relate to Effectiveness, Affordability and Efficiency. In addition, some adjustments to the model are necessary to respond to the unique missions of some institutions which cannot be captured in the productivity metrics.

Measures will be reviewed every five years to ensure that the model continues to respond to the needs and priorities of the state. A review more frequently than five years is impractical as institutions would not have opportunity to respond in a timely fashion. However, if it is determined that the measures adopted have created unintended consequences, those measures will be reviewed immediately.

Productivity Measures

Summary of Measures

At this time, Non-credit Workforce Training and Post-Completion Success <u>metrics</u> are not included in the formula but will be <u>metrics under the effectiveness category</u> when adequate data is available. Other future technical modifications, such as an addition of an inflationary index and refining of existing metrics, will be considered in the future as necessary.

Each metric is calculated using a three-year average based on the most recent academic year data that is available. Institutions will receive points in the productivity model according to the requirements of each metric. Points for each institution will be totaled and applied according to the weighting assigned to each metric in the effectiveness and affordability categories. Once the points for the effectiveness and affordability measures are totaled, adjustments based on research activities for universities and diseconomies of scale for two-year colleges will be applied. Finally, the efficiency category will be applied against the adjusted total. The final total of points will become the institution's Productivity Index.

The importance of credentials at each educational level are recognized. In addition, the unique characteristics of students are measured to recognize the

The Credentials metric is weighted at forty percent (40%) of the effectiveness category. This metric includes the average of the number of credentials awarded over the most recent three academic years, with consideration given to credentials earned by students who contribute to closing the attainment gap of underserved populations in Arkansas, as well as credentials that will help meet state workforce needs.

The Credentials metric includes the number of credentials earned in all degree levels: Certificate of Proficiency, Technical Certificate, Associate Degree, Advanced Certificate, Bachelor's Degree, Post-Baccalaureate Certificate, Master's Degree, Post-Master's Certificate, Specialist, and Doctoral Degree. Designated weights are applied to each level of credential. All credentials earned in Science, Technology, Engineering and Math (STEM) and High Demand fields receive additional weights. Credentials earned by students who are underserved in the areas of race/ethnicity, income, academic preparedness and age will receive additional weight. Degrees and certificates above the Bachelor's level will only receive additional weight for underserved race/ethnicity.

Credits at Completion

Research Adjustment

Research

One unique mission of some public universities that is not adequately captured in productivity measures is research and should be included as an adjustment to appropriate institutions. The research adjustment will be recognized by adjusting the productivity index score of an institution by the three-year average percentage of expenditures on research. This applies only to institutions with a research mission that spend more than 5% of all expenditures on research activities.

PRODUCTIVITY FUNDING MODEL POLICY TWO-YEAR COLLEGES

Background

Act 148 of 2017 repealed the needs-based and outcome-centered funding formulas as prescribed in Arkansas Code § 6-61-210, Arkansas Code § 6-61-224, Arkansas Code § 6-61-228, Arkansas Code § 6-61-230, and Arkansas Code § 6-61-233, and amended Arkansas Code § 6-61-234. The Act directs the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board to adopt polices developed by the Department of Higher Education (ADHE) necessary to implement a productivity-based funding model for state-supported institutions of higher education.

Productivity-based funding is a mechanism to align institutional funding with statewide priorities for higher education by incentivizing progress toward statewide goals. At the same time, such models encourage accountability to students and policymakers by focusing on the success of students through the achievement of their educational goals. The new funding model is built around a set of shared principles developed by institutions and aligned with goals and objectives for post-secondary attainment in our state.

A set of guiding principles, which is described below, is important to orient the design of a new funding model for public higher education institutions. These guiding principles allow the development of a productivity-based funding model which is student-centered and responsive to post-secondary attainment goals, while creating a funding context which enables innovation, increased efficiency and enhanced affordability.

Guiding Principles

Student-centered:

The model should place at its center students and student's needs including both access to and completion of meaningful and quality post-secondary learning.

Outcomes:

The model should focus on completion, and particularly on completions of underserved and at-risk students and completions in areas of need by the state and industry. This structure should recognize differences in investment associated with meeting the evolving needs of students, the workforce, and the state.

Collaboration:

The model should provide incentives for cross-institutional collaboration and reward the successful transition of students across institutions.

Supporting institutional mission:

The model should respect and be responsive to the diverse set of missions represented by each public institution of higher education.

Formula structure:

The model should maintain clarity and simplicity.

Flexibility:

The model should be adaptable in the face of a dynamic institutional and external environment.

Stability and transition:

The model should support short-, mid- and long-term financial stability of the public institutions of higher education, while focusing attention on outcomes and the goals of the state. The transition from the current funding formula to a productivity-based funding formula should allow for a managed and intentional transition process which mitigates negative impact at any one or group of institutions.

Measures

In addition to incorporating the guiding principles above, measures adopted in the productivity-based funding model should acknowledge the following priorities:

- Differences in institutional missions are recognized and encouraged.
- Completion of students' educational goals should be the most important priority of every institution.
- Progression toward completion recognizes that funding must follow the student.
- Affordability is encouraged through on-time completion, limiting excess credits, and efficient resource allocation.
- Collaboration is rewarded by encouraging successful transfer of students and reducing barriers to student success.
- Potential unintended consequence of raising academic requirements or lowering academic quality to increase completions must be discouraged.

The measures adopted relate to Effectiveness, Affordability and Efficiency. In addition, some adjustments to the model are necessary to respond to the unique missions of some institutions which cannot be captured in the productivity metrics.

Measures will be reviewed every five years to ensure that the model continues to respond to the needs and priorities of the state. A review more frequently than five years is impractical as institutions would not have opportunity to respond in a timely fashion. However, if it is determined that the measures adopted have created unintended consequences, those measures will be reviewed immediately.

PRODUCTIVITY FUNDING DISTRIBUTION POLICY

Background

Act 148 of 2017 repealed the needs-based and outcome-centered funding formulas as prescribed in Arkansas Code § 6-61-210, Arkansas Code § 6-61-224, Arkansas Code § 6-61-228, Arkansas Code § 6-61-229, Arkansas Code § 6-61-230, and Arkansas Code § 6-61-233, and amended Arkansas Code § 6-61-234. The Act directs the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board (AHECB) to adopt polices developed by the Department of Higher Education (ADHE) necessary to implement a productivity-based funding model for state-supported institutions of higher education.

Productivity-based funding is a mechanism to align institutional funding with statewide priorities for higher education by incentivizing progress toward statewide goals. At the same time, such models encourage accountability to students and policymakers by focusing on the success of students through the achievement of their educational goals. The new funding model is built around a set of shared principles developed by institutions and aligned with goals and objectives for post-secondary attainment in our state.

The AHECB shall use the productivity-based funding model as the mechanism for recommending funding for applicable state-supported institutions of higher education. The Board shall recommend funding for the state-supported institutions of higher education as a whole and the allocation of funding to each state-supported institution of higher education. The AHECB shall make separate recommendations for the two-year institutions and four-year institutions. The framework for those recommendations is described in this policy.

Funding Distribution Framework

A productivity index for each institution will be calculated based on the Productivity Funding Model policies for four- and two-year institutions. Each institution's current productivity index will be compared to its previous year's index to determine productivity changes. One productivity index will be calculated to represent productivity changes for institutions of higher education as a whole and will be used to determine how much new state funding is recommended. The AHECB will limit the funding recommendation generated by the productivity-based funding model to no more than a 2% growth over the prior year's Revenue Stabilization Act (RSA) general revenue funding amount for four- and two-year institutions.

When new state funding is recommended, the proportion of new monies to be distributed among four- and two-year institutions will be divided into two separate funding pools based upon the percentage of existing RSA general revenue. If any RSA general revenue funds remain unallocated to state-supported institutions of higher

education due to productivity declines, ADHE shall utilize the funds to address statewide needs in higher education.

New RSA general revenue allocated to four- and two-year institutions will be distributed among the institutions with productivity index increases. The percentage of new RSA general revenue funding recommended for institutions with productive index increases will be calculated as a percentage of the contribution to the overall four- or two-year institutions productivity index increases.

Within each four- and two-year institution group, RSA general revenue funding will be recommended for reallocation from institutions with productivity index declines to institutions with productivity index increases. Reallocation of RSA general revenue funding to institutions with productivity increases will be calculated as a percentage of the contribution to the overall four- or two-year institution productivity index increases. Reallocation for institutions with productivity index declines will be based on their percentage of productivity index decline. Recommended reallocation will be introduced on a graduated scale starting with 1% of an institution's RSA general revenue funding being reallocated in 2019-2020; up to 1.5% in 2020-2021; and up to 2% in 2021-2022 and thereafter.

The total RSA general revenue recommendation for each four- and two-year institution will include any new state funding recommendation and reallocated funding recommendation. If an institution's funding recommendation is greater than a 1% increase in 2018-2019; 1.5% increase in 2019-20; 2% increase thereafter over its existing RSA general revenue funding, the Board will recommend that the amount of funding recommendation up to 2% based on the graduated scale would be added to an institutions existing RSA general revenue and any funding recommendation in excess would be one-time incentive funding for that institution. The AHECB will recommend redistribution of one-time incentive funding in the following year based on productivity index changes.

In the event that an institution of higher education's RSA general revenue funding declines by more than 5% of the 2018-2019 fiscal year level due to productivity declines, ADHE shall not further recommend reductions in funding for that institution, but shall assist the institution in developing a plan for improvement and progression.

In any fiscal year for which the aggregate general revenue funding forecast to be available for state-supported institutions of higher education is greater than 2% less than the amount provided for the immediate fiscal year, the ADHE shall not further implement the productivity-based funding model until the following fiscal year.

This policy will be reviewed every three (3) years to ensure that productivity funding distribution continues to respond to the needs and priorities of the state. However, if it is determined that the funding distribution framework created unintended consequences, this policy will be reviewed immediately.

ADHE Executive Staff recommend that the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board approve the following resolution.

RESOLVED, That the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board adopts the productivity funding policies described in this agenda item.

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the productivity funding policies described in this agenda item will be used by the applicable state-supported institutions of higher education and the Arkansas Department of Higher Education to determine funding recommendations to be presented for consideration by the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board.

RECOMMENDATIONS FOR EDUCATIONAL AND GENERAL OPERATIONS STATE-SUPPORTED INSTITUTIONS OF HIGHER EDUCATION FISCAL YEAR 2018-19

Background

A.C.A. §6-61-234 (Act 148 of 2017) directs the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board (AHECB) to adopt polices developed by the Arkansas Department of Higher Education (ADHE) necessary to implement a productivity-based funding model for state-supported institutions of higher education. That language reads as follows:

"(a) (1) (A) The Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board shall adopt policies developed by the Department of Higher Education necessary to implement a productivity-based funding model for state-supported institutions of higher education."

Productivity-based funding is a mechanism to align institutional funding with statewide priorities for higher education by incentivizing progress toward statewide goals. At the same time, such models encourage accountability to students and policymakers by focusing on the success of students through the achievement of their educational goals. The new funding model is built around a set of shared principles developed by institutions and aligned with goals and objectives for post-secondary attainment in our state.

At its October 27, 2017 meeting, the AHECB approved the productivity funding model policies for the two-year colleges and universities. The policies were developed in conjunction with presidents and chancellors after meetings and revisions. The AHECB shall use the productivity-based funding model as the mechanism for recommending funding for applicable state-supported institutions of higher education. According to A.C.A. §6-61-234, the productivity-based funding model shall not determine the funding needs of special units such as a medical school, division of agriculture, or system offices. These special units are known as non-formula entities and ADHE staff reviewed justification requests submitted by the non-formula entities and prepared funding recommendations for Fiscal Year 2018-19 based upon those requests.

Operating Funding Recommendations for the 2018-19 Fiscal Year

The operating recommendations are based upon the productivity funding formula policies approved by the AHECB in October 2017 as well as requests submitted by the non-formula entities.

The two-year college and university productivity funding models have been calculated using academic year 2013 through academic year 2016 student data as well as academic year 2012 through academic year 2015 expenditure data reported to and

published by the Integrated Postsecondary Education Data System (IPEDS). The productivity funding model calculations represent a total productivity increase of 1.71% for 2-year colleges and universities, which supports the recommendation for state funding of those institutions of higher education of \$632,095,756 in 2018-19. The total funding recommendation for the non-formula entities is \$246,151,969 in 2018-19.

For the **universities**, an increase in funding is recommended for those institutions with productivity increases for a total university recommendation of \$6,979,776 in new revenue.

For the **two-year colleges**, an increase in funding is recommended for those institutions with productivity increases for a total two-year college recommendation of \$2,424,335 in new revenue.

For the **non-formula entities** the recommendation is for a 2.1% increase based on the Higher Education Price Index (HEPI) index which is \$3,935,634 and a recommendation of full funding which would require an additional \$34,367,390, of which \$16,372,702 would be for the University of Arkansas for Medical Sciences (UAMS).

The individual institutional recommendations for all three types of institutions (Colleges, Universities and Non-Formula Entities) were determined in the following manner: The general revenue funds were recommended based upon productivity changes as determined by the productivity funding model policies and the ADHE staff determined the recommendations of the non-formula entities. The non-formula recommendations were based upon the justifications submitted by the non-formula entity. The total recommendation for 2018-19 for Colleges and Universities is \$9,404,111 in new revenue. The total recommendation for 2018-19 for the Non-Formula Entities is \$38,303,024 in new revenue.

ADHE Executive Staff recommend that the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board approve the following resolution.

RESOLVED, That the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board adopts the recommendations for state funding of the educational and general operations of Arkansas public institutions of higher education in the 2018-19 fiscal year as included in Tables A, B, C, D and E.

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Director of the Arkansas Department of Higher Education is authorized to prepare appropriate documents for transmission to the Governor and the General Assembly of the 2018-19 operating recommendations of the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board.

FURTHER RESOLVED, That should any errors of a technical nature be found in these recommendations, the Director of the Arkansas Department of Higher Education is authorized to make appropriate corrections consistent with the policy established by the Board's action on these recommendations.

PREVENTION OF SEXUAL ASSAULT ON CAMPUS

Background

Act 563, passed by the Legislature and signed by Governor Asa Hutchinson during the 2017 Legislative Session, directs the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board to develop a plan of action to address the prevention of sexual assault on our college and university campuses. The action plan will be presented to the Legislative Council no later than November 3, 2017.

National reports on the frequency of campus sexual assaults have characterized the problem of campus sexual assault as epidemic. Additionally, Department of Justice data show that only 7% of campus rape was reported to campus officials. For students who experience a sexual assault, continuing with college can be extremely challenging. The psychological effects on the student can be life altering and debilitating. While colleges and universities currently have federal reporting requirements, Act 563 will allow Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board, ADHE, and the General Assembly to gather data at the state level on this important issue.

Action Plan

Act 563 requires the following elements to be a part of the campus activities:

- **a.** Incorporation of sexual assault prevention information for students through advising and student orientation.
- **b.** Integrate information about the prevention of sexual assault into academic courses if and when appropriate.
- c. Identification of opportunities to raise awareness and provide resources for the prevention of sexual assault across the entire student population.
- **d.** Identify private or federal grants available to address the prevention of sexual assault and promote student success, including any partnerships necessary to compete for such grants.
- e. Collaboration with the Department of Health or federally qualified health centers to promote access to care.
- **f.** Identify other topics or issues relating to the prevention and reduction of sexual assault.

The following resolution is offered for the Board's consideration:

RESOLVED, That the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board adopts the prevention of sexual assault on campus action plan as described in this agenda item in implementing the provisions of Act 563 of 2017. **FURTHER RESOLVED**, That the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board shall report on the status of the action plan annually to the chair of both House and Senate Public Health, Welfare and Labor and the chair of both Senate and House Education Committees.

PERSONAL SERVICES RECOMMENDATIONS FOR NON-CLASSIFIED PERSONNEL 2018-19 FISCAL YEAR

A.C.A. §6-61-209 requires the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board to present a consolidated budget request from the state-supported colleges and universities to the General Assembly and the Governor prior to each regular session of the General Assembly. As part of this process, the quantity of positions, titles, and line-item maximum salaries or pay grades for all administrative, academic, and auxiliary positions at each Arkansas public institution of higher education are reviewed, and changes recommended.

The recommendations included in this agenda item, to be effective July 1, 2018, recognize the varying structures and sizes of institutions, while maintaining reasonable consistency among positions at similar institutions. The primary objective of the Arkansas Department of Higher Education (ADHE) staff was to maintain relative uniformity in titles and line item maximums or pay grades for similar positions in comparable institutions, while recognizing the varying missions and structures of institutions, priorities of the new fiscal year, and FTE enrollment growth.

During the 2017-19 Personal Service Request process, institutions of higher education requested positions based on a two-year term. Due to this, requests for the 2018-19 fiscal year were expected to be minimal. Recommendations included in this agenda item are for position needs that could not be addressed using central pool positions or other means. ADHE staff reviewed all position requests and provided recommendations.

While additional positions and titles are recommended when institutions demonstrate a compelling need, ADHE staff attempted to keep the net growth at a minimum due to concerns over budget shortfalls and the expansion of state services. Salary recommendations for new positions are based on salaries for similar positions previously established at comparable Arkansas institutions.

Institutions of higher education, apart from UAMS, have 27,009 positions currently authorized. For 2018-19, staff recommend a net increase of five positions, for a total recommendation of 27,014 positions (0.02 percent increase). UAMS currently has 11,741 authorized positions. For 2018-19, UAMS did not request an increase in positions.

Institutions' state funding is not based on the number of approved positions; therefore, additional positions do not generate a need for new state funding. If institutional growth necessitates additional positions during the year, positions are requested from the appropriate central pool.

Summaries of authorized, requested, and recommended positions for two-year and four-year institutions are shown in Table A and Table B. Recommended maximum salaries for selected key administrative and academic positions are shown in Table C and Table D.

ADHE Executive Staff recommend that the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board approve the following resolution.

RESOLVED, That the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board adopts the recommended number of positions, titles, and maximum salaries or pay grades for positions in academic, administrative, and auxiliary positions for the 2018-19 fiscal year as recommended by staff.

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Director of the Arkansas Department of Higher Education is authorized to make technical corrections consistent with Coordinating Board action.

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Coordinating Board requests the Director to transmit the Personal Services recommendations to the Governor and the General Assembly for consideration for the 2018-19 fiscal year.

REPORT OF 2016-17 INTERCOLLEGIATE ATHLETIC REVENUES AND EXPENDITURES

Act 245 of 1989 (A.C.A. §6-62-106) directed the Coordinating Board to develop and establish uniform accounting standards and procedures for reporting revenues and expenditures. Based on these standard definitions and formats, the Coordinating Board is to collect the financial data and provide a uniform report of each institution's athletic revenues and expenditures for the previous fiscal year to the Legislative Joint Auditing Committee and the public by November of each year.

Athletic revenues and expenditures for 2016-17 for each institution have been collected according to uniform standards and compiled in a summary report that follows this agenda item. An explanation of the reporting format follows:

- 1. The athletic report details revenues and expenditures for each institution.
- 2. Athletic revenues will match athletic expenditures unless there is an ending fund balance.
- 3. Act 366 of 1991 (A.C.A. § 6-62-804) prohibits athletic deficits. A designated athletic fee must be charged to the students by the institution if athletic-generated revenues (i.e., ticket sales, media/tournament/bowl, concessions/program sales, and game guarantees), foundations/clubs and other private gifts, other athletic income, auxiliary profits, and the allowable educational and general transfer do not cover the total expenditures for athletics.
- 4. In accordance with the uniform reporting and auditing of intercollegiate athletic expenditures of state-supported institutions of higher education, maintenance of facilities expenditures related to all intercollegiate teams and spirit groups, excluding bands, shall be reported as actual costs of operating such athletic facilities or a proration of actual costs based on athletic usage (A.C.A. § 6-62-807).

The 2016-17 total amount of athletic expenditures reported by state-supported universities is \$176,065,898 and two-year colleges is \$597,216. The statewide total is \$176,663,114 – an increase of \$10,410,567 (6.3%) from \$166,252,547 in 2015-16.

A comparison of 2016-17 actual expenditures to 2016-17 budgeted revenues certified to the Coordinating Board in July 2016 is also illustrated at the bottom of the summary chart. Certified budgeted expenditures for 2016-17 totaled

\$173,721,196 for all institutions. Total actual expenditures for 2016-17 for all institutions exceeded this budgeted amount by 1.7% percent. Actual expenditures varied from the Board of Trustees-certified budgeted expenditures by a range of 15 percent over the budgeted amount to 9 percent under the budgeted amount.

The following resolution is presented for the Board's consideration:

RESOLVED, That the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board accepts the Report of 2016-17 Intercollegiate Athletic Revenues and Expenditures as prepared in accordance with Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board uniform accounting standards and definitions for athletic reporting.

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Coordinating Board authorizes the Director to transmit the Report of 2016-17 Intercollegiate Athletic Revenues and Expenditures to the Legislative Joint Auditing Committee according to the provisions of A.C.A. §6-62-106.

Summary of Intercollegiate Athletic Revenues and Expenditures, 2016-17

ECONOMIC FEASIBILITY OF LOAN ISSUE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE UNIVERSITY OF ARKANSAS ACTING FOR AND ON BEHALF OF THE UNIVERSITY OF ARKANSAS COMMUNITY COLLEGE AT RICH MOUNTAIN

The Board of Trustees of the University of Arkansas acting for and on behalf of the University of Arkansas Community College at Rich Mountain (UA Rich Mountain) requests approval of the economic feasibility of plans to obtain a loan not to exceed \$825,000 with a term of five (5) years with the option to extend for three (3) more five (5) year terms. Annual interest rate for the first five (5) year term will be 2.0 percent and adjustable over the last three (3) periods if needed. UA Rich Mountain will also purchase a five (5) year Certificate of Deposit as collateral, paying 1.0 percent annually. The interest rate for the Certificate of Deposit will also be adjustable over the life of the loan. Effectively, the net loan rate will not exceed 1.0 percent for the life of the loan. Proceeds from the loan will be used for educational and general (E&G) purposes. The University of Arkansas Board of Trustees approved the economic feasibility of this project at its meeting on September 8, 2017.

The educational and general loan will be \$825,000 with an estimated annual debt service of \$50,572. Proceeds from the loan will be used for renovation of the Abernathy Building (currently ongoing) and two (2) science labs (next summer). This will provide space for current staff housed in the building, as well as leased space for a partnership with the Arkansas Department of Workforce Services. Funding will also provide for the renovation of two (2) science labs that were originally built in the mid 1980's and have remained unchanged since that time.

The debt service on the loan will be supported by revenue from tuition and fees. Coordinating Board policy regarding debt service for E&G projects provides that a maximum of 25 percent of net tuition and fee revenue may be pledged to E&G debt service.

The above data demonstrates that the University of Arkansas Community College at Rich Mountain has sufficient tuition and fee revenue to obtain a loan of \$825,000 with a term of five (5) years with potential refinancing of three (3) additional five (5) year terms. These additional terms would be at an estimated

annual interest rate not to exceed a net of 1.00 percent of the earnings on the Certificate of Deposit.

Any proceeds from loans that require AHECB approval, are used for the purchase or construction of new facilities, and result in additional square footage are subject to the AHECB maintenance policy as adopted in October of 2010. The projects contemplated herein do not provide additional square footage to the campus.

ADHE Executive Staff recommend that the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board approve the following resolution:

RESOLVED, That the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board considers economically feasible plans for the Board of Trustees of the University of Arkansas acting for and on behalf of the University of Arkansas Community College at Rich Mountain to obtain a loan of \$825,000 with a term of 5 years with the option to extend for three additional five year terms, at a maximum annual interest rate not to exceed a net of 1.00 percent of the earnings on the Certificate of Deposit for the purpose of the renovation of existing space.

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Director of the Arkansas Department of Higher Education is authorized to notify the President and the Chair of the Board of Trustees of the University of Arkansas and the Chancellor of the University of Arkansas Community College at Rich Mountain of the Coordinating Board's resolution.

ECONOMIC FEASIBILITY OF LOAN ISSUE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE UNIVERSITY OF ARKANSAS ACTING FOR AND ON BEHALF OF THE UNIVERSITY OF ARKANSAS FOR MEDICAL SCIENCES

The Board of Trustees of the University of Arkansas acting on or on behalf of the University of Arkansas for Medical Sciences (UAMS) requests approval of the economic feasibility of plans to obtain a loan not to exceed \$30.0 million with a term of up to ten (10) years at an annual interest rate not to exceed 5.0 percent. Proceeds from the loan will be used for auxiliary purposes. The University of Arkansas Board of Trustees approved this financing at its meeting on September 8, 2017. This is loan one of two approved by the University Arkansas Board of Trustees resolution. The second loan will be issued in approximately 12 months and will include another economic feasibility of debt issuance analysis.

The auxiliary loan will be \$30.0 million with an estimated annual debt service of \$3,818,358 and a term of up to ten (10) years. Proceeds from the loan will be used for capital renewal and deferred maintenance to replace electrical, mechanical, HVAC, elevators, and other equipment in buildings at the Little Rock campus. The purpose of this project is to greatly reduce the risk of equipment failure, and to improve reliability and efficiency in the older buildings on the campus.

Coordinating Board policy regarding debt service for auxiliary projects provides that annual auxiliary revenues should be no less than 120 percent of total annual auxiliary debt service.

RESOLVED, That the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board approves the Certificate of Proficiency in Soil Science (CIP 01.1201; 9 credit hours); Certificate of Proficiency in Plant Science (CIP 01.1101; 9 credit hours); Certificate of Proficiency in Animal Science (CIP 01.0101; 9 credit hours); Certificate of Proficiency in Agriculture Business (CIP 01.0901; 9 credit hours); Technical Certificate in Agriculture Technology (CIP 01.0000; 24 credit hours); and the Associate of Science in Agriculture Technology (CIP 01.0000; 60 credit hours) offered by the University of Arkansas Community College at Batesville, effective Spring 2018.

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Coordinating Board instructs the Director of the Arkansas Department of Higher Education to inform the President and Chair of the Board of Trustees of the University of Arkansas System and the Chancellor of the University of Arkansas Community College at Batesville of the approval.

Program Justification

The proposed nine credit hour Certificate of Proficiency in Agricultural Business introduces students to the structure and organization of agribusiness, agricultural history, and the principles of microeconomic theory. Students will learn to interpret graphs and use economic theory to explain agricultural market behavior.

The proposed nine credit hour Certificate of Proficiency in Animal Science is a study of animals that provide food, fiber, and companionship to humankind, including the history and scope of animal agriculture, products produced from animals, reproduction, breeding and genetics, nutrients and digestion, lactation, behavior, and an overview of reproductive systems.

The proposed nine credit hour Certificate of Proficiency in Plant introduces students to agronomic and horticultural cropping systems including crop growth and development, crop physiology, crop ecology, environmental considerations, and production and protection practices. Students will learn to interpret the role of plants in our environment and society, as well as explore ecosystems. Students will also learn the basic principles of plant production, management, and their impact on the environment.

The proposed nine credit hour Certificate of Proficiency in Soil Science introduces students to the origin, classification, physical and chemical properties of soil, and environmental considerations. Students will learn about the nutrient cycles and nutrient management in reference to sustainable agriculture.

The Technical Certificate in Agriculture Technology is 24 credit hours that allows the student to explore the four diverse content areas in the Certificates of Proficiency in Agricultural Business, Animal Science, Plant Science, and Soil Science. The certificate program includes a "making connections in agriculture" course and nine hours of general education.

The Associate of Science in Agriculture Technology is 60 credit hours designed to provide students with diverse skillsets necessary to work in various sectors of the agriculture industry. Graduates will be prepared to work in the agriculture industry or to transfer successfully into a four-year program in agriculture or a related field. The 24 credit hours in the Technical Certificate in Agriculture Technology are completely transferable to the AS in Agriculture Technology. UACCB and Arkansas State University have signed a Memorandum of Understanding for the proposed AS in Agriculture Technology to transfer to ASU's Bachelor of Science in Agriculture.

UACCB has received requests from students, school district administrators, area agriculture businesses, agricultural organizations (such as Future Farmers of America and the Independence County Cattleman's Association), and four-year universities for an agriculture program. School district superintendents and high school principals in UACCB's service area report increasing enrollments in their agriculture programs. Some of the more outspoken proponents for an agriculture program are local banking officials who have large investments in farming operations. They believe borrowers

would be better served if they had additional education and training opportunities to learn how to make their operations more profitable. A survey of employers in the area indicated current and future openings for these graduates to be projected of twenty or more per year at salaries averaging \$30,000. Some of the employers who responded to the survey are Peco Foods, Inc., Garden Girl Farm Fresh Produce and More, Johnson Brothers Farm, and Harmon Brothers Cattle Company and Harmon Farms.

UACCB currently has one full-time 12-month faculty member who possesses a master's degree with a strong background in agriculture education. Implementation of the proposed program will not require the hiring of additional full-time faculty. Since agriculture is a large part of the local economy, a survey of potential adjunct faculty indicated a relatively high number of qualified adjunct faculty area who have appropriate academic credentials can assist with instruction. Library resources and instructional facilities, including classrooms and equipment, are sufficient for program implementation.

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Coordinating Board instructs the Director of the Arkansas Department of Higher Education to inform the President and Chair of the Board of Trustees of the University of Central Arkansas of the approval. Program continuation is contingent on UCA meeting and maintaining program accreditation requirements of the Commission on Accreditation of Athletic Training Education (CAATE).

Program Justification

The proposed Master of Science (MS) in Athletic Training is a 59 semester credit hour program that includes 14 credit hours of clinical experiences. Students complete five semesters of continuous clinical education under the direction and supervision of clinical preceptors and program faculty. The two-year program will prepare graduates with the knowledge and skills needed to practice effectively as certified athletic trainers. Athletic training is one of the nation's emerging health care fields and is recognized by the American Medical Association (AMA). An athletic trainer is educated and experienced in the prevention, treatment, and management of the health care needs of physically active individuals. The athletic trainer, along with physicians and other health care professionals, functions as an integral member of the health care team. Upon successful completion of the program and degree, graduates will be eligible to sit for the Board of Certification (BOC) examination for the athletic trainer.

The proposed MS in Athletic Training was developed in response to the announcement by the Commission on Accreditation in Athletic Training Education (CAATE) that beginning Fall 2022 the *Standards for Accreditation of Professional Athletic Training Programs* will be changed to include a requirement that professional programs be at the master's degree level. Baccalaureate program may not admit, enroll, or matriculate students into the athletic training program after the start of the Fall 2022 term. This change does not require currently certified athletic trainers to obtain an additional degree. UCA's current Bachelor of Science in Athletic Training will be phased out upon establishment of the MS program. Upon approval of the MS in Athletic Training, UCA will apply for approval from the CAATE to make the transition to the entry-level graduate degree. Upon approval of CAATE, UCA will no longer be able to admit students to the accredited BS in Athletic Training, however, students already enrolled in the undergraduate program at the time of transition will be able to finish the undergraduate degree.

The MS in Athletic Training will be housed in the Department of Exercise & Sport Science. Current faculty are adequate for program implementation and have appropriate academic credentials and are certified athletic trainers. One adjunct instructor will be required during the transition from the undergraduate program to the graduate program while the department is still teaching undergraduate athletic training majors and admits its first two cohorts to the new graduate program.

Torreyson Library's holdings with regard to athletic training are more than adequate to support the program and graduate research. The library continues to purchase both print and electronic books for departments as well as purchases upon request of the faculty and students. The library holdings include current editions of referenced text books for the Board of Certification Exam for the Athletic Trainer. In addition to Torreyson, the athletic training program has a library/resource room located in Prince Center 102. Students and faculty have access through the use of a keypunch lock system.

- 10. Completion of the prerequisite coursework with a grade of "C" or better (prerequisite coursework 10 years old or older will not be accepted)

Admission to the Athletic Training Program is a selective and competitive admission process to ensure that quality educational experiences are maintained. Completion of prerequisite courses is required prior to formal admission into the program. All students are subject to the same admission procedures and criteria. Candidates are advised that their acceptance into this program is not an assumed right. Candidates will be ranked according to GPA from all courses completed. Top ranked candidates will be invited to participate in an on-campus interview; numerical scores will result from the interview. The final ranking of candidates will be based on: cumulative GPA, prerequisite course GPA, GRE scores, interview scores, and observation hours ratings. One cohort is admitted each year. The top ranked 16 candidates will be offered positions in the program. If needed, the next candidates below the cut-off point on the list will be informed of their alternative status.

Technical Standards for Admission

Technical standards establish essential qualities considered necessary to acquire the knowledge, skills, and competencies of an athletic trainer, as well as meet the expectations of the Athletic Training Program's accrediting agency, the Commission on Accreditation of Athletic Training Education (CAATE). For selection, an applicant must demonstrate:

- The mental capacity to assimilate, analyze, synthesize, integrate concepts, and problem solve to formulate assessment and therapeutic judgments and be able to distinguish deviations from the norm.
- Sufficient postural and neuromuscular control, sensory function, and coordination to perform appropriate physical examinations using accepted techniques and to accurately, safely, and efficiently use equipment and materials during the assessment and treatment of patients.
- The ability to communicate effectively and sensitively with patients and colleagues, including individuals from different cultural and social backgrounds: this includes, but is not limited to, the ability to establish rapport with patients and communicate judgments and treatment information effectively. Students must be able to understand and speak the English language at a level consistent with competent professional practice.
- The ability to record the physical examination results and a treatment plan clearly and accurately.
- The capacity to maintain composure and continue to function well during periods of high stress.
- The perseverance, diligence, and commitment to complete the athletic training program as outlined and sequenced.
- The flexibility and the ability to adjust to changing situations and uncertainty in clinical situations.
- The affective skills and appropriate demeanor and rapport that relate to professional education and quality patient care.

In the event the student is unable to fulfill these technical standards, with or without reasonable accommodations, the student will not be admitted into the program.

The Athletic Training program reserves the right to determine appropriateness of transfer work related to the MS in Athletic Training degree. All college coursework must be submitted when students submit their application to the UCA Graduate School. Transfer students must meet the same academic, clinical and technical admission standards as all other students seeking admission into the program. Prior to admission, transfer students with no previous coursework at UCA must meet the same admission requirements listed above.

Proposed Champion Christian College, Hot Springs, Arkansas

RESOLVED, That pursuant to A.C.A. §6-61-301, the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board (AHECB) grants certification for institutional planning and development for the establishment of a new Arkansas independent college to be chartered as Champion Christian College in Hot Springs, Arkansas, to offer undergraduate degrees. FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Director of ADHE is authorized to notify the Board of Directors and administration of the proposed Champion Christian College, Hot Springs, Arkansas, that the certification for institutional planning and development to establish an Arkansas independent institution of higher education to offer undergraduate degree programs requires the proposed institution to notify ADHE whenever any of the following occurs: (1) major reorganization of the controlling body; (2) changes in the charter or incorporation documents of the proposed institution; (3) changes in the proposed method of operation of the institution and the proposed programs; or (4) status of the institution's application and approval for program accreditation by the appropriate program accrediting agency.

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Coordinating Board instructs the Director to notify the administration of the proposed Champion Christian College, Hot Springs, Arkansas, that any advertisement or published materials using the name of the AHECB or ADHE must contain the following statement:

Champion Christian College is certified by the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board for the purposes of institutional planning and development only, and state authorization for institutional operations is pending under the rules and regulations implementing A.C.A. §6-61-301. Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board certification does not constitute an endorsement of any institution or program. Such certification merely indicates that certain criteria as defined in Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board policy have been met as required under Arkansas law.

ASUN/UCA Transfer Agreement

<u>Purpose</u>

The purpose of this Agreement is to facilitate the transfer and degree completion of students earning the Associate of Science in Education at Arkansas State University Newport (ASUN) to the Bachelor of Science in Education in Social Studies (History) at the University of Central Arkansas (UCA). Through collaborative efforts, UCA and ASUN desire to provide clarity regarding the degree requirements herein, thereby affording students the opportunity to earn a high quality degree from both institutions in the most efficient manner possible.

Agreement

It is agreed that any student who has earned the Associate of Science in Education at ASUN will be admitted to the Bachelor of Science in Education in Social Studies (History) at UCA with full junior classification, subject to the provisions listed below.

Admission Requirements

- The student must complete the requirements necessary for general admission to UCA, as well as specific admission to the UCA Teacher Education program. This includes proof of minimum ACT, Praxis Core, or SAT scores as required by the Arkansas Department of Education.
- The student will have earned the Associate of Science in Education at ASUN, with at least a 2.70 cumulative grade point average, on or after the Effective Date of this Agreement.
- Degree program admission requirements for students who transfer pursuant to this Agreement will be determined in the same manner as if their initial enrollment had been at UCA.

Transfer of Credits

- Course requirements for this Agreement are displayed in the 2+2 Degree Plan Checklists listed above.
- A transfer student who has not completed all of the courses specified within the Associate of Science in Education degree plan at ASUN, as stipulated, before entering UCA, must work with an academic advisor to ensure timely completion of degree program requirements.
- Remedial course grades will not be computed in the cumulative GPA for purposes of admission to UCA.
- Due to state licensure requirements, UCA will not be able to apply the transfer of "D" grade credit hours toward any of the general education courses required for admission into the Teacher Education program, or any of the professional education courses including content track courses, required for the Bachelor of Science in Education in Social Studies (History).
- In accordance with UCA policy, the UCA Teacher Education program will, however, accept for transfer a maximum of six hours of credit with "D" grades toward any of the general education courses <u>not</u> required for admission into the Teacher Education program, subject to conditions.
- Calculation of overall GPA for purposes of graduation and awarding of honors is left to the discretion of UCA.

Implementation and Review

- The Chief Academic Officers at each institution will implement the terms of this Agreement, including incorporation of any mutually agreed upon changes into subsequent revisions of this Agreement, assuring compliance with any applicable policies, procedures and guidelines.
- This Agreement will be reviewed on an annual basis; both UCA and ASUN agree to notify one another in a timely manner of any curriculum changes that would significantly impact the nature of this Agreement.
- UCA and ASUN will work together cooperatively, in the best interest of affected students, to resolve any issues related to the transfer of courses should changes to either degree program occur while the Agreement is in effect.
- Students will be subject to the terms and conditions of this Agreement in accordance
 with the academic year of entry at ASUN, not to precede the academic year during
 which the agreement first took effect. A student may opt for a subsequent revision of
 this Agreement, but must meet all of the requirements specified therein. A period of
 non-enrollment for 12 months or more would require the student to adhere to
 Agreement requirements corresponding to the academic year of re-enrollment.

• UCA and ASUN will make every effort to inform students of this Agreement. This may include, but is not limited to, inclusion within each institution's website, university catalog, recruitment publications, media announcements, social media engagement, and in-person information sessions.

Miscellaneous

- This Agreement is effective upon executing and shall remain in effect even if persons, positions, and/or titles change.
- This Agreement may be terminated by either party with at least 90 calendar days written notice.
- In the event that the Agreement is terminated, all students who have already been admitted to UCA, in accordance with the terms of this Agreement, will be allowed to complete their approved course of study under the terms contained therein.
- Attached to this Agreement and made a part hereof as if set out word for word is the UCA University Contract Rider pursuant to Board of Trustees Policy No. 416.

BRTC/UCA Transfer Agreement

Purpose

The purpose of this Agreement is to facilitate the transfer and degree completion of students earning the Associate of Science in Liberal Arts & Sciences at Black River Technical College (BRTC) to the:

Bachelor of Arts in Anthropology;

Bachelor of Science in Anthropology;

Bachelor of Arts in History:

Bachelor of Science in History;

Bachelor of Arts in Philosophy:

Bachelor of Science in Philosophy;

Bachelor of Arts in Psychology;

Bachelor of Science in Psychology;

Bachelor of Arts in Sociology; or,

Bachelor of Science in Sociology

at the University of Central Arkansas (UCA). Through collaborative efforts, UCA and BRTC desire to provide clarity regarding the degree requirements herein, thereby affording students the opportunity to earn a high quality degree from both institutions in the most efficient manner possible.

Agreement

It is agreed that any student who has earned the Associate of Science in Liberal Arts & Sciences at BRTC will be admitted to one of the above stated programs at UCA with full junior classification, subject to the provisions listed below.

Admission Requirements

- The student must complete the requirements necessary for general admission to UCA.
- The student will have earned the Associate of Science in Liberal Arts & Sciences at BRTC, with at least a 2.0 cumulative grade point average, on or after the Effective Date of this Agreement.

Transfer of Credits

- Course requirements for this Agreement are displayed in the 2+2 Degree Plan Checklists listed above.
- A transfer student who has not completed all of the courses specified within the Associate of Science in Liberal Arts & Sciences degree plan at BRTC, as stipulated, before entering UCA, must work with an academic advisor to ensure timely completion of degree program requirements.
- Remedial course grades will not be computed in the cumulative GPA for purposes of admission to UCA.
- UCA will accept the transfer of credits, up to a maximum of 6 credit hours, for "D" grades subject to conditions.
- Calculation of overall GPA for purposes of graduation and awarding of honors is left to the discretion of UCA.

Implementation and Review

- The Chief Academic Officers at each institution will implement the terms of this Agreement, including incorporation of any mutually agreed upon changes into subsequent revisions of this Agreement, assuring compliance with any applicable policies, procedures and guidelines.
- This Agreement will be reviewed on an annual basis; both UCA and BRTC agree to
 notify one another in a timely manner of any curriculum changes that would significantly
 impact the nature of this Agreement.
- UCA and BRTC will work together cooperatively, in the best interest of affected students, to resolve any issues related to the transfer of courses should changes to either degree program occur while the Agreement is in effect.
- Students will be subject to the terms and conditions of this Agreement in accordance
 with the academic year of entry at BRTC, not to precede the academic year during
 which the agreement first took effect. A student may opt for a subsequent revision of
 this Agreement, but must meet all of the requirements specified therein. A period of
 non-enrollment for 12 months or more would require the student to adhere to
 Agreement requirements corresponding to the academic year of re-enrollment.
- UCA and BRTC will make every effort to inform students of this Agreement. This may include, but is not limited to, inclusion within each institution's website, university catalog, recruitment publications, media announcements, social media engagement, and in-person information sessions.

Miscellaneous

- This Agreement is effective upon executing and shall remain in effect even if persons, positions, and/or titles change.
- This Agreement may be terminated by either party with at least 90 calendar days written notice.
- In the event that the Agreement is terminated, all students who have already been admitted to UCA, in accordance with the terms of this Agreement, will be allowed to complete their approved course of study under the terms contained therein.
- Attached to this Agreement and made a part hereof as if set out word for word is the UCA University Contract Rider pursuant to Board of Trustees Policy No. 416.

<u>Purpose</u>

The purpose of this Agreement is to facilitate the transfer and degree completion of students earning the Associate of Science in Liberal Arts & Sciences at College of the Ouachitas (COTO) to the Bachelor of Science in Education in Elementary Education, the Bachelor of Science in Education in Middle Level, or the Bachelor of Science in Education in Social Studies (History) at the University of Central Arkansas (UCA). Through collaborative efforts, UCA and COTO desire to provide clarity regarding the degree requirements herein, thereby affording students the opportunity to earn a high quality degree from both institutions in the most efficient manner possible.

<u>Agreement</u>

It is agreed that any student who has earned the Associate of Science in Liberal Arts & Sciences Education at COTO will be admitted to the Bachelor of Science in Education in Elementary Education, the Bachelor of Science in Middle Level, or the Bachelor of Science in Education in Social Studies (History) at UCA with full junior classification, subject to the provisions listed below.

Admission Requirements

- The student must complete the requirements necessary for general admission to UCA as well as specific admission to the UCA Teacher Education program. This includes proof of minimum ACT, Praxis Core, or SAT scores as required by the Arkansas Department of Education.
- The student will have earned the Associate of Science in Liberal Arts & Sciences at COTO, with at least a 2.70 cumulative grade point average, on or after the Effective Date of this Agreement.
- Degree program admission requirements for students who transfer pursuant to this Agreement will be determined in the same manner as if their initial enrollment had been at UCA.

Transfer of Credits

- Course requirements for this Agreement are displayed in the 2+2 Degree Plan Checklists listed above.
- A transfer student who has not completed all of the courses specified within the Associate of Science in Liberal Arts & Sciences degree plan at COTO, as stipulated on the degree plan checklist, before entering UCA, must work with an academic advisor to ensure timely completion of degree program requirements.
- Remedial course grades will not be computed in the cumulative GPA for purposes of admission to UCA.
- Due to state licensure requirements, UCA will not be able to apply the transfer of "D" grade credit hours toward any of the general education courses required for admission into the Teacher Education Program, or any of the professional education courses, including content track courses, required for the Bachelor of Science in Education in Elementary Education, the Bachelor of Science in Education in Middle Level, or the Bachelor of Science in Education in Social Studies (History).

CCCUA/UCA Transfer Agreement

Purpose

The purpose of this Agreement is to facilitate the transfer and degree completion of students earning the Associate of Science in Psychology at Cossatot Community College of the University of Arkansas (CCCUA) to the Bachelor of Science in Psychology at the University of Central Arkansas (UCA). Through collaborative efforts, UCA and CCCUA desire to provide clarity regarding the degree requirements herein, thereby affording students the opportunity to earn a high quality degree from both institutions in the most efficient manner possible.

Agreement

It is agreed that any student who has earned the Associate of Science in Psychology at CCCUA will be admitted to the Bachelor of Science in Psychology at UCA with full junior classification, subject to the provisions listed below.

Admission Requirements

- The student must complete the requirements necessary for general admission to UCA.
- The student will have earned the Associate of Science in Psychology at CCCUA, with at least a 2.0 cumulative grade point average, on or after the Effective Date of this Agreement.

Transfer of Credits

- Course requirements for this Agreement are displayed in the 2+2 Degree Plan Checklists listed above.
- A transfer student who has not completed all of the courses specified within the
 Associate of Science in Psychology degree plan at CCCUA, as stipulated on the degree
 plan checklist, before entering UCA, must work with an academic advisor to ensure
 timely completion of degree program requirements.
- Remedial course grades will not be computed in the cumulative GPA for purposes of admission to UCA.
- UCA will accept the transfer of credits, up to a maximum of 6 credit hours, for "D" grades subject to conditions.
- Calculation of overall GPA for purposes of graduation and awarding of honors is left to the discretion of UCA.

Implementation and Review

• The Chief Academic Officers at each institution will implement the terms of this Agreement, including incorporation of any mutually agreed upon changes into subsequent revisions of this Agreement, assuring compliance with any applicable policies, procedures and guidelines.

- This Agreement will be reviewed on an annual basis; both UCA and CCCUA agree to
 notify one another in a timely manner of any curriculum changes that would significantly
 impact the nature of this Agreement.
- UCA and CCCUA will work together cooperatively, in the best interest of affected students, to resolve any issues related to the transfer of courses should changes to either degree program occur while the Agreement is in effect.
- Students will be subject to the terms and conditions of this Agreement in accordance
 with the academic year of initial enrollment at CCCUA. A student may opt for a
 subsequent revision of this Agreement, but must meet all of the requirements specified
 therein. A period of non-enrollment for 12 months or more would require the student to
 adhere to Agreement requirements corresponding to the academic year of reenrollment.
- UCA and CCCUA will make every effort to inform students of this Agreement. This may include, but is not limited to, inclusion within each institution's website, university catalog, recruitment publications, media announcements, social media engagement, and in-person information sessions.

Miscellaneous

- This Agreement is effective upon executing and shall remain in effect even if persons, positions, and/or titles change.
- This Agreement may be terminated by either party with at least 90 calendar days written notice.
- In the event that the Agreement is terminated, all students who have already been admitted to UCA, in accordance with the terms of this Agreement, will be allowed to complete their approved course of study under the terms contained therein.

Purpose

The purpose of this Agreement is to facilitate the transfer and degree completion of students earning the Associate of Science in Liberal Arts & Sciences at East Arkansas Community College (EACC) to the:

Bachelor of Science in Addiction Studies (Treatment);

Bachelor of Arts in History;

Bachelor of Science in History;

Bachelor of Arts in Sociology;

Bachelor of Science in Sociology:

Bachelor of Arts in Mathematics - Pure Mathematics;

Bachelor of Science in Mathematics - Applied Mathematics; or,

Bachelor of Science in Mathematics – Pure Mathematics

at the University of Central Arkansas (UCA). Through collaborative efforts, UCA and EACC desire to provide clarity regarding the degree requirements herein, thereby affording students the opportunity to earn a high quality degree from both institutions in the most efficient manner possible.

Agreement

It is agreed that any student who has earned the Associate of Science in Liberal Arts & Sciences Education at EACC will be admitted to one of the above-listed programs at UCA with full junior classification, subject to the provisions listed below.

<u>Admission Requirements</u>

- The student must complete the requirements necessary for general admission to UCA.
- The student will have earned the Associate of Science in Liberal Arts & Sciences at EACC, with at least a 2.0 cumulative grade point average, on or after the Effective Date of this Agreement.

Transfer of Credits

- Course requirements for this Agreement are displayed in the 2+2 Degree Plan Checklists listed above.
- A transfer student who has not completed all of the courses specified within the Associate of Science in Liberal Arts & Sciences degree plan at EACC, as stipulated on the degree plan checklist, before entering UCA, must work with an academic advisor to ensure timely completion of degree program requirements.
- Remedial course grades will not be computed in the cumulative GPA for purposes of admission to UCA.
- UCA will accept the transfer of credits, up to a maximum of 6 credit hours, for "D" grades subject to conditions.
- Calculation of overall GPA for purposes of graduation and awarding of honors is left to the discretion of UCA.

Implementation and Review

- The Chief Academic Officers at each institution will implement the terms of this Agreement, including incorporation of any mutually agreed upon changes into subsequent revisions of this Agreement, assuring compliance with any applicable policies, procedures and guidelines.
- This Agreement will be reviewed on an annual basis; both UCA and EACC agree to
 notify one another in a timely manner of any curriculum changes that would significantly
 impact the nature of this Agreement.

- UCA and EACC will work together cooperatively, in the best interest of affected students, to resolve any issues related to the transfer of courses should changes to either degree program occur while the Agreement is in effect.
- Students will be subject to the terms and conditions of this Agreement in accordance with the academic year of initial enrollment at EACC. A student may opt for a subsequent revision of this Agreement, but must meet all of the requirements specified therein. A period of non-enrollment for 12 months or more would require the student to adhere to Agreement requirements corresponding to the academic year of reenrollment.
- UCA and EACC will make every effort to inform students of this Agreement. This may include, but is not limited to, inclusion within each institution's website, university catalog, recruitment publications, media announcements, social media engagement, and in-person information sessions.

<u>Miscellaneous</u>

- This Agreement is effective upon executing and shall remain in effect even if persons, positions, and/or titles change.
- This Agreement may be terminated by either party with at least 90 calendar days written notice.
- In the event that the Agreement is terminated, all students who have already been admitted to UCA, in accordance with the terms of this Agreement, will be allowed to complete their approved course of study under the terms contained therein.

NAC/UCA Transfer Agreement

Purpose

The purpose of this Agreement is to facilitate the transfer and degree completion of students earning the Associate of Science in Liberal Arts & Sciences at North Arkansas College (NAC) to the:

Bachelor of Arts in Anthropology;

Bachelor of Science in Anthropology;

Bachelor of Arts in Criminology;

Bachelor of Science in Criminology;

Bachelor of Arts in History;

Bachelor of Science in History;

Bachelor of Arts in Philosophy;

Bachelor of Science in Philosophy;

Bachelor of Arts in Psychology;

Bachelor of Science in Psychology;

Bachelor of Arts in Sociology; or,

Bachelor of Science in Sociology

at the University of Central Arkansas (UCA). Through collaborative efforts, UCA and NAC desire to provide clarity regarding the degree requirements herein, thereby affording students the opportunity to earn a high quality degree from both institutions in the most efficient manner possible.

Agreement

It is agreed that any student who has earned the Associate of Science in Liberal Arts & Sciences Education at NAC will be admitted to one of the above-listed programs at UCA with full junior classification, subject to the provisions listed below.

<u>Admission Requirements</u>

- The student must complete the requirements necessary for general admission to UCA.
- The student will have earned the Associate of Science in Liberal Arts & Sciences at NAC, with at least a 2.0 cumulative grade point average, on or after the Effective Date of this Agreement.

Transfer of Credits

- Course requirements for this Agreement are displayed in the 2+2 Degree Plan Checklists listed above.
- A transfer student who has not completed all of the courses specified within the Associate of Science in Liberal Arts & Sciences degree plan at NAC, as stipulated on the degree plan checklist, before entering UCA, must work with an academic advisor to ensure timely completion of degree program requirements.
- Remedial course grades will not be computed in the cumulative GPA for purposes of admission to UCA.
- UCA will accept the transfer of credits, up to a maximum of 6 credit hours, for "D" grades subject to conditions.
- Calculation of overall GPA for purposes of graduation and awarding of honors is left to the discretion of UCA.

Implementation and Review

- The Chief Academic Officers at each institution will implement the terms of this Agreement, including incorporation of any mutually agreed upon changes into subsequent revisions of this Agreement, assuring compliance with any applicable policies, procedures and guidelines.
- This Agreement will be reviewed on an annual basis; both UCA and NAC agree to notify one another in a timely manner of any curriculum changes that would significantly impact the nature of this Agreement.
- UCA and NAC will work together cooperatively, in the best interest of affected students, to resolve any issues related to the transfer of courses should changes to either degree program occur while the Agreement is in effect.
- Students will be subject to the terms and conditions of this Agreement in accordance
 with the academic year of initial enrollment at NAC. A student may opt for a subsequent
 revision of this Agreement, but must meet all of the requirements specified therein. A
 period of non-enrollment for 12 months or more would require the student to adhere to
 Agreement requirements corresponding to the academic year of re-enrollment.
- UCA and NAC will make every effort to inform students of this Agreement. This may include, but is not limited to, inclusion within each institution's website, university catalog, recruitment publications, media announcements, social media engagement, and in-person information sessions.

Miscellaneous

- This Agreement is effective upon executing and shall remain in effect even if persons, positions, and/or titles change.
- This Agreement may be terminated by either party with at least 90 calendar days written notice.
- In the event that the Agreement is terminated, all students who have already been admitted to UCA, in accordance with the terms of this Agreement, will be allowed to complete their approved course of study under the terms contained therein.

UACCM/UCA Transfer Agreement

Purpose

The purpose of this Agreement is to facilitate the transfer and degree completion of students earning the Associate of Science in Education at the University of Arkansas Community College at Morrilton (UACCM) to the Bachelor of Science in Education in Social Studies (History) at the University of Central Arkansas (UCA). Through collaborative efforts, UCA and UACCM desire to provide clarity regarding the degree requirements herein, thereby affording students the opportunity to earn a high quality degree from both institutions in the most efficient manner possible.

Agreement

It is agreed that any student who has earned the Associate of Science in Education at UACCM will be admitted to the Bachelor of Science in Education in Social Studies (History) at UCA with full junior classification, subject to the provisions listed below.

Admission Requirements

- The student must complete the requirements necessary for general admission to UCA as well as specific admission to the UCA Teacher Education program. This includes proof of minimum ACT, Praxis Core, or SAT scores as required by the Arkansas Department of Education.
- The student will have earned the Associate of Science in Education at UACCM, with at least a 2.70 cumulative grade point average, on or after the Effective Date of this Agreement.
- Degree program admission requirements for students who transfer pursuant to this Agreement will be determined in the same manner as if their initial enrollment had been at UCA.

Transfer of Credits

- Course requirements for this Agreement are displayed in the 2+2 Degree Plan Checklists listed above.
- A transfer student who has not completed all of the courses specified within the Associate of Science in Education degree plan at UACCM, as stipulated on the degree plan checklist, before entering UCA, must work with an academic advisor to ensure timely completion of degree program requirements.
- Remedial course grades will not be computed in the cumulative GPA for purposes of admission to UCA.
- Due to state licensure requirements, UCA will not be able to apply the transfer of "D" grade credit hours toward any of the general education courses required for admission into the Teacher Education Program, or any of the professional education courses, including content track courses, required for the Bachelor of Science in Education in Social Studies (History).
- In accordance with UCA policy, the UCA Teacher Education program will, however, accept for transfer a maximum of 6 credit hours, for "D" grades toward any of the general education courses <u>not</u> required for admission into the Teacher Education program, subject to conditions.
- Calculation of overall GPA for purposes of graduation and awarding of honors is left to the discretion of UCA.

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Implementation and Review

- The Chief Academic Officers at each institution will implement the terms of this Agreement, including incorporation of any mutually agreed upon changes into subsequent revisions of this Agreement, assuring compliance with any applicable policies, procedures and guidelines.
- This Agreement will be reviewed on an annual basis; both UCA and UACCM agree to
 notify one another in a timely manner of any curriculum changes that would significantly
 impact the nature of this Agreement.
- UCA and UACCM will work together cooperatively, in the best interest of affected students, to resolve any issues related to the transfer of courses should changes to either degree program occur while the Agreement is in effect.
- Students will be subject to the terms and conditions of this Agreement in accordance
 with the academic year of initial enrollment at UACCM, not to precede the academic
 year during which the Agreement first took effect. A student may opt for a subsequent
 revision of this Agreement, but must meet all of the requirements specified therein. A
 period of non-enrollment for 12 months or more would require the student to adhere to
 Agreement requirements corresponding to the academic year of re-enrollment.
- UCA and UACCM will make every effort to inform students of this Agreement. This may include, but is not limited to, inclusion within each institution's website, university catalog, recruitment publications, media announcements, social media engagement, and in-person information sessions.

Miscellaneous

- This Agreement is effective upon executing and shall remain in effect even if persons, positions, and/or titles change.
- This Agreement may be terminated by either party with at least 90 calendar days written notice.
- In the event that the Agreement is terminated, all students who have already been admitted to UCA, in accordance with the terms of this Agreement, will be allowed to complete their approved course of study under the terms contained therein.
- Attached to this Agreement and made a part hereof as if set out word for word is the UCA University Contract Rider pursuant to Board of Trustees Policy No. 416.

The purpose of this Agreement is to assist licensed registered nurse (RN) graduates from Baptist Health College Little Rock (BHCLR) to complete a Bachelor of Science in Nursing (BSN) degree. Through collaborative efforts, UCA and BHCLR desire to offer, and make students aware of, a seamless online degree option in order to increase the number of BSN credentialed registered nurses in the State of Arkansas.

Agreement

It is agreed that UCA shall have total ownership of the RN to BSN Program (hereinafter "Program"). The administration, management, and operation of the Program, including student admission and advising, shall be the responsibility of UCA.

All Nursing (NURS) courses included within the Program curriculum will be taught by UCA faculty. UCA shall have the exclusive right to determine and make all financial, technical, and professional policies related to the NURS courses. UCA shall have full and complete ownership of all NURS courses and exclusive control over the administration, management, and operation of those courses.

The parties to this Agreement are independent contractors, and neither parties' employees shall have the authority to exercise any control over the professional judgment or methods used by the other party in the performance of the duties set forth in this Agreement.

Accreditation

UCA is a member of and accredited by the Higher Learning Commission (HLC). The baccalaureate nursing program at UCA is accredited by the Commission on Collegiate Nursing Education, One Dupont Circle NW, Suite 350, Washington, DC 20036, (202) 887-6791.

The BHCLR School of Nursing is approved by the Arkansas State Board of Nursing and accredited by the Accreditation Commission for Education in Nursing (ACEN).

If the nursing accreditation and/or approval of either party is changed, the affected party must notify the other immediately. Upon notification, this Agreement will be re-evaluated by both parties to determine if it can continue or if it will need to be terminated. Admission Requirements

- Students will apply to the Program through UCA, which will have exclusive responsibility for the Program admission and advising.
- UCA reserves the right to not select an applicant to the Program based upon a
 deficiency in one or more admission requirements. Although UCA is committed to
 accepting qualified applicants and will strive to adjust appropriately if the number of
 qualified applicants increases due to this Agreement, both parties understand and agree
 that academic qualification does not guarantee a student's admission to the Program.

 - 2. Applicant must have completed the prescribed 49 hours of general education and nursing prerequisite courses with a 2.75 cumulative GPA.
 - 3. Applicant must present a letter from employer documenting work experience if over 12 months since graduation.
- 4. Applicant must submit all admission application documentation as required by UCA. <u>Transfer of Credits</u>
 - Program pre-admission course requirements for this Agreement are displayed on the RN to BSN Degree Plan Check Plan Checklist: Baptist Health College Little Rock
 - The aforementioned attachment has been developed to serve as a guide regarding the general education and nursing pre-admission courses a student can complete at the University of Arkansas-Pulaski Technical College (UA-PTC). However, it is the student's responsibility to verify that all state minimum core course and prerequisite requirements are being met. Program applicants also have the option of completing these requirements at any accredited college or university. UCA shall have the exclusive right to determine the transferability of courses from colleges and universities other than UA-PTC.

- UCA is committed to working with recent and future BHCLR graduates that have completed general education and nursing prerequisite course requirements.
- Remedial course grades will not be computed in the cumulative GPA for purposes of admission to UCA.
