2	(d) Data collection shall be maintained by the Department of Education
3	for the purpose of:
4	(1) Increasing college and career readiness skills;
5	(2) Improving instruction;
6	(3) Enhancing school improvement plans; and
7	(4) Reducing the college remediation rates of students; and
8	(5) Developing and implementing postsecondary preparatory
9	programs under § 6-16-601 et seq.
10	(e) The department shall report to the House Committee on Education
11	and the Senate Committee on Education no later than September 31, 2010, and
12	September 30 of each year thereafter, on the implementation and effectiveness
13	of the <u>Arkansas</u> College and Career Readiness Planning Program.
14	
15	SECTION 2. Arkansas Code § 6-15-1402(b)(3)(A), concerning the contents
16	of the annual school performance reports for middle schools, junior high
17	schools, and high schools, is amended to read as follows:
18	(3) The report for middle schools, junior high schools, and high
19	schools shall:
20	(A) Include three-year trend data and allow parents or
21	guardians to compare the school's performance with state and national
22	averages in areas which that shall include, but not be limited to, without
23	<u>limitation</u> the following:
24	(i) School safety;
25	<pre>(ii) Norm-referenced test results;</pre>
26	(iii) Augmented criterion-referenced assessment
27	results;
28	(iv) Certified staff qualifications;
29	<pre>(v) Per pupil spending;</pre>
30	(vi) Assessment of the local taxpayer investment in
31	the school district;
32	(vii) Percentage of students eligible to receive
33	free or reduced-price meals;
34	(viii) Average salary of the staff;
35	(ix) Average attendance rates for students;
36	(x) Drop-out rate;

1	(xi) Graduation or completion rates;
2	(xii) College remediation rate for high schools
3	only; and
4	(xiii) Collegiate admission test results; and
5	(xiv) The statistical analysis of postsecondary
6	preparatory programs under § 6-16-601 for each postsecondary preparatory
7	program within the education service cooperative area where the school is
8	located; and
9	
10	SECTION 3. Arkansas Code Title 6, Chapter 16, Subchapter 6, is amended
11	to read as follows:
12	6-16-601. Authority.
13	(a) As used in this section:
14	(1) "College readiness assessment" means a test that measures
15	student readiness for postsecondary learning and is:
16	(A) Administered under the Arkansas College and Career
17	Readiness Planning Program, § 6-15-441; or
18	(B) Used by institutions of higher education as part of
19	their admissions, placement, and scholarship processes;
20	(2)(A) "College readiness benchmark" means the minimum score on
21	a college readiness assessment in mathematics, English, or reading indicating
22	that a student has a high probability of success in entry level postsecondary
23	education.
24	(B) College readiness benchmarks are determined by the
25	Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board;
26	(3) "Eligible student" means a public school student in Arkansas
27	<u>who:</u>
28	(A) Is enrolled in any of grades eight through eleven (8-
29	<u>11);</u>
30	(B) Is identified through a college readiness assessment
31	as scoring below the college readiness benchmark in mathematics, English, or
32	reading;
33	(C) Has received the counseling required under § 6-16-602;
34	<u>and</u>
35	(D) Desires to enroll in postsecondary education.
36	(4) "Placement test" means a test for entrance to postsecondary

1	education that is either:
2	(A) Approved by the State Board of Education; or
3	(B) Designated by the Department of Higher Education; and
4	(5) "Postsecondary preparatory program" means an intensive
5	program approved under this subchapter that is focused on preparing students
6	for entry level postsecondary work in the areas of mathematics, English, and
7	reading based on identified needs for college enrollment and placement.
8	(b) The State Board of Education is authorized and directed to shall:
9	(1) develop Develop and implement an intensive postsecondary
10	preparatory instruction program for public school students in designated
11	grades who choose to participate in these programs postsecondary preparatory
12	programs located in Arkansas for eligible students; and
13	(2)(A) Operate the postsecondary preparatory programs or
14	contract with local school districts or institutions of higher education to
15	operate postsecondary preparatory programs.
16	(B) The Department of Education is not required to operate
17	or fund postsecondary preparatory programs at a cost in excess of the funds
18	appropriated and funded in the Public School Fund for this purpose.
19	(c)(1) The state board shall promulgate the forms, applications, and
20	rules to implement this subchapter.
21	(2) The rules shall include without limitation the:
22	(A) Number and location of sites for postsecondary
23	preparatory programs; and
24	(B) Minimum and maximum class sizes for postsecondary
25	preparatory programs.
26	(d) The Department of Education shall:
27	(1) Develop course content guides for postsecondary preparatory
28	programs with assistance from the Department of Higher Education; and
29	(2)(A) Approve or disapprove the annual application of a
30	postsecondary preparatory program that is not operated by the Department of
31	Education.
32	(B)(i) The Department of Education shall not approve an
33	application under this subdivision (d)(2) unless the postsecondary
34	preparatory program meets the criteria under this subchapter and established
35	by state board rules.
36	(ii) For a postsecondary preparatory program that

1	operated prior to the date of filing an application, the Department of	
2	Education shall review evidence of the postsecondary preparatory program's	
3	performance and success.	
4	(e)(1) In collaboration with the Department of Higher Education, the	
5	Department of Education shall collect and analyze the following data from	
6	postsecondary preparatory programs:	
7	(A) The total number of participants;	
8	(B) The number of participants who were eligible for free	
9	and reduced-price meals under the National School Lunch Act;	
10	(C) Which courses were the most needed among English,	
11	mathematics, and reading;	
12	(D) The progress of participants monitored in the	
13	postsecondary preparatory program through the use of college readiness	
14	assessments;	
15	(E) The placement test scores of participants;	
16	(F) The number of participants who enrolled in	
17	postsecondary preparatory education in Arkansas and required remediation;	
18	(i) Required remediation; or	
19	(ii) Did not require remediation;	
20	(G) The number and type of postsecondary preparatory	
21	programs approved;	
22	(H) Who operated the postsecondary preparatory programs	
23	approved; and	
24	(I) The amount of funding the Department of Education	
25	distributed to each postsecondary preparatory program.	
26	(2) The Department of Education shall:	
27	(A) Store the student data collected under this subsection	
28	(d) in the Arkansas Public School Computer Network;	
29	(B) Present the data analysis under this subsection (d) in	
30	the annual school performance reports as required under § 6-15-1402; and	
31	(C) Annually release to the General Assembly the data	
32	collected under this subsection (d) after removing any personally	
33	identifiable student information.	
34		
35	6-16-602. Programs generally.	
36	(a) The nostsecondary preparatory programs established under authority	

1	of this subchapter shall:
2	(1) Provide advice which that will better prepare eligible
3	students for entry-level postsecondary work in the areas of mathematics,
4	English, and reading; and
5	(2) Improve diagnostic efforts, counseling, placement, and
6	instruction for secondary school students based on identified needs for
7	college enrollment and placement eligible students;
8	(3)(A) Provide intensive remedial instruction to eligible
9	students enrolled in the postsecondary preparatory program in one (1) or more
10	of the following curriculum areas:
11	(i) Mathematics;
12	(ii) English; or
13	(iii) Reading.
14	(B) Each course shall consist of twenty-five (25) hours or
15	more of instruction;
16	(4)(A) Use instructors with appropriate content knowledge or
17	specialized training for the course the instructor will teach.
18	(B) A postsecondary preparatory program may use an
19	instructor who does not hold an Arkansas teaching license if the non-license
20	instructor works together with an instructor who holds a current Arkansas
21	teaching license;
22	(5) Effectively use college readiness assessments to monitor the
23	progress of participants in the postsecondary preparatory program;
24	(6) Use innovative teaching and learning strategies that are
25	designed to be effective with participants in the postsecondary preparatory
26	program;
27	(7) Document evidence of its performance and the success of its
28	participants; and
29	(8) Meet other requirements established by rule.
30	(b) Guidelines for the testing and postsecondary preparatory programs
31	shall be prepared and promulgated by the Department of Education $\underline{\Lambda}$
32	postsecondary preparatory program that is not operated by the Department of
33	Education shall not receive funding under this subchapter unless the
34	postsecondary preparatory program files an annual application with the
35	Department of Education and the application is approved under § 6-16-601.
36	(c) A postsecondary preparatory program may be open for attendance:

1	(1) On one (1) or more days from Monday through Saturday; and
2	(2) During any hours that participants are not required to
3	attend public school.
4	
5	6-16-603. Local programs mandated — Placement test.
6	(a) The following programs shall be in effect in the public schools of
7	Arkansas:
8	(1) Every public school in Arkansas shall develop a local plan
9	for diagnosis of its students' academic deficiencies;:
10	(2) Based on the diagnosis of deficiencies, counseling
11	shall be provided to encourage students to enroll in secondary school courses
12	that would result in the improvement of academic skills in mathematics,
13	English, and reading; and
14	(3) Local plans shall provide for parental involvement in
15	student counseling and placement for students.
16	(1) Identify eligible students under this subchapter using the
17	results from college readiness assessments under the Arkansas College and
18	Career Readiness Program, § 6-15-441; and
19	(2)(A) Provide the counseling required under subsection (b) of
20	this section.
21	(B) The public school shall make every reasonable effort
22	to involve parents or guardians in student counseling and placement of
23	students.
24	(b) A public school counselor serving students in any of grades eight
25	through eleven (8-11) shall:
26	(1) Counsel and strongly encourage each student enrolled in
27	grades eight through eleven (8-11) who is identified through college
28	readiness assessments as not meeting the college readiness benchmarks in
29	mathematics, English, or reading to enroll in a postsecondary preparatory
30	program;
31	(2) Every eleventh-grade student enrolled in a public school of
32	Arkansas who chooses to do so may take a placement test which has been
33	approved by the State Board of Education during a time frame set by the state
34	board. Advise each public school student enrolled in grade eleven (11) in
35	Arkansas that the student may take a placement test under § 6-16-605; and
36	(3) Students who score less than Counsel and strongly encourage

1 each student who takes a placement test under § 6-16-605 and scores below the 2 statewide minimum scores established by the Arkansas Higher Education 3 Coordinating Board for mathematics, English, or reading shall receive 4 counseling and strong encouragement to enroll during their the student's 5 senior year of high school in regular school instructional courses designated 6 by: 7 (A) local Local school officials to assist in the 8 improvement of the student's scores in the areas of deficiency; and 9 (B) The Department of Education and the Department of 10 Higher Education as an appropriate course for college readiness. 11 (c) During a time frame to be established by the state board, every 12 eleventh-grade student enrolled in a public school of Arkansas who chooses to 13 do so may take a placement test which has been designated by the Arkansas 14 Higher Education Coordinating Board. 15 16 6-16-604. Optional summer program Testing Student enrollment. 17 (a)(1) Students who plan to enroll in postsecondary programs in 18 Arkansas may enroll in a state-approved intensive noncredit preparatory 19 program during the summer following the junior year of high school An 20 eligible student may enroll in a postsecondary preparatory program during a school year or during the summer months following a school year in which the 21 22 student is enrolled in any of grades eight through eleven (8-11) in an 23 Arkansas public school. 24 (2) An eligible student shall receive priority for enrollment in 25 a postsecondary preparatory program if the eligible student qualifies for 26 free and reduced price meals under the National School Lunch Act, 42 U.S.C. § 27 1751 et seg. 28 (2)(3) The Department of Education is also authorized to permit 29 the enrollment in these programs of Arkansas high school graduates If space 30 and funding are available after all eligible students who applied to attend a postsecondary preparatory program are enrolled, the Department of Education 31 32 may permit a public school student to enroll in a postsecondary preparatory 33 program if the student: 34 (A) Scores below college readiness benchmarks on a college 35 readiness assessment or placement test; and

(B) Either:

1	(i) Is enrolled in grade twelve (12) in Arkansas; or
2	(ii) Will enroll in the postsecondary preparatory
3	program within three (3) months of graduating from an Arkansas high school.
4	(b)(1) The length of the summer school term shall be five (5) weeks,
5	during which time a school shall provide not less than:
6	(A) Twenty (20) days of instruction; and
7	(B) Seventy-five (75) hours of instruction.
8	(2) The number and location of sites for these programs are to
9	be determined by the Department of Education.
10	(c) Course content guides for summer school preparatory courses shall
11	be developed by the Department of Education with assistance from the
12	Department of Higher Education.
13	(d)(1) The Department of Education may operate the noncredit
14	preparatory programs or may contract with local school districts or
15	institutions of higher education to operate these programs.
16	(b) An eligible student may enroll in a course in one (1) or more of
17	the curriculum areas in which the eligible student has scored below the
18	college readiness benchmark as identified by college readiness assessments.
19	(2)(c) The opportunity to participate in a noncredit postsecondary
20	preparatory program afforded to students by <u>under</u> this subchapter shall not
21	be interpreted as mandating the Department of Education to operate or fund
22	noncredit postsecondary preparatory programs at a cost in excess of the funds
23	appropriated and funded in the Public School Fund for this purpose.
24	(e) The State Board of Education shall adopt rules and regulations for
25	the implementation of this program, including minimum and maximum class sizes
26	for the programs.
27	(f) Students who choose to do so may take a placement test which has
28	been approved by the state board and the Arkansas Higher Education
29	Coordinating Board upon completion of their summer school studies.
30	(g) Students who complete the summer College Preparatory Enrichment
31	Program successfully and who enroll in an appropriate mathematics or English
32	course, as determined by the Department of Education and the Department of
33	Higher Education during the senior year of high school may take the placement
34	test designated by the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board under §
35	6-16-603(b) at no cost to the student.

1	6-16-605. <u>Testing</u> Acceptance of test scores.
2	(a) A student may take a placement test at no cost to the student at
3	the date, time, and location set by the State Board of Education if the
4	<pre>student:</pre>
5	(1) Is enrolled in grade eleven (11) in a public school of
6	Arkansas; or
7	(2) Completes a summer postsecondary preparatory program
8	successfully and in the student's senior year of high school enrolls in a
9	mathematics or English course that is designated by the Department of
10	Education and the Department of Higher Education as an appropriate course for
11	college readiness.
12	(b) At the request of those students a student, scores the student's
13	score on placement tests approved by the Arkansas Higher Education
14	Coordinating Board and taken by students enrolled in a public school of
15	Arkansas a placement test taken under authority of this subchapter will be
16	made available to and will be accepted by and recognized toward meeting
17	enrollment requirements of state-supported colleges, universities, and
18	postsecondary vocational schools in Arkansas.
19	
20	6-11-606. Elective course credit.
21	(a) A public high school shall award one (1) hour of course credit as
22	an elective for each college preparatory course a student successfully
23	completes in a postsecondary preparatory program under this subchapter.
24	(b) Course credit awarded under this section does not count toward the
25	minimum number of credits required for high school graduation.
26	
27	SECTION 4. EMERGENCY CLAUSE. It is found and determined by the
28	General Assembly of the State of Arkansas that preparing public school
29	students for college and career readiness is a high priority of the state's
30	educational and economic development systems; that the substantial cost to
31	remediate high school students at the postsecondary level will be reduced by
32	increasing access to postsecondary preparatory programs for public school
33	students in grades eight through eleven (8-11) who are identified as scoring
34	below college readiness benchmarks; and that this act is immediately
35	necessary so that the Department of Education may approve applications and

T	the current school year. Therefore, an emergency is declared to exist, and
2	this act being immediately necessary for the preservation of the public
3	peace, health, and safety shall become effective on:
4	(1) The date of its approval by the Governor;
5	(2) If the bill is neither approved nor vetoed by the Governor,
6	the expiration of the period of time during which the Governor may veto the
7	bill; or
8	(3) If the bill is vetoed by the Governor and the veto is
9	overridden, the date the last house overrides the veto.
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
